#### **A NEW DISTRICT TO RELIEVE DOCKE**<sup>1</sup> OF LAMB COUNTY

Approval inst week by Governor Moody of a bill creating the 110th Judicial district composed of Floyd. Briscoe, Motley and Dickens counties, will mean much relief to the 64th Judicial district in which Lamb councy is located.

Kenneth Bain and A. J. Folley. both of Floydada, were appointed judge and district attorney, respectively, by the Governor.

The new district takes from the 64th district the counties of Briscoe and Floyd, thus permitting in this district three terms of three weeks each of district court.

The first term has been called for February 25th, and, according to County Attorney T. Wade Potter, there will be a heavy docket confronting Judge Charles Clements at that time.

The second term of this year has been set for August 5th, and the third term will be called about the middle of December.

The new district became advisable because of the rapidly increasing legal matters needing adjudication in this growing section of West Texas.

"For a good fit, there should be barely room for the flat hand to pass and, similarly, for the finger tops at

the side of the neck just above the termediate grades enjoyed parties on shoulder points. A short collar chokes the horse when pulling, while a collar which is too long bruises the shoulder points and chafes the neck at the

withers. The narrow colar will pinch the neck and a wide collar brings pressure and irritation on the sides of the shoulders. Sweat pads are merely makeshifts to get by with or overcome a temporary bad condition. They may make a collar fit, but if not properly cared for will make sore shoulders. It is best for each horse to have and always wear its own collar, and if a new collar is fitted in the spring, make allowance for surplus flosh and excess hair.
