IT'S THE LAW

Probably most of the contracts in force today are merely spoken agreements. Many contracts are created by informal letters written by persons to one another. Many are made over the telephone, as when you call up a store and they agree to deliver some goods you order. your fellow man as great a service as yourself. A great many cold sufferers take the attitude, "I don't feel as bad if I can keep my mind off my cold while working." They are self-appointed martyrs - and everyone who catches their colds harbors no love for them.

What about "catching a fresh" cold? One doctor believes there's a grain of truth in this expression. Not only that, but the so-called fresh cold may be the first sign of a serious complication, rather than of a brand-new cold.

Besides resting in bed and keeping warm when you have a cold, you should add to your regular diet plenty of fruit juices and water. Meals should be simple, nourishing, and easily digested, and with a sore throat soft or liquid foods may be preferred. Your doctor will be glad to prescribe medicine to relieve your stuffy nose or sore throat and he will be on the lookout for serious complications.

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



This is a daily scene at the rallroad's South Louisville shops, where for a half century the shopmen have enjoyed religion with their lunch.

Noon worship is held in various places at the yards, and the men know in advance where they are to gather

At a recent service the blacksmiths followed the cue of the factory-type whistle, left their machines and filed 100-strong into the washroom. They found seats on steps, wash basins, pipes or on the floor. The tiny organ was carted in -past rows of locomotive parts, anvils and pneumatic hammers.

W. K. Fries, a shopman who has been playing for the services about 20 years, opened the worship hour by singing "Take Time to be Holy," accompanied by the little organ He was joined by the guest minister, the Rev. J. David Pitts, Church of God pastor, and B. C. McMurray of the Railroad Y. M. C. A.





The trees are moved from the proceeding line into cold storage warehouses. During the shipping season, which started this year on Nov. 10, the trees are moved directly into freight cars.

As many as 18 freight cars, each holding 7,500 trees, leave the plant daily during the peak of the shipping season.



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
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
