HOBBS AREA GETS WELL

Humble's No. 1 Bowers Credited With 6,000 Bbls. Daily

Although information was vague and at variance in different Big Spring oil offices, Humble Oil & Refining Company's No. 1 Bowers in the Hobbs pool of eastern New Mexico, is estimated capable of producing between 6,000 and 10,000 barrels daily from pay at 4,160 feet.

With tools in the hole No. 1 Bowers is reported to have flowed 160 barrels of oil in 30 minutes and 276 barrels of oil in 30 minutes with tools pulled from the hole.

The well is a six and one-half mile northwest extension of the Midwest discovery pool and is two miles northwest of Hobbs and in the center of the northeast quarter of section 30, township 18, range 88 east, according to information from Midland. When pay was encountered, operators were feeling their way ahead cautiously with a core barrel as some oil had been showing in the hole for two or three days.

Wells previously completed in the Hobbs pool average 600 to 700 barrels daily with one producer reaching a high peak of 1,600 barrels initial, it was stated. Consequently, if reports on No. 1 Bowers are not exaggerated, it takes first rank among oil wells drilled in eastern New Mexico.

Announcement was made recently that Atlantic Pipe Line Company has completed a survey from its Midland tank farm to the Deep Rock well in section A-46, Andrews county and that the survey is to be continued into eastern New Mexico. Officials of the Atlantic Pipe Line Company stationed at Midland, where the tank farm is located, were not prepared to make further statement, but intimated that the line will undoubtedly be extended into eastern New Mexico if constructed through Andrews county's new oil region.

Texas Prospects Are Regarded As Favorable

DALLAS, Jan. 23 (AP)—Industrial, agricultural and general employment prospects for 1930 are given in a pamphlet just released by the United States Department of Labor and received by Harold M. Young, assistant district manager of the Dallas district office of the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce.

Francis I. Jones, director general, stated that although in the last few months of 1929 industry receded and unemployment became pronounced, 1929 was an outstanding business year. Confidence, the fulcrum of business, was considerably shaken but vigor and strength again were evidencing themselves, he said, and predicted 1930 would measure 1929 in volume of business.

Regarding Texas, the report stated the industrial prospects compared favorably with those existing a year ago. While the present outlook in the textile and lumber industries was only fair the opinion was expressed improvement would be shown in the second quarter of 1930. Other industries reported a more favorable outlook and the consensus was that when many projects planned were under way, resident labor would be well employed. A large volume of building was reported from the principal Texas cities which was expected to give steady employment to all those craftsmen. An increase in the amount of public works over 1929 and a large amount of money spent on highway construction, levee construction, and flood control projects was likely. No change in the

Parrish To Seek Repeal Of 3-Day Marriage Proviso

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Jan. 23 (AP)—Don't go away. Don't go away out of Texas to get married.

The Texas marriage law requiring you to give three days notice of your marriage intentions is un-American. There are more elopements and runaway marriages because of the marriage intention bill. When girls and boys decide to "tie the knot" why make them chase out of the state.

Furthermore, making the boy in the case present a health certificate is unfair. It's a one-sided affair and should apply to the girl as well as the boy, if at all. Too many of the health certificates are forged. And what's the use of a health certificate, anyway?

The three-day intention law should be dispensed with entirely and should be acted upon by the Forty-first Texas Legislature now in special session. No, it should not be repealed, but it should be left intact if for no other reason to give it a fair test.

All this is a preamble to the announcement that Senator Pink L. Parrish, of Lubbock, is determined to have the convening Texas legislature repeal the law; and that F. L. Anderson, of San Antonio, author of the law, will sponsor a move against any opposition of the legislators.

Opposes It

"The law," said Sen. Parrish, "that requires brides and grooms to apply for a marriage license three days before it is issued is un-American, and is driving many of them out of the state to get married. If they want to marry at home I think they have that right and nothing should discourage them in that matter."

He said that he would ask Governor Moody to submit the matter before the special session and expressed confidence that it would be revoked.

"The repeal of the bill," Rep. Anderson said, "is being sponsored by those who will be materially benefited by the repeal. Before the law was passed a large number of marriages took place in the courthouse, but now, practically none of them do. I have yet to receive a complaint against the law from the parents of a girl who contemplates marriage."

The law was first sponsored by the County and District Clerks Association, Anderson explains, but when a special 50-cent fee that would have gone into the pockets of county clerks was stricken from the bill, he said he received requests from certain county officials of the state asking that the bill be killed.

Rider Passed

It was introduced in the 41st legislature, he declared, by another legislator and passed without the 50-cent county clerk fee. A rider was also attached by Rep. Reader, of Bexar County, providing for the physical examination by physicians which was not a part of the original bill.

Justice of the Peace Boltz, of San Antonio, was the official who said that the law had increased the number of runaway marriages, and that health certificates were frequently forged. Rep. Anderson retorted in saying he believed there was no forging of health certificates under the present law.

The district court grand jury recently commented on the law, in its final report to Judge W. S. Anderson, and asked that no Bexar county official lend his efforts to have it repealed.

No Such Thing As Parrot Fever, Says Snake King

BROWNSVILLE, Tex., Jan. 23 (AP)—To W. A. "Snake" King, bird and animal importer, "there's nothing to the parrot fever."

"I know parrots," he said. "Each year I import several thousand. I never heard of a case of parrot fever. There isn't any such thing as a disease peculiar to parrots."

"In recent years we have made all sorts of tests with them—we have given them every sort of food, even bad food, and yet they develop no illness. Why, they'll even eat sticks."

"Now it is known that down in the wilds of Brazil and elsewhere in South America there are some deadly poisonous plants. If a parrot has brought death to someone in Europe or in this country, it was not because the parrot was suffering itself from some strange and horrible illness on which parrots have a copyright. It was because on its claws it brought the poison of some of these plants."

He challenged the public health service.

"I defy them," said the importer. "To show me a real case of what they call parrot fever. I will gamble that it is a case of claw or bill poisoning—something which may result from the clawing of a lion or any animal or bird sometimes."

"I would also gamble that if these federal health men ran across the same case of parrot fever four months from now they would not know what it was."

Two Exceptions Made In Fees

AUSTIN, Jan. 23.—When a justice of the peace is waked up at midnight to marry a romantic couple, he will not be forced to hand over the stipend for this service, under an exception drafted by the legislative fee committee into the bill limiting county officers' compensation.

Rewards paid sheriffs for the capture of criminals were made the only other exception. These officers are not required to report marriage fees and rewards, but they and all other county officers will be required to account for all other fees and emoluments, and to pay over to the county all in excess of the limits fixed in the formative bill, with \$12,500 the maximum.

At present county officers are making over \$22,000 a year in some cases, Senator Pink L. Parrish of Lubbock, chairman of the fee investigating committee that is drafting the bill, reported.

Assistant Attorney General H. Grady Chandler assisted the committee in preparing and revising the bill it will sponsor under one of the legislative subjects submitted by Governor Dan Moody.

Million Head Of Cattle Being Fed

AMARELLO, Jan. 23 (AP)—Cattlemen in the Texas Panhandle are feeding a million head this winter, most of the animals being on both pasture and feed, Grover C. Butler, secretary of the Panhandle Livestock Association, estimates.

"We have about a million cattle feeding in the Panhandle this winter," he said. "It is not as many as we usually have. There are not many cattle being fed on full feed. Most of them are both feed and pasture."

"The pastures this winter have been in good shape. I do not think the cold weather has hurt cattle as much as people think. We know better how to take care of them."

Mr. Butler estimates the normal movement out of the Panhandle in a year is between 500,000 and 600,000 head. "Most of the young stuff goes to Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa and Illinois," he added.

Reception of the different speeches was as clear as if they been made in the next room. The small group, so vitally interested in the success of the conference, was silent during the entire ceremonies.

Immediately after the last speech the president and his companions went to an enjosed court for the early morning medicine ball game.

Cavern Will Get New Stairway

CARLEBAD, N. M., Dec. 22.—An announcement of interest to former visitors to Carlebad Cavern, made here Monday by the superintendent of Carlebad Cave National Monument, stated that the flight of 216 stairs into Carlebad Cavern soon will be a matter of history. The present stairway was built about five years ago by the Carlebad Chamber of Commerce to furnish easy ingress to visitors who could not be accommodated by the slower method of entrance via mine bucket, which carried only two people through the shaft of 178 feet in depth. Notwithstanding the hundreds of thousands of feet that have trod the wooden stairway it is at this time in excellent condition, and would serve many more years of usefulness. Then we plan to provide for a widened trail through the present natural entrance to the cavern. At this point, a new trail will be driven through rock, to the left, opening out on a shelf of rock extending toward the old bat cave, then curving westward, and by easy grades descending to the foot of the present stairway. How for harmony, if there had been any, for this session, disappeared the moment the grind started. Two first-class fighting issues already have been discovered. Over every phase of the prison location question there will be a lengthy wrangle, if early indications pan out along the line of probability. The Hoovercrat issue already has been raked into flame.
The American principle of free speech has been amplified by the senate to "free and unlimited speech," and the body always has fought shy of any limit on the time a senator can continue speaking. It has avoided the strict house rule limiting each speech.

But now, in the economy of time, Sen. J. W. E. H. Meek of Bowie county has proposed a cloture rule for this session, to limit debate sharply. His purpose, he said, is to try to head off some of the campaign speeches in the legislative hall.

R. S. Sterling, widely mentioned as a prospective candidate for governor, soon will say "yes" or "no" to the urgings of friends. At present, it seems probable that his decision will be against entering the race. Opposed to strenuous insistence of his admirers who have seen his job of highway administration, has been the vigorous negation of his family circle. As a business man, he has shown he holds little patience for the circumstances of politics, and little interest in those acts and mannerisms of expediency.
He has indicated he will give his friends a definite answer soon, and then will follow whichever road he has chosen.
