

A drought - breaking rain tarmers reporting heavy damworth possibility three quarters of a million fell throughout Lamb County Sunday night, leaving moisture ranging from light in the southwest part of the county up to amounts over two inches in the northern portion of Lamb County,

The amounts of moisture were spotted and while the rains were extremely beneficial to most irrigated farmland, County Agent Bill Kimbrough stated that the dryland farmers still need more rain but many are going to plant with the hopes of more rain in the near future.

Strong winds and hail accompanied the rain, especially near the Spade area with four or five five miles south of Lumsden Gin.

age from the hail. The wind was reported at 75 miles per hour at the start of the storm.

Some of the heaviest rains in the irrigated farmland area were reported from the area between Spade and Olton with the rainfall measuring from 1.5 in-

In the dryland area rains ran-

ging up to 3,5 inches were reported at Oklahoma Flats where the Oklahoma Flats Lake was reported to be the fullest it has been in years. Water was still running into the lake Monday morning, Rains up to 1.5 inches reported from the area

amounts ranging from .75 to .25 inches.

Reports from the Amherst area also averaged better than an inch of moisture which fell while .8 inch was reported at Frenship and 1.5 inches just north of Rocky Ford.

The official report for Lit-tlefield was .75, though just north of the city a farmer reported 1.62 inches fell. The 75 brought the 1965 total for Littlefield up to 3.10 inches compared to a 1964 total of II inches for the year.

The rain hit the Littlefield area starting at 7:30 p.m. Sunday evening accompanied by high winds with light hail. No damage

The Sudan area also received was reported in the city with the exception of a few limbs blown off trees.

Many of the cotton farmers with irrigated land had already put the seed into the ground and where the good showers fell. the farmers hailed the moisture as being just what they needed,

The dry land farmers that had already planted their crop reported the rain would give the cotton a chance and with more rain in the near future the outlook is much better than it was only a few days ago.

A tornado was reported Sunday evening near the Earth area but this twister did not touch the ground and no damage was

The rain throughout the Earth and Springlake area was general with reports ranging up to nearly two inches in the area just north of Earth, while a report south of Springlake quoted 1.5

The Pep and Bula areas received less than the rest of the general area as the official report was only .4 inch of moisture at both towns.

In addition to being so beneficial to the cotton farmers in the area the rains also helped the few wheat farmers as the rains will stop the too rapid ripening and the first of the wheat is scheduled to be harvested within



The board plans to contact all the wrecking yards in the city and encourage them to enter into the campaign, in hopes that the entry to the city, as well as the city proper, can be spruced up. At the present time plans call for a section of the city at a time to be cleaned up, with the work set to begin Monday, no set schedule for the campaign has been reached, but it is hoped that by the start of the drive a system of progress will be established, and the work can move along at a rapid pace.

Three Orders Passed By Court

The Lamb County Commissioners Court only passed three orders at their end of month meeting last Friday.

The first order was a decision concerning the Federal In-come Tax withholding for temporary employees of the County. The second order provided for the paying of \$3,515 to the Messer Bros. Construction Firm for their work in connection with the highway improvement program.


The third order passed changed the effective date of Mrs. Roy Wade being appointed as Veterans Services Officer for Lamb County. The order changed the date to May 24 from June 1. Mrs . Wade also became RedCross Representative at the same time.

At the bid letting, the last week in April, eight contractors submitted bids ranging from the low of \$462,199 to a high of \$497,800.

Bids ran in this manner: White and Everett, \$463,700; H.C. Lewis, \$463, 875; Manhattan Construction, \$467,000; H. R. Bundock, \$472,600; Claude Martin and Sons, \$479,000; R. G. Farrell, \$479,974; Rose Construction, \$497,800. Only \$1581 separated the first and second bid, while the second and third place bids were separated by only \$175.
