

Sesame Is Second Profit Crop On High Plains Area

the No. 2 money-maker for the irrigation farmers of the High Plains, The new crops' position became clear with the announcement by the Texas Sesame Seed Growers that the 1956 crop of 3,-300,000 pounds had been sold for

For many High Plains farmers this meant gross returns from Sesame of more than \$120.00 per

acre - second only to cotton. Robert L. Parker, executive vice president of Texas Sesame Seed Growers, production and marketing organization made up of farmers with headquarters here in Paris, Texas, gave this report: 'Irrigated yields per acre were the best ever recorded. The average net price on the High Plains of \$10.34 per hundred to the grower is a record high. Most all of the Sesame produced was graded

and sold as No. 1 quality seed." The \$10.34 price compared with \$19.04 per hundred for the 1955 High Plains crop and \$9.60 for the 1954 crop.

Parker's organization, which has pioneered the production and marketing of Sesame, handles the bulk of the U.S. Sesame crop.

Farmers on the High Plains made the highest yields and profits on Sesame, Parker reported, but the 5-year-old crop continued to make gains in other sections of Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Louisiana and Arkansas.

"It has been demonstrated clearly that there is a fine opportunity for this crop in the future," Parker said, "U. S. Sesame seed production in 1956 was only onetenth of the total domestic market requirement, and we could have sold eight to 10 million pounds at the same good price had U. S. grown seed been available. The market will be just as big in 1957, and if we don't produce sufficient tonnage, buyers will return to

foreign sources for Sesame seed." The farmers of the High Plains achieved their record-breaking yields by following a simple formula developed jointly with Texas Sesame Seed Growers: (1) Good farming practices, (2) Thick stand, (3) High Fertility level in for this new position. soil, and (4) Plenty of irrigation

"Sesame now has proved itself as a money-maker for the good farmer," Parker said, "The big problems of growing and harvesting and marketing have been removed and costs have been reduced. Most of the pioneering work is over, and an increasing number of farmers now are finding a place for Sesame in their cropping picture. Good profits will continue to lure more grain sorghum land in the irrigated areas and more corn land in the dry land farming a-

reas into Sesame. Parker said that his organization is already scheduling meet-ings of farmers of the High Plains and in the other production areas to demonstrate the latest and best methods of planting, cultivating, irrigating and harvesting Sesame, The Growers organization has produced a new color movie which illustrates in detail the various steps in the Sesame farming operation, Parker said, In addition, market prospects for the coming year will be presented at the meetings.

Parker said that Texas Sesame Seed Growers has reserved a sufficient amount of their special grown and processed best quality planting seed to plant enough Sesame in 1957 to produce between eight and 10 million pounds of seed. Varieties of seed being offered for commercial production this year are semi-shatering Renner No. 1, the new White Blanco and Rio Shatterproof. The seed is available either from seed dealers throughout the production greas, or directly from the Growers organization in Paris.



The Mid-Continent Association head said a major portion of an estimated \$3.7 billion gross income from Texas crude oil sales in 1957 would be plowed back into drilling and development work. He said the Texas drilling outlay may excoed that of 1956 by some \$1170,00. Indications are that Lamb Coun-

ty will have a part in the increas-ed drilling activities in Texas. With 67 producing oil wells in the trade territory at this time; other locations being drilled, or soon to be drilled, and general oil activity increasing, this section gives promise of making a n'ec contribution to the state-



Soviet Rocket Program

Defense Minister Duncan Sandys, of the United Kingdom, recently told the House of Commons there is good reason to believe the Russians have a rocket which is capable of bombarding Britain from Russian-occupied territory. This is certainly not startling news, since the Germans were bombarding with rockets which had ranges of approximately 160 and 175 miles back in 1945.

However, the Russian missles, Mr. Sandys says, are armed with nuclear warheads, which give them a terrific striking power.

Judging from the remarks made by the British Defense Minister, it would appear that British intelligence is not of the opinion that the Russians have either an intermediate or a long-distant ballistics weapon. By that, we mean a rocket missle capable of a range of either 1,000 to 1,5000 miles, or approximately 5,000 miles, which is the range of the longdistance weapon.

In revealing the British apprasial of Soviet weapons recently, Defense Minister Sandys announced that Brittain would henceforth concentrate on modern weapons to a large degree, abandoning the conventional weapons approach as far as possible. Britain's forces in Germany will be reduced and naval squadrons will replace the shore-strength Britain maintains in some of her possessions.

As soon as possible, Erltain will end conscription and will de-emphasize as many of the conventional features of her defense program as possible. The British, in other words, are going allout for modern weapons, especially unmanned missiles and rockets.

In Britain, it seems, the day of big standing defense establishment, in conventional terms, is at an end. And we suspect that in this field economies might be made in the U.S. defense program - economies which would not jeopardize our security or reduce our actual military punch.

Prices Up Again

The Government recently reported that consumers prices were the highest on record and expected to continue their climb. This was the announcement from the Bureau of Labor Statistics, of the Department of Labor, which reported the fifth successive monthly increase in the U. S. Consumer Price Index.

As the reader knows, one effect of this rise is in automatic pay hike for almost a million and a half employes. For about a million of this number, the pay rise will amount to one cent an hour.

We are not opposed to the pay increase, and if the cost of living connot be held in check, then pay increases are automatic. However, it is a matter for concern when pay increases continue to be granted automatically in a time of highly threatening inflation.

The increases are highly inflationary themselves and it appears that we are in something of a spiral, which - if not checked - could lead to a pretty rough bump in the coming months or years.

It should be recalled too, in this connection, that recent der suit would be filed against Dr. study reports of increases in business during the past year do not make it clear that about fifty per cent of the reported increase is merely due to higher prices and not actualy to increased business.




Suggested layout of electric soil heating equipment in hotbed

Clear Understanding Of Social Security Needed

calls for a clear understanding of carnings restrictions on receipt of Federal old-age insurance benefits, Mr. Hutton, Manager of the Lubbock social security office, said today

Many older works do not understand, he explained, that in or der to dicide how many benefit checks may be payable in the taxable year in which a claim is filed. all earnings in the full taxable year are counted.

For every \$80 or fraction of \$80 over \$1200 earned in the year of filing a claim, one month's benefit is withheld. A worker who earns \$1282 in the tax year offiling. for example, stands to lose two months benefits he may have been entitled to receive. This is true whether the amounts were earned before or after the month of filing. Th restriction on amount of earnings applies to all years during any part of which he was under age 72 and entitled to social security benefits.

Mr. Hutton said workers planpartial retirement should also be aware of the exceptions to the gereral rule. Regardless of total earnings in the year, no entitled worker will lose a benefit to rany month in which he does not earn more than \$80 in employment and does not render substantial service in a business or profession in which he is selfemployed. After he attains age 72 he will lose no benefits regardless the amount he earns or the ex-tent of his work. Total earnings for the full year, however, and taken into account in deciding whether the worker may receive benefits for all months before he attains age 72.
