

The new locker plant is located

Latest Food Preserving Method Visitors Saturday will be conducted through the plant and every phase of the operation of the business and the service offered, will be explained, Earl Hobbs, manager, announced. Cold drinks will be served.

The new locker plant offers the latest and most modern facilities for the preserving and storage of all kinds of meats, fruits and vegetables. Many plants similar to that erected in Littlefield have been built throughout the country. One of the chief functions of freezing food is to provide an all year around balanced diet.

The Littlefield plant has facilities for 400 lockers with an average capacity of 300 pounds of package meat.

Butcher Is Employed All meat brought to the plant will be chilled, prepared in cuts desired by locker patrons, wrapped, frozen and stored. Facilities for [grinding meat also will be available. Patrons wishing animals slaughtered can make arrangements with the management for this ser-

John Standifer, who has about 15 years experience as a meat cutter, has been employed in that capacity at the new locker plant. He came to Littlefield from Lockney about four years ago, and has been employed in Littlefield markets. He is vice-president of the southern half of the Lamb County Singing Convention and is a mem-ber of the Littlefield Quartet.
