

Wildcats Host To Brownfield In Crucial Game

Wildcats will get a share of the championship this Friday night at Seely Stadium. The game is expected to be in good shape and are ready to try and do the impossible, the upsetting of the only undefeated team in AA left in the High Plains area. The Cats were heavily outweighed last week but not a one of the boys suffered any serious injury. They have been working this week on a defense that can stop the running of the 'Cubs' two powerful backs, Joe and Howard Swan. The two brothers have ran roughshod over all opposition this year including the two teams that have victories over the 'Cats, Levelland and Seminole. The Cats should have a rougher time scoring this week than they had last week against the Lobos. Levelland has a better line and that is where the Cats run most of their plays. This all adds up to a good defense game and if either team can find a hole in each other's line it should be a wild scoring affair. On the other hand, it could be another close scoring affair. The starting lineup for both teams are at the bottom of this page. Additional bleachers have been erected in the end zones and along the sidelines and the school officials say it will increase the seating capacity to about 5,000. Counting the standing room space the crowd should be larger than last week when 6,500 fans jammed the stadium and others had to be turned away at the gate. Muleshoe and Morton are playing their game tonight in Muleshoe in order to allow the people from the two towns to be able to come and watch this game. It will be the first time that Littlefield and Brownfield have met in a title deciding game since 1941 when the Cubs handed the Cats a 34 to 6 licking at Seely Stadium for the Championship of old District 4-A.

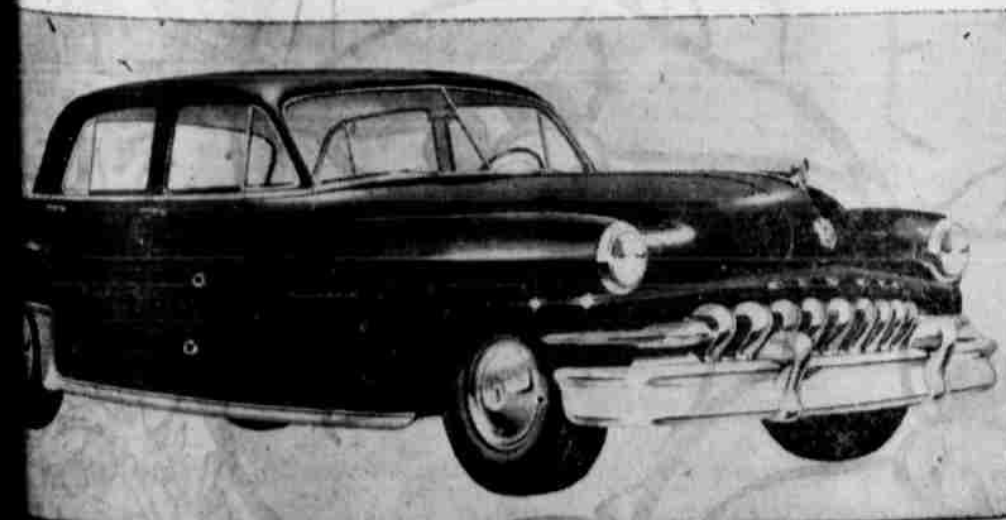

Total Of 40,000 Bales Of Cotton Ginned In Lamb County To Date

Every gin in the county went into high gear last weekend, following the recent snow and freeze, as thousands of hand pickers swarmed back into the fields, and approximately 150 mechanical pickers are operating at the present time, and in about 5 days, 1000 are expected to be operating. Cotton harvest is expected to be complete in 3 or 4 weeks.

David Eaton, Lamb County Agent, made a gin survey Wednesday, and released the following figures: Bales ginned north of the Sand Hills to date, 21,500; South of Sand Hills, 18,500, making a total of 40,000 bales ginned in the county. He estimated that the cotton crop is 35 to 40 percent harvested to date. He also estimated the Lamb County cotton crop at 110,000 bales.

J. D. Jordan, of Texas Employment officers here, states that there is still plenty of work for hand pickers. He estimates the Lamb county cotton crop at 100,000 bales.

Jordan stated that reports indicated that last Saturday was the biggest day of the fall season in Littlefield, with more business done, and more persons in town than at any time during the present harvest season.

David Eaton also estimated that grain sorghum is about 95 percent harvested, with much of it piled in the fields and on vacant lots. He said, elevators are all overflowing. If weather conditions prove favorable, all grain harvest should be completed by Saturday. The County Agent's cotton estimate fig-

ure includes cognizance of the reason freeze damage which was not as great as was estimated by many farmers. Cotton is grading one point lower average due to the moisture and freeze of last week.

Farm laborers are still in high demand in the county and the local employment office also lists numerous open jobs for waitresses, auto mechanics, laundry workers and dry cleaners. They have some new literature in the local offices on Civil Service openings and opportunities, in Texas, the United States and overseas.

In Lamb county, as of 5 p.m. Wednesday evening, four voting boxes had not reported; one box Sod House, had reported "no votes cast." Unofficial returns, had been counted in the eleven other precincts, but will not be made official until the count of all boxes is made today.

In the eleven boxes reporting, a total of about 310 ballots were cast. And Lamb county followed the reported state trend by voting against all of the amendments excepting the one authorizing more state funds for investment in land to be sold to War Veterans.

An incomplete tabulation of the votes turned in by the eleven precincts of the county which had brought in their returns, showed the following results.

Amendment No. One. (County pensions) For 76; Against 218.
Amendment No. Two. (University Funds) For 140; Against 149.
Amendment No. Three. (Rural Fire Prevention) For, 81; Against 209.

Amendment No. Four. (Veterans Land Fund) For 198; Against 110.
Amendment No. Five. (Increasing Welfare Payments) For 149; Against, 161.

Littlefield accounted for about 110 votes in the voting at the Court House, and 13 votes at the school house for the North Littlefield precinct.

Beef-Onion Pie

1/2 cup thinly sliced onion	1 cup biscuit mix
2 tablespoons shortening	3 tablespoons Fat Milk
1/2 lb. lean, ground beef	2 1/2 cup Fat Milk
1/2 teaspoon salt	2 teaspoons vinegar
1/2 teaspoon pepper	1 slightly beaten egg
4 teaspoons flour	1/2 teaspoon salt
	4 tablespoons chili sauce

Grease a skillet holding about 4 cups. Cook onion slowly 5 min. in hot shortening. Add ground beef. Cook until meat is no longer red. Mix in salt, pepper and flour. Put biscuit mix into bowl. Stir in with fork 3 tablesp. milk and water. Turn out on lightly floured board; knead a few seconds, or until smooth. Roll into a round large enough to fit bottom and sides of pan. Spread meat mixture over dough. Mix 1/2 cup milk and vinegar. Add egg and salt. Spoon milk mixture over top. Bake in moderate oven (375) 30 min., or until firm. Cut into wedges. Top each with a tablesp. of chili sauce. Makes 4 servings.
