

CUNNING PROWLER TERRORIZING FARM WOMEN

Cunning and slippery prowler who specializes in entering farm women's bedrooms at night has been reported to have been seen in Littlefield. The prowler is a "good size man" who is seen on one occasion wearing a plaid shirt. The man, seen by at least four persons, was described as a "tall, large white man with long blond or light brown hair." He was seen on one occasion wearing a plaid shirt. The prowler reportedly entered the bedrooms of three women in area. The unharmed women said their screams drove him away. Apparently timid, the man has retreated at the slightest opposition from his intended victims.

The prowler keeps close tab on the homelife of the area. He knows when the husband will be out irrigating his crop and is believed to study each intrusion in detail before entering a home. On one occasion, when the husband left with a flashlight, the prowler approached with a flashlight, thus giving the farmer's wife inside the house no cause for alarm. Reports of peeping toms in the area began as far back as July 4th, but the first known entrance into a bedroom was on August 12th. That night, the prowler entered two homes and was chased from a third when he was frightened away by a woman who got up to turn off the water of her air conditioner. The next night he was seen when a farmer got up to get a drink of water. The farmer got his gun and shot at him, but the prowler ran off into the darkness. 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Hum---Second Primary Is Saturday

Weather in August will go out like the man Sun isn't up to it, then the odds are even better that voters will get foot it to the polls in Saturday's second primary like they did in the July vote. The absence of absentee voting, with less than 10 percent cast at the Tuesday deadline, shows that the interest probably will be light. The only county race is in precinct one, where Ford Lain competes with Incumbent Don Bryant for the county commissioner post. About all you can say for the other three races on the ballot—Sides against Bodkin in the Olton precinct, Ben Ramsey against nobody for the Lt. Governor spot, and Will Wilson against Tom Moore for Attorney General—is this: The polls will be open Saturday from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m.

Voters Keep Meters, Establish Civic Board

Littlefield voters shouted their approval of both parking meters and the creation of a Board of Civic Development Tuesday in a special election. In one of the heaviest turnouts on record here for a special election, citizens proved controversial parking meters aren't so controversial after all and spanked a bid to have them removed by a 400-144 count. The score was almost the same story with the Board of Civic Development, as voters gave its creation a wide margin of approval 346-196.

Court Sets September 22 For Election

County commissioner Monday ordered a \$275,000 road bond election for Road District 1-A of Lamb County and set the balloting date for Saturday Sept. 22. The action came after a hearing on a petition for the election and swung the gates wide for voters to say whether they approve the issuance of bonds to purchase right-of-way for widening Highway 84 to four lanes. Under the proposal, highway 84 would be widened to a four-lane divided highway from the Hockley County line to a point 4 miles northwest of Littlefield. One of the first questions put to commissioners in the hearing was on federal aid which states may get on future secondary highways. Highways 84 and 70 in Lamb County fall into this category. County Judge Bob Kirk explained that while the state will cooperate on local projects not already started, those counties with right-of-way get new roads first. Kirk pointed out that "if we wait on matching money it may be five years" before the county can get new roads. Bill Carter of Yellowhouse asked the court how it "could ask Littlefield voters to vote on an issue when they don't know where the road will go?" "It's a matter of Littlefield voters asking for an election—we were presented a petition," Kirk replied. "Our primary concern is safety—not where the road is going," Bob Manley declared. Devising into the problem of financing the project if the bonds are voted, the court said that the present rate for Road District 1-A would be raised from 80 cents to 92 and one-half cents on the \$100 valuation for the first five years. Then the rate could be cut to 50 cents since present bonds on Highway 84 would be paid by that time. In the future, plans call for the widening of the highway all across the road district. The district takes in most of the southeast quarter of the county including Littlefield and Spade, but excluding Amherst, Sudan and Fieldton.

By Keeping Customer Happy Merchants Hear Plan To Keep Sales At Home

The way to keep Lamb County dollars at home is to please the customer. So said representatives of the Sales Organization of Denver, Colo., Tuesday morning at a breakfast at Thornton's Cafeteria. Some 25 local businessmen heard a plan designed to boost selling on the retail level and keep local customers happy with local business. Two representatives of the Dean organization, William C. Wood, Jr., and Hudson Powell, told the group that they can boost retail sales here by teaching their clerks how to please the customer and offer better service. The representatives advocated a city-wide personnel training program for a year and a half—and they said it would cost no more than a cup of coffee a day for each employee during this period. Businesses can be bettered in only three ways, they said. They are: 1. Advertise more to bring more people into a store. 2. Provide more window display to attract more customers into a store. 3. Sell more to the people who already patronize the store. The representatives said that their program had solved salesmanship problems for about 60 towns and cities below 100,000 population in the western part of the country. They blamed unsatisfactory salesmanship for a third of the customers lost by businesses. The program was described as a "teamwork" plan designed to get the town working to get and keep sales which now go to Lubbock and other surrounding cities. Chamber of Commerce Manager Jess Everett said Wednesday morning that Wood and Hudson will be in town all day today to talk with merchants about the plan. Merchants wishing to contact the representatives should call Everett at 172, he said.

Plans Underway Wednesday to Get Board Organized as Soon as Possible

Plans were underway Wednesday to get the board organized as soon as possible. A nominating committee composed of president or commanders of the Lions, Rotary, American Legion Veterans of Foreign Wars, Jaycees, the Chamber of Commerce and the Industrial Committee will submit 18 names to the city. The top budget the board could receive under law is five cents per \$100 valuation—approximately \$2500 a year under present rates. Members will serve in a non-pay status.

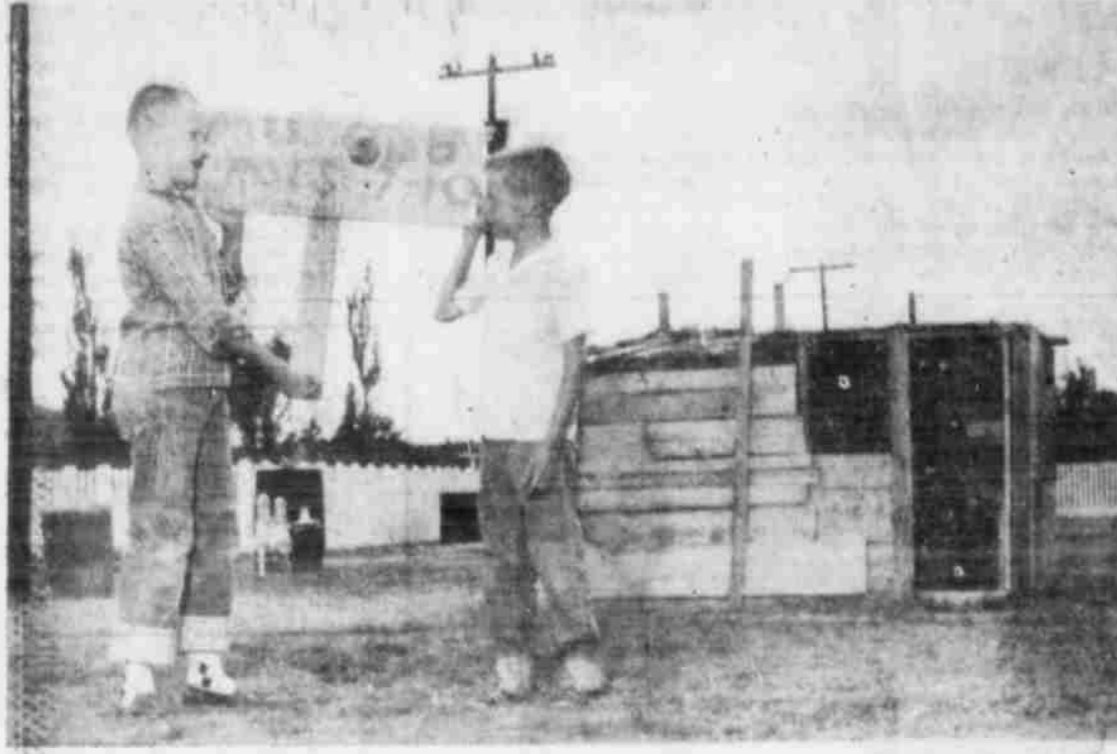

Telephone service, increasing year to year, is described by Blanton as "most dependable, efficient and economical." In 1930, there were 272 telephones in Littlefield—today there are about 2100. The prediction for 1981 is 3,407.

He lists other Littlefield advantages, among them industrial sites, adequate potential labor supply, adequate and efficient transportation facilities, availability of raw materials, and favorable marketing potentialities.

Other than agricultural resources, he lists oil and gas, sand and gravel, caliche, drilling clay, limestone and other natural resources in Lamb County.

Latest count on the San Andres Oil Field is 40 producing wells, according to Blanton, who estimates that they produce about 50,000 barrels per month.

(Continued from Page 1) of a neighboring farm home. On that occasion, the man stole a pair of gloves. That, however, is the only reported theft in his two-week spree.

Alarmed farmers along Oklahoma Avenue have apparently forced the prowler to start looking elsewhere for his break-ins. This past Saturday night, he was reported in the Bainer area, where one farm family said someone had trampled their flowerbeds in an effort to get inside their tightly locked house Sunday night.

The same prowler was seen in the Spade area and chased away by a farmer.

Scattered reports do not actually pin the events down to one man. There may be two of them working together, according to women in the area. It is believed that an old pickup truck seen in the area about the time of many of the incidents may have a connection with the man, or men.

Sheriff Dick Dyer, interviewed Wednesday morning, said his department is making every possible effort to patrol the area at night.

He said he is depending on quick cooperation from farmers in the area when they see a prowler. He asked that they call his office immediately when the man is seen.

The sheriff said that, although some semblance of a pattern had been established by the prowler, no definite clues as to his description or mode of transportation had yet been nailed down.

Meanwhile, he cautioned the people in the area to be "on guard."

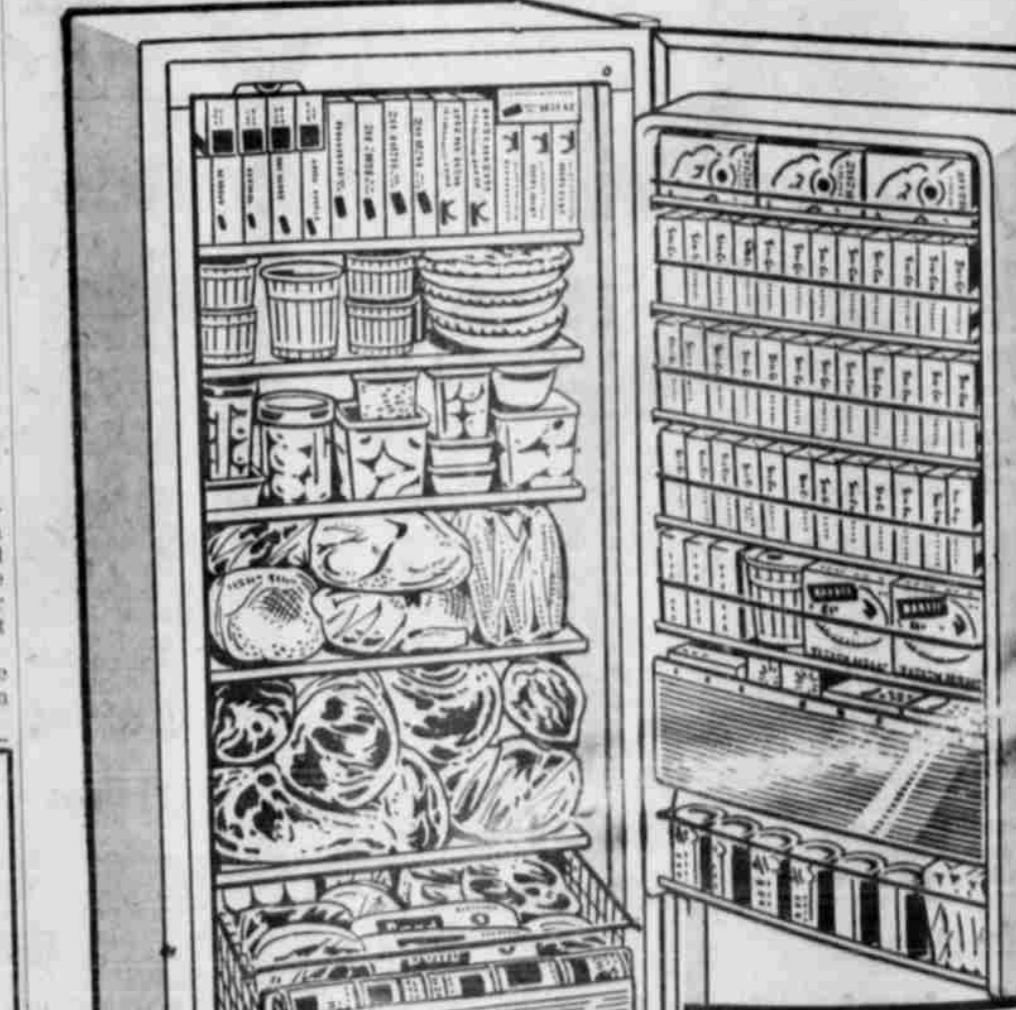

To THE PEOPLE OF LAMB COUNTY

We, as temporary members of the Board of Directors of the proposed Lamb County Water Control and Improvement District Number One, hereby wish to convey to you some of the facts pertaining to the establishment of the proposed district.

As most of you know Water is becoming the number one problem, not only in the State of Texas, but also in the Nation. Our State now ranks 2nd in irrigation, behind California, and 3rd in industry, behind Ohio and Pennsylvania. Since water is playing such an important factor in the economy of the State, certainly all of us should be aware of its importance here in Lamb County.

To Purchase Water Rights

Within the proposed water district we have verbal commitments on some 24,000 acres of sandhill land of which the district can purchase the water rights. These water rights would belong to the District outright, from now on, and not for a term of years, as some of you have heard. These hydrologists, these lands have approximately 855,000 acre feet of water. It is a common saying that one acre feet of water will produce one bale of cotton, so we are getting water rights enough to produce 855,000 bales of cotton.

Another line of thinking we have heard is that if need be, larger municipalities could come in and condemn our water and take it. This is not true as the statute we are establishing the district under cities and towns within the boundaries of the district, but of course they must pay for the water used. 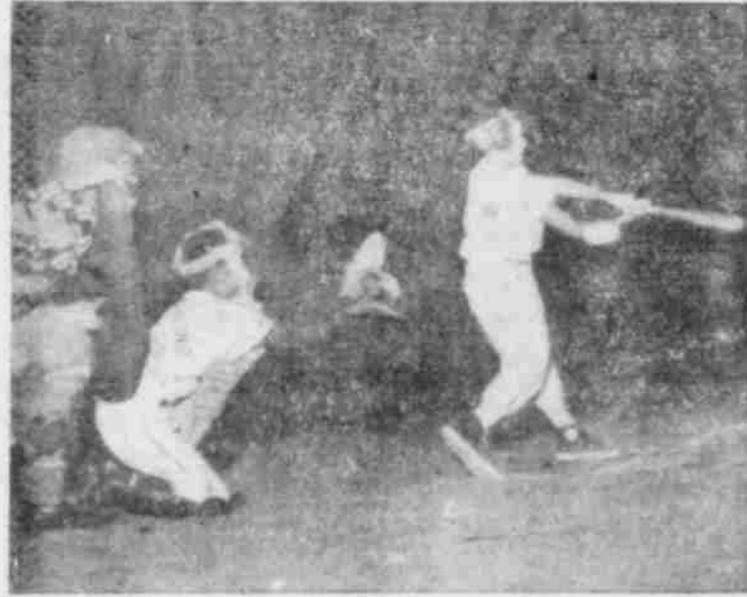

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My Opinion On Little League Baseball

Now that the Little League season is over for 1956, let's look back over the past three months and see what we have accomplished for the youth of Littlefield.

It's hard to realize that only three months ago there was no Little League park in Littlefield, only five teams to play in a league that had no officers and very few wanting to coach the teams.

At first it looked like there were going to be no boys left on the farm team as there were not enough to take care of so many boys. But without giving them, three Littlefield merchants jumped into the fray, bought new uniforms and equipment and furnished managers to coach three more teams and an eighth was organized. These teams took the boys that had experience in Little League ball because the others were ordered by Little League rules to keep the boys that they had had the year before on their roster. One of these teams fought their way into the playoffs and one was not out of the running until the last game of the season.

It was hard to find a president and a group of officers who would donate their time to head the Little League. Finally, after much discussion, W. A. Sullins as president, L. A. Sullins as secretary, L. V. Perry as treasurer and Charlie Duval as treasurer. Only Perry had helped out in the Little League before this and these five men have done more than their share in the new park up and getting it paid for.

The new park was what the League was after when they got it with the help of the entire city of Littlefield. At first, there were no finances, then the League upon the idea of selling Little League membership cards for a dollar each to finance the project. Almost \$1000 had been raised before by parents sending in a few dollars to the cause. What originally started the park, money from parents, boys in the Little League. The amount was far from what something had to be started before the town merchants would know about it. As soon as the first dug at the site, help rolled to the diamond by the city. Every day you would see some loyal fan at the site on one of the projects. The Jaycees plowed up the grass to going and fixed the lights. The VFW was in charge of building one dugout and the Lions and WOW was put in charge of erecting a fence and was responsible for the stands.

These five organizations alone could not have built a park but the fans and parents were there to help. Businessmen and carpenters rolled to the diamond after their regular working hours to help out. Some of the fathers of boys from Whitharrel made a special trip to see they were there to help.

No one person can take the credit for the Little League park or any organization can say that they gave it. It took people, hundreds of people, and the donation of money from merchants in Littlefield. One boy worked on the project off and on when he had spare time. More than 500 different people must have helped with the labor problem. These people asked for no pay but if they are ever in doubt that it was worth the effort let them ask one of the boys playing in the League to play a game. The grin across the faces of more boys playing in the Little League is the best pay I can think of or ever want.

Now let's get to the job of umpiring these games. The season first got underway, Jack Christian was put in as the umpire, told to instruct them on Little League rules and make sure that there were enough umpires at the games. This system worked out fine for awhile until some umpires moved away or their job, business or school kept them away from the games. At the games, some were picked out of the crowd if no officials were present. Some umpires as many as six or seven games a week. They were paid for their services, just a pat on the back sometimes, words of encouragement. Did you ever think what a ball game would be like if there were no umpires? Think of this the next time you get mad at a boy and you may not say something that you are later regretting you did.

And then last, and probably the least, cog in the wheel that makes Little League baseball work is the boy who donate most of their spare time to helping the league. As long as a coach of a team is in the greatest in the eyes of parents of the boys, he will lose and you turn into the poorest coach that ever coached a baseball field.

As a coach myself, I know all the coaches in the League have done a wonderful job this season, who ended up on top of the standings or on the bottom. Their job to teach kids baseball and better sportsmen is not patting myself on the back, just trying to help other men a pat on the back for a job well done. Little League baseball provides a place for all boys in the city of Littlefield to spend practically all summer playing baseball regardless of race, religion or color. That has made America the great land that it is.

This year the colored boys were allowed to play on different teams, and the boys proved that they were good ball players. Their parents and friends from the farm part of the stands at almost every game to show of encouragement to them and they have proven themselves most satisfied of all the "back of the screen" umpires. The main thing that I am trying to point out is that Little League has come a long way in the few years that it has been in Littlefield and should go even further. We have a lot that has been paid for, down to the last penny, and these businessmen and parents are going to see that it is continued in Littlefield.

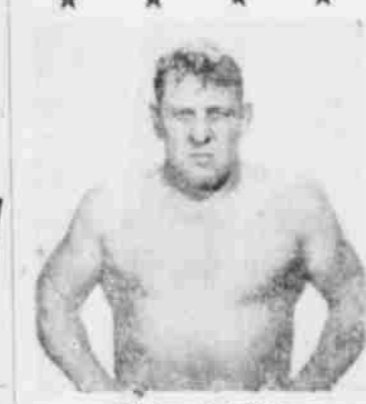
Wrestling Card

Plains Water Table Drops

A discussion of the Plains water supply is given in the article "Plains Water Table Dropping" in the September issue of The Progressive Farmer magazine.

An extension service survey covering the period 1950-54 has been made in the counties of Lynn, Terry, Crosby, Lubbock, Bailey, Hockley, Lamb, Hale, Floyd, and the southern third of Swisher, Cass, and Parmer counties. In this area where more than 880 percent of the irrigated acreage is located, the following information was learned:

1. Number of irrigation wells increased from 14,000 to 27,500.
2. Irrigated acreage rose from 1,600,000 to 3,500,000.
3. Ground water use rose from 1,600,000 acre-feet to 5,200,000.
4. Water level dropped an average of 18 feet.
5. Acreage per well dropped 30 percent.

The rapid increase in number of wells has not only caused a decline in water levels but has also changed pumping life, well performance and operating cost.

The 1954 average water cost per acre more than doubled the 1947 average. Increased hours of pump operation, increased investment and a decrease in the acres irrigated per well combined to raise water costs.

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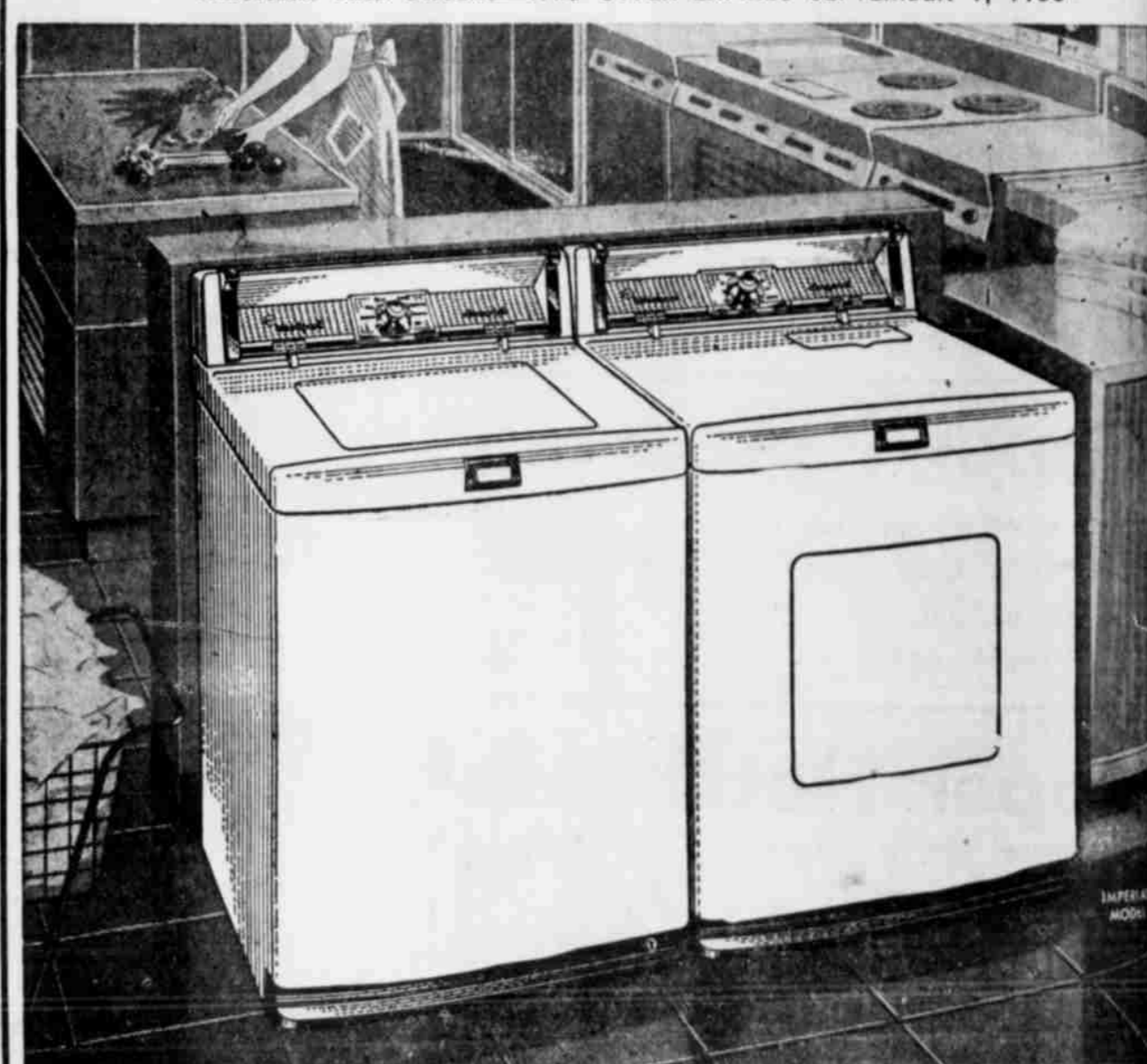

Highlights and Sidelights From Your State Capital

AUSTIN—Campaign headquarters of Price Daniel, Ralph Yarborough and Will Wilson, have been beehives of activity.

Daniel and Yarborough have gone all out to win the Democratic nomination for Governor of Texas.

Wilson has campaigned even harder than he did in the primary, in order to increase his lead in the Attorney General's race.

But withering Texas heat has sapped campaign enthusiasm among the voters. Interest that developed in the July Primary has dwindled considerably.

Last month brought the largest primary vote in Texas history—1,576,870 in the Governor's race. However, if the second primary vote beats that of two years ago it will surprise everyone.

Nevertheless the conservatives and the liberals are working for a big voter turnout on Saturday.

DELEGATES RETURN HOME
Weary Texas delegates to the Democratic National Convention have returned home to face still bigger tasks.

Their goals: (1) to win unduped party control at the Sept. 11 state convention and (2) to swing Texas back to the Democratic column in November.

In both efforts they will have the guidance of two of the party's most influential leaders—U. S. Senator Lyndon Johnson and House Speaker Sam Rayburn.

Hopes are based on the mild civil rights platform plank adopted at the Chicago convention. Both Johnson and Rayburn are credited with significant roles in gaining this "moderate" victory.

Many of the Texas delegates say they will have a hard time selling the Stevenson-Kefauver ticket in this state. There is considerable muttering about the prospects of victory in November. And Former President Harry Truman's cracks at Stevenson didn't help a bit.

DROUGHT AID PROGRAM LAUNCHED

Federal and state machinery are grinding out a three-phase drought aid program for Texas farmers and ranchers.

Action came as mounting disaster conditions caused federal officials to release "one of the bleakest crop and cattle situation reports in 22 years."

Present plans would provide (1) certificates good for \$1.50 per hundredweight toward feed grain purchases, (2) certificates for \$7.50 per ton to buy roughage and (3) Farmers Home Administration loans to refinance debts on family size farms.

Initial details were worked out at an Austin conference of U. S. Dept. of Agriculture officials, Gov. Allan Shivers, Agriculture Comm. John White and the Texas Emergency Drought Committee.

USDA is providing \$1 million to finance the roughage program. Gov. Shivers has allocated \$100,000 from his emergency funds for administrative operations.

Texas reaction to the federal offers ranged from "fairly satisfactory" from Gov. Shivers to "too little and too late" from some South Texas farmers.

USDA's weekly report on Texas agricultural conditions termed the drought "one of the most severe on record." It reported pasturage conditions "lowest since 1934" and feed crops "very short" over most of the state.

RESERVOIRS DROP
Water in Texas' major reservoirs was down 20 per cent during July, from 1955. Average storage was 51 per cent of capacity.

As evidence of "critical conditions" the State Board of Water Engineers' monthly report cited these further statistics: (1) July rainfall was less than half of normal, (2) Observation wells continued to decline to all-time lows in five areas of South Central and West Texas, (3) Dwindling streamflows and decreasing storage resulted in water rationing in many cities in all areas.

MORE SAFETY AIDS ASKED
Next year's Legislature may be asked to double the present 470-man state highway patrol.

Such an increase was urged by Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Department of Public Safety, in a talk before the Texas Safety Association Women's Conference.

Cost of safety precautions is cheap compared to accident costs, said Garrison. Property loss alone has exceeded \$1.5 billion in the past 20 years.

A legislative program being pushed by the Association includes (1) More patrolmen, (2) county-wide traffic courts, (3) state financed driver education, (4) prohibiting sale of fireworks, (5) chemical tests for drunken drivers and (6) laws to punish juvenile traffic offenders.

BIGGER HIGHWAY PROGRAM STARTED

Expanded highway building under the new federal program is off to a fast start in Texas.

In the first tabulation since U. S. aid bill passage, the State Highway Commission received low bids totaling a whopping \$18,494,446. Of

this, some \$5,847,678 was represented by six bids for improvement of federal interstate routes.

SHORT SHORTS

Contracts awarded in Texas during July soared to \$86,021,020, highest point since July 1952.

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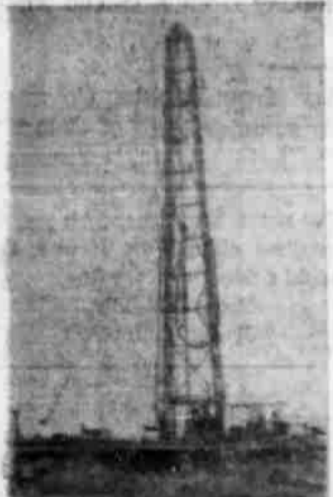

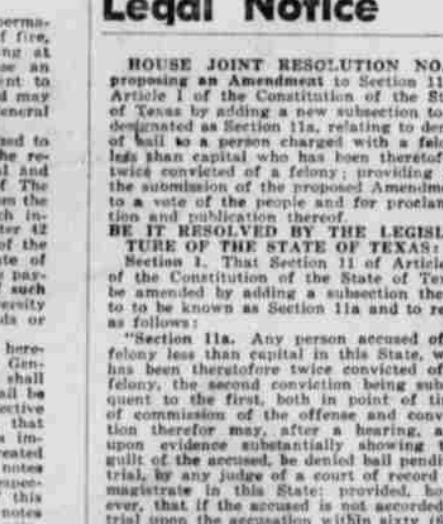
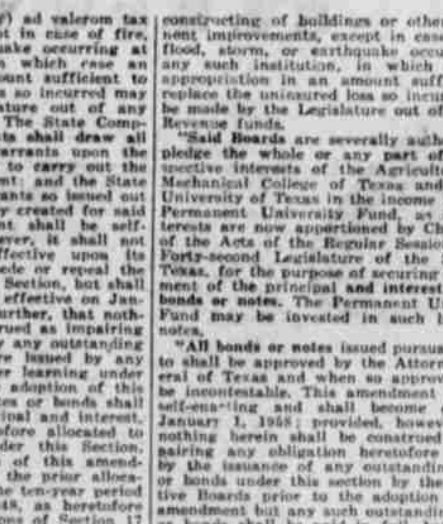

Social Security Representative To Explain Benefits

Monthly benefits for women at age 62 beginning with the month of November 1956 were made available under the old-age and survivors insurance program when the 1956 amendments were signed into law according to John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock district office of the Social Security Administration.

Under the amended law, according to Hutton, women who qualify for benefits as widows of insured deceased wage earners will receive the full benefit of 3-4 of the amount of their deceased husband's benefits. The change in the law merely lowers the age for eligibility to age 62.

Wives of insured workers and women who are entitled in their own right to benefits at age 62 (but not before November 1956) but who elect the benefits at age 62 will be reduced to 75% of the normal benefit, and women workers who elect the benefits at age 62 will be reduced to 80% of the normal benefit. Election at some time after age 62 will involve a deduction proportionate to the time involved before age 65. For instance, election of a wife to draw benefits at age 64 would involve a reduction of 78 1/3%. Once an election has been made, it continues permanently.

It is not possible for a wife who is insured on her own to elect to receive benefits a none record (say her own) and preserve the amount she would receive on her husband's record until age 65. An election on one becomes an election for both.
