### School Board Lists Names Of Committee

Sixteen teachers were appointed to Text Book Committee at the regular meeting of the school board Monday night. Members will make recommendations for the adoption of 15 textbooks to be used during the next five years. Presentation of the group's selection will be made at the March meeting of the school board. "Anyone wishing to examine these text books may contact my office," Superintendent Glenn Reeves said Tuesday. He listed the following areas in which books will be adopted: Vocal Music, grades four and five; Texas history, grade seven; algebra one and two, high school; plain geometry, high school; Spanish, one and two, high school; homemaking, high school; industrial arts, seven through 12; general shop, electricity and electronics, high school; industrial crafts, metal working and power mechanics.

### Cotton Trailer Overturns on 84

A cotton trailer being pulled by a Dodge station wagon driven by Mrs. Leo Ham of Anton turned over two miles west of Littlefield on Highway 84. A blowout on the trailer was reported to have caused the accident. Mrs. Goldie Lorene Massingill of Muleshoe, approaching the car and trailer at the time of the accident, drove her 1953 Packard into the bar ditch to prevent hitting the overturned trailer. An estimated \$300 damage was done to the Ham car, and approximately \$50 in damage to the Massingill car.

### Govt Increases Grain Support

Coming almost on the heels of an announced cut of a cotton acreage of more than 10 per cent in permitted cotton planted acreage in 1963, is a partially compensating announcement by Dept. of Agriculture this week of a 9¢ per hundred increase in support price for grain sorghum, effective for next year's production.

While the cut for cotton measures more dollar loss, than the grain sorghum price means increase, it does go a long way in softening the impact which the announced cotton acreage cut generated in this, one of the top-ranking cotton producing counties of the nation.

Not only did Secretary Freeman announce a 9-cent increase in support price for next year, but the average of farm program participants was brought back into the loan program, after an absence for the past two years, which serves to further up, both the gross and net income from grain sorghum.

Texas counties are the heaviest producers of grain sorghum in the nation, and the increase is vital to the economy of the entire state. In turn the counties of the High Plains are the major sorghum producers of Texas, which means a lion's share of the announced increase area-wide.

The announcement by the secretary specifically raises the Loan and Purchase Average Support Price from \$1.62 to \$1.71 per cwt; the total support price from \$1.91 to \$2.00 per hundred.

Lamb county's 1962 grain sorghum production income will total about \$16,000,000, estimated as high as \$16,500,000. The new price support increase will up this figure more than \$1,000,000, and could make the county total worth as much as \$18,000,000.

The 1963 feed grain sorghum program differs from the 1961-62 program primarily because of an additional 18-cent payment in kind as a result of the new price support figure. The increase is accomplished through higher loan and purchase agreement rate, with no change of payment in kind.

The 1962 crop brought an increase of approximately \$300,000 in income compared with 1961 for this county. This was produced on about 185,000 acres. In 1963 the acreage is expected to rise to about 195,000 plus an approximate 20 per cent in laid-out land.

### Two Arrested On Liquor Law

Alfred J. Johnson was arrested for liquor law violations Friday. He was released immediately under a \$1000 bond. Marie Noe of Littlefield was arrested Sunday for violation of the liquor law. Mrs. Noe pled guilty and was fined \$133.55. Curlie Landrum of Sudan was also picked up by the sheriff's department on violation of the liquor law. Landrum pled guilty on two cases. Fine was set at \$269.50.

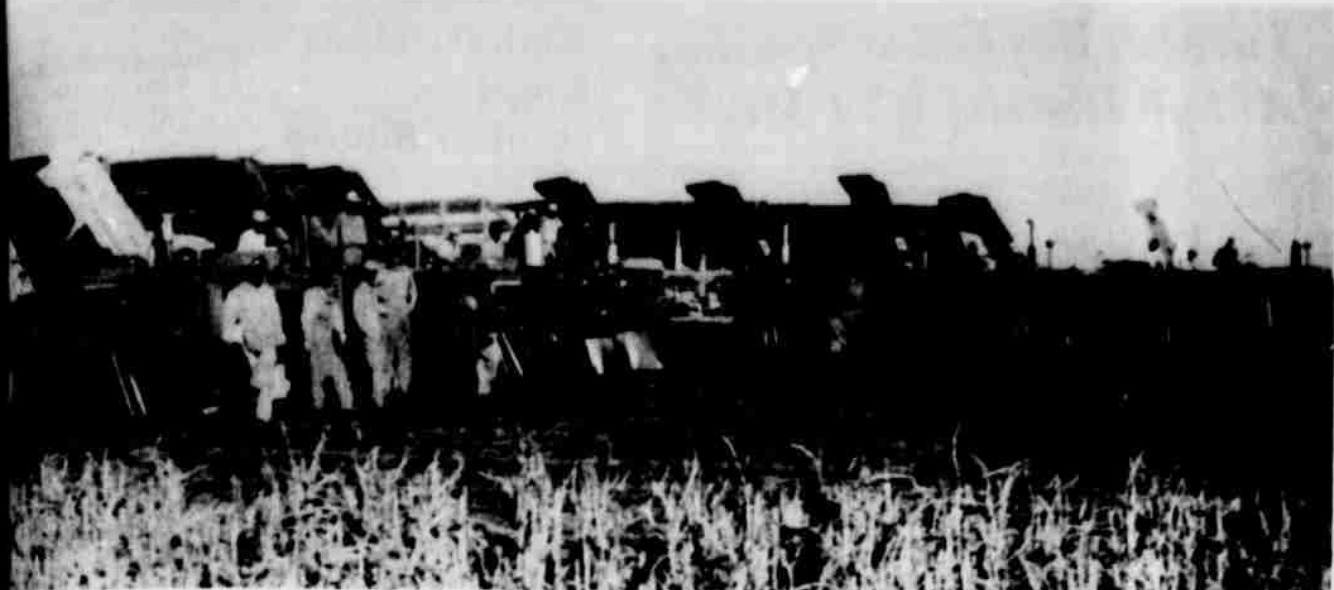

### LEMON FRUIT CAKE

CUPCAKES  
1 cup butter or margarine  
1 cup sugar  
3 eggs  
2 1/4 cup sifted all-purpose flour  
2 1/2 teas. baking powder  
1 teas. salt  
1 teas. cinnamon  
1/2 teas. nutmeg  
1/3 cup bottled lemon juice

1/2 cup sour cream  
1 1/2 pkg. candied fruitcake mix  
1 cup raisins  
1 cup dates  
1/2 cup candied cherries  
1/2 cup chopped candied pineapple  
2 cuts chopped pecans  
Cream together butter and sugar, add eggs one at a time beating well. Sift together dry ingredients and add to creamed mixture together with bottled lemon juice. Beat well and stir in sour cream. Add fruit and nuts to mixture beating thoroughly.

Place paper liners in muffin tins and put a rounded tablespoon of the mixture into each tin. Place one cherry in center of each.

Bake in 350 degree oven for 25 minutes.  
When cool pour syrup made of 1/4 cup bottled lemon juice and 3 tablespoons sugar heated to dissolve, over the cupcakes.

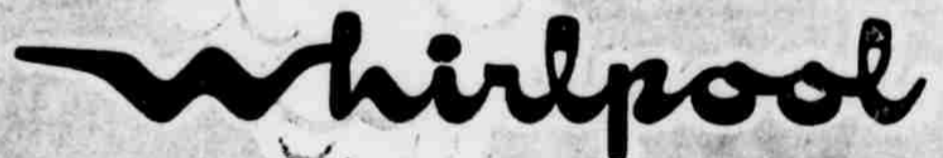

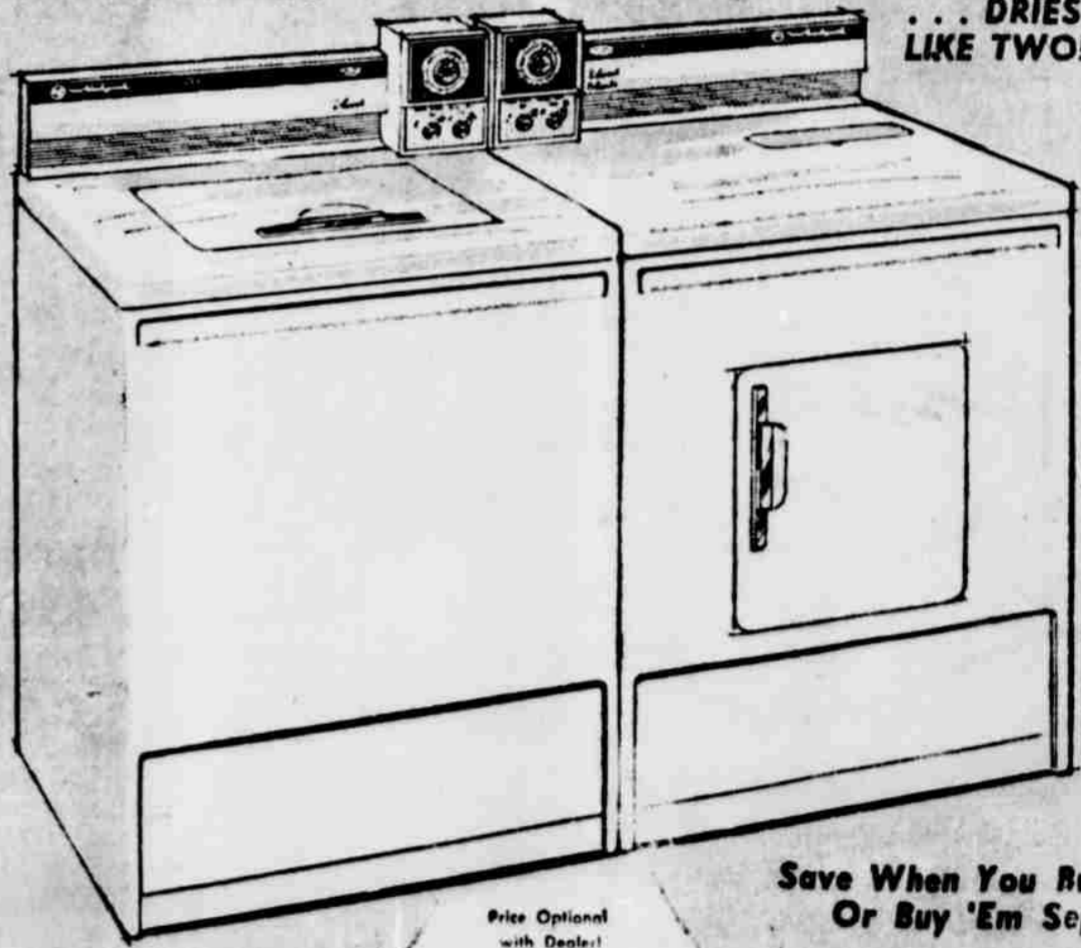

# Historians Hear of Settling Olton

The story of the settling of Olton was told in a colorful manner by Mrs. E. N. Burrus when the Lamb County Historical Survey Committee met at 12:30 Friday at the Olton School cafeteria.

Mrs. Burrus, wife of the late Judge E. N. Burrus, second county judge of Lamb County, spoke of her personal experience in the early days.

Attired in a black crepe dress with a small matching hat and a pink rose corsage that com-

plimented her neatly - set gray hair, began, "We came in 1899, when most of the land lay in a 350,000 acre grant. The state almost scraped the barrel. There was a small amount of land in what is now the north-east corner of Lamb County. It was for railroads and state schools."

"The school land did not come on the market until 1899," she continued.

"We came in on our own. The land sold for \$1.00 per acre, at three percent interest,

payable in 40 years. We were required to make settlement and maintain residence for three years, and improve the land. We could sell the land before the end of the three years if the buyer would take up the obligation. Settlers were given a leave of absence three months at a time to go elsewhere to work."

"Much of that land was bought by the cowboys. They were cattlemen and did not want the settlers, who were settling on every other section. They did everything to keep us out, but we went ahead."

"The county would have not been organized without the breaking up of the ranches. We wanted the best for ourselves, and our families. We did not expect anything from anyone."

"I cooked for more cowboys than they for me or mine."

Mrs. Burrus, with a look of reminiscence said "We have lost something, our western hospitality, our trust. We trusted each other. A man's word was as good as his oath."

"There were no locks on the doors, no screens on the windows, or doors, and no one was molested."

During a period of questions and answers, Mrs. Burrus was asked if she would like a return of the old days. She replied, "Yes, if I could have those I loved about me, but that isn't possible, and I try to be content with the present times."

Following Mrs. Burrus, Charlie Reynolds who came to Olton with the W. P. Soash Land Company in 1908, spoke briefly of the beginning of the town of Olton, its first church and schools, and of the early settlers arriving in 1909. He also passed pictures of the early days.

Mrs. L. B. Cowart displayed family histories to be compiled into a permanent record.

Elmer Moore, Olton school co-ordinator, talked in behalf of the schools, offering the school facilities in furthering the historical preservation of the county.

Mrs. Roy B. McQuatters, State Chairman of the Texas Heritage Department of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, explained the markers and medallions possible for Lamb County and urged the expedience of placing markers before a new map is published.

Jack Silcott spoke briefly on the organization of the first bank in Olton.

Luncheon was served in the school cafeteria.

The Christmas decorations were unique in that a giant tumble weed, approximately seven feet tall, sprayed with silver,

with varied colored light formed a Christmas tree. This was done by Mrs. Margie Slatten, supervisor of the school lunch room. She stated that at least 18 inches had been cut from the base of the weed.

Following the luncheon, the group went to the First Methodist Church where Mrs. J. F. Gibson presided over the regular monthly meeting.

Every town and community in Lamb County was represented, with 40 in attendance.

The next regular meeting will be held Jan. 4 in the Reddi room of Southwestern Public Service in Littlefield.

The Olton committee of the county organization is composed of Mrs. Walter Schreier, Mrs. Burt Thomas, Mrs. L. B. Cowart, and Mrs. Jim Fuller.

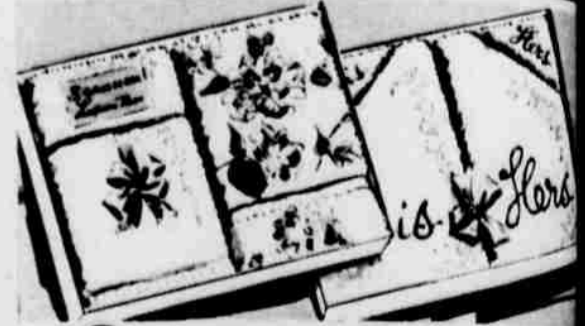

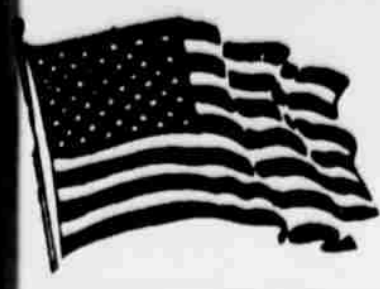

## Govt Increases Grain Support

Coming almost on the heels of an announced cut of a cotton acreage of more than 10 percent in permitted cotton planted acreage in 1963, is a partially compensating announcement by Dept. of Agriculture this week of a 9¢ per hundred increase in support price for grain sorghum, effective for next year's production.

While the cut for cotton measures more dollar loss, than the grain sorghum price means increase, it does go a long way in softening the impact which the announced cotton acreage cut generated in this, one of the top-ranking cotton producing counties of the nation.

Not only did Secretary Freeman announce a 9-cent increase in support price for next year, but the overage of farm program participants was brought back into the loan program, after an absence for the past two years, which serves to further up, both the gross and net income from grain sorghum.

Texas counties are the heaviest producers of grain sorghum in the nation, and the increase is vital to the economy of the entire state. In turn the counties of the High Plains are the major sorghum producers of Texas, which means a lion's share of the announced increase area-wide.

The announcement by the secretary specifically raises the Loan and Purchase Average Support Price from \$1.62 to \$1.71 per cwt; the total support price from \$1.91 to \$2.00 per hundred.

Lamb County's 1962 grain sorghum production income will total about \$16,000,000, estimated as high as \$16,500,000. The new price support increase will up this figure more than \$1,000,000, and could make the county total worth as much as \$18,000,000.

The 1963 feed grain sorghum program differs from the 1961-62 program primarily because of an additional 18-cent payment in kind as a result of the new price support figure. The increase is accomplished through higher loan and purchase agreement rate, with no change of payment in kind.

The 1962 crop brought an increase of approximately \$900,000 in income compared with 1961 for this county. This was produced on about 185,000 acres. In 1963 the acreage is expected to rise to about 195,000 plus an approximate 20 percent in laid-out land.

In holiday language this could mean a Christmas present for Lamb County farmers worth as much as a million and a half dollars.

Curly Landrum of Sudan was also picked up by the sheriff's department on violation of the liquor law. Landrum pled guilty on two cases. Fine was set at \$269.50.

Two persons were charged with driving while intoxicated (first offense). One pled guilty and received a fine of \$182.75. The other was released on a \$1,000 bond.

Two men were arrested for vagrancy, three for drunkenness and one for theft under \$50.
