Bynum and his family have been living in Morton since last February, when they moved there from Lovington, N.M. They earlier had lived at Morton. He is a drilling firm employee.





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

Bynum and his family have been living in Morton since last February, when they moved there from Lovington, N.M. They earlier had lived at Morton. He is a drilling firm employee.


