

Boll Weevil Control Program A Success

All entomologists on the Technical Advisory Committee of the massive diapause boll weevil control program co-ordinated since 1964 by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., continue to agree that the program has been highly successful. Westward migration of the pest has been stopped. And the two years of spraying have reduced over-wintering weevils to an average of about five per acre, and the 1966 spray operation is expect-ed to cut the overwintering population to less than an average

of one weevil per acre. This information is not new to those close to the control program, but it was reiterated in Lubbock April 14 when the technical advisory group, made up mostly of entomologists, met the program's areawide and steering committees, composed of cotton producers on the Plains. And a bona fide success story is always good to

hear, even for the second time.
The group also discussed the 1966 spraying operation, but postponed making firm decisions pending answers to several questions. First, they will need to know the distribution of those few remaining weevils over the control zone. This will determine the acreage it will be

necessary to spray. Second, it is still not known how much of the cotton in the control zone will be planted to the various skip-row patterns. For instance, with aerial application being the only practical spray method, cotton planted two-in, four-out will require three times as much ground to (See BOLL WEEVIL P-9)
