### FLOYDADA, TULIA Wildcat Cagers Open Season With Two Close Victories

The Wildcat cagers opened their season on a winning note Monday night as they downed Floydada 53 to 46 as Steve Lew-

is got 23 points for the winners. The Junior Varsity also won as they downed the Floydada "B" team 60 to 44 with Nevill Manning getting 29 points.

The Varsity jumped off to a 10 to 0 in the first four and a half minutes as the visitors missed the first 11 shots at the hoop. The Wildcats were never headed as they built up a 17 to 6 lead at the end of the first eight minutes and led by a 34 to 17 score at half time.

Lewis and Wilmar Williams combined for the first eight points as Lewis hit two baskets and Williams a basket and two throws during the surge Phillip Pace scoring to make it 10 to 0 before the visitors finally broke into the scoring column with only 3:20 left

in the opening quarter. Williams got six and Lewis nine of the 17 scored by the Wildcats in the first eight minutes as the losers were held to only three baskets. The Wildcats lengthened their lead in the second quarter as they outscored the losers 13 to 11 but were able to convert on only five out of 14 free throw at-

Following the intermission Fred Koontz came off the bench to lead the Wildcats as he got six of the winners 12 points during the third quarter as the winners led 42 to 29 after three

With forward Steve Malar getting 12 of his 14 points during the second half the visitors cut into the Wildcat lead during the final eight minutes but were never able to get closer than the seven points at the fin-

The Wildcars won the game at the free throw line as they were outscored from the field with the visitors getting 20 field goals to the winners 17 but the Cats hit on 17 out of 29 free throw attempts while Floydada hit on only six from the charity

Burglaries Sunday and Monday night netted the thieves more than \$900 in merchandise from Mode-O-Day and Leon Durham's TV Corner.

The burglary at Mode-O-Day occurred either Sunday evening or early Monday morning while the TV Corner was broken into Monday night.

Articles of women's clothing valued at over \$100 was taken from the Mode-O-Day shop, Items taken in the burglary included two gowns, a three-piece dress, a coat, a suit, sweater and skirt, a purse and a duster.

Entrance was gained by breaking out the front door window of the shop. Several boxes were also broken into and several items damaged. Three television sets, inclu-

ding one color TV, were among the articles taken at the robbery at the TVCorner, which also included money from the cash register and Coke machine.

The sets taken were a 19-inch black and white set, an 11-inch color portable set and an 11inch black and white set. Also taken in the robbery were a manual record player, a fiveinch precision scope and a tube

The cash taken was approximately four dollars from the cash register and about one dollar from the Coke machine which was broken into.

As in the other case, entrance was gained through the front entrance. The lock on the door was pried open to gain entrance and then the items were taken out the rear entrance.

Owner, Leon Durham, estimated the value of the items taken to be approximately \$800.

The burglary of the TV store was the third within this area within the past week as one in Hart was broken into and over \$1,800 in TV sets stolen and another at Spearman where the thieves got away with better than \$700 in merchandise.

The police are inv the robberies at the Littlefield establishments but at present no definite leads have been turned up in the investigation.

The two over the past few days were the largest of a total of eight breaking and entering crimes during the month of November here in Littlefield.

Last Thursday the Highway 84 Cafe was broken into and \$43 was taken from the cigarette machine and approximately \$31 from the juke box. They also damage d the machines to the extent of \$96.

Friday night the Tasty Cream Drive-In was broken into and the city police arrested one suspect the building. The suspect. Emillio Coronado is at present on a 4 year probation sentence.

Two longtime postal employees, Roy Wade and John Glover were honored Friday night upon their retirement from the Littlefield Post Office.


The reception was held at the Southwestern Public Service Reddy Room and attended nore than 40 persons.
