# 1944 Annual Audit and Report of City Finances

OF THE CITY OF LITTLEFIELD

AS MADE TO THE CITY COMMISSION, FOR THE YEAR ENDING AS OF MARCH 31, 1944, BY MONTGOMERY & WITT, AUDITORS, OF LUBBOCK, TEXAS.

In Condensed Form (with some explanatory notes on individual items, and distinguished by the word "Explanation"), showing the financial status of each department, and total bonded indebtedness. Especial attention is called to the fact that the over-all report reflects a splendid financial position, with assets of \$455,048.43, and liabilities of \$323,378.20. This means that the physical assets owned by the City exceed liabilities by \$131,670.23. Aside from current bills, the City has no other indebtedness other than bonded indebtedness, bonds voted for specific purposes, and the outstanding of these totaling approximately \$323,500.

The preface of the audit says (in part) the following:
Touching on the executive operations of the City of Littlefield, we wish to commend the officials for the record of improvements that has been made in the city in the last few years. By referring to prior audits and the minute books, we find that there has been seven miles of pavement laid in the city with not a cent of indebtedness. There has been thousands of feet of sidewalks, the two inch mains have been increased to four inches and the four inch mains to six inches. The city has at this time 919 water connections. These things are in addition to no city liabilities, except the bonded indebtedness, which has been decreased during the past twelve months by \$5,000.00 and the delinquent taxes have been decreased in the last fiscal year by \$3,857.53. We would like to add that there is no delinquent interest due on the bonded indebtedness. bonded indebtedness.

EXHIBIT FOUR—Explanation—In connection with Refunding Issue above, this represents all old issue bonds (prior to 1934), which were grouped together when refinanced a few years ago, and the payments on the whole set by Court order, with a fixed amount of tax receipts ordered set aside each year to be paid on the bonds. Interest rate was reduced to 4 ½ %.

Water Works Improvement listed above, were bonds voted in 1934 to build and extend the present water works system. \$39,000 was voted. \$3,000 of these were later cancelled. PWA gave a grant of \$12,000 additional, and financed the bond issue. These are retired \$1,000 per year with 4% interest.

## City Is In Good **Financial Condition**

The 1944 annual audit and report of city finances of the City of Littlefield is published in this week's issue of the Lamb County Leader.

The audit for the year ending March 31, 1944, was compiled by Montgomery & Witt of Lubbock, and has been presented to Mayor Homer Hall and Commissioners Beamon Phillips and Ellis Foust.

Publication of the annual audit and report of finances is part of the program of the mayor and commissioners to at all times acquaint the taxpayers with the facts as regards the operation of the affairs of the City of Littlefield,

Especial attention is called to the fact that the over-all report reflects a splendid financial position, with assets of \$455,048.43 and liabilities of \$323,378.20. This means that the physical assets owned by the City exceed liabilities by \$131,670.23. Aside from current bills, the city has no other indebtedness other than bonded indebtedness, bonds voted for specific purposes, and the out-standing of these totaling approximately \$323,500.

The preface to the audit says in

Touching on the executive operations of the City of Littlefield, we wish to commend the officials for the record of improvements that has been made in the city in the last few years. By referring to prior audits and the minute books, we find that there has been seven miles of pavement laid in the city with not a cent of indebtedness. There has been thousands of feet of sidewalks, the two inch mains have been increased to four inches and the four inch mains to six inches. The city has at this time 919 water connections. These things are in addition to no city liabilities, except the bonded indebtedness, which has been decreased during the past 12 months by \$5,000, and the delinquent taxes have been decreased in the last fiscal year by \$3,857.53. We would like to add that there is no delinquent interest due on the bonded indebtedness."

## **Club Boys Produce Enough Food For** 200 Fighting Men

**Enrollment In County** Show Total Of 352 Boys With 410 Demonstrations

The 4-H Club boys of Lamb county will produce enough food with their projects this year to provide for the food needs of approximately two hundred fighting men for one year, according to the figures of S. L. Garrison, Assistant County Agent.

The final enrollment in the 4-H Clubs of the county show a total of 352 boys with 410 demonstrations. The most favored demonstration is swine, with 177 boys having 355 B. B. Iviepigs. Eighty-seven boys have 95 calves, 50 boys have 54 dairy cows and heifers, and 32 boys have 1,257 hens and fryers. Other projects chosen include lambs, goats, cotton, wheat, grain sorghum, and rabbits. If all of these projects are completed, a conservative estimate of production would make the total equal the annual food needs of two


