

Only two boxes in the county gave a majority to even one Republican candidate. Olton went for Jack Cox 367-306 and for Des Barry 347-322 while Pleasant Valley went for Cox 42 -18. The Pleasant Valley box gave the Republicans a majority in almost every race.

"We made great strides," Bill Carter, chairman of the Lamb County Republican organization, said Wednesday in analyzing the defeat of the party in Lamb County.

"As a party we did well. Our drawback was that we failed to attract the independent voter," he continued.

"Two years ago in the general election we polled 1172 votes which we feel mainly were protest votes. This year we received 1718 votes for Cox which we feel were positive votes," Carter pointed out.

John Connally, new Texas Governor by more than 100,000 votes, received 2513 votes in the county to 1718 for Cox and 18 for Jack Carswell, the Constitution Party candidate.

In the 19th District Congressman race George Mahon was re-elected in every county according to unofficial returns. In Lamb County Mahon received 3055 votes to 1323 for his Republican opponent Dennis

For State Senator, Andy Rogers, Democratic incumbent won handily over his Republican opponent, John Zahn, Rogers received 3149 in the county to 1206 for Zahn. Results from are similar.

Preston Smith carried Lamb County by a large margin over Republican Bill Hayes in the race for Lieutenant Governor. Smith received 3019 votes to 1335 for Hayes.

In the Attorney General's race, Waggoner Carr swept the state stronger than any other Democratic candidate and in like manner led the party's ticket in the county. Carr received 3246 votes to 1102 for (See Election on Page 6)




