## Vandals Hit Car Windows

Six incidents of vandals roaming city streets Saturday night and smashing windshields and windows on parked automobiles are under investigation by city police.

In other activity, police reported approximately \$20 was stolen from a juke box in a Tuesday night break-in at the Truck Stop Cafe. Entrance to the building was made by breaking a window on the north side. An estimated \$20 damage was done to the juke box machine.

One traffic accident was investigated by police this week. It occurred Tuesday evening on Herral, south of Seventh, when a pick-up truck driven by Cecil M. Gonzales of Littlefield collided with an automobile driven by Mary Alice Raney, also of Littlefield. No injuries were reported. Damage was estimated at \$85 to the automobile and \$45 to the pick-up truck.

## 3 'Minor' UF Agencies In Big Role

Three participating agencies, including one new addition, in the 1964 Littlefield United Fund, will have small shares in the overall \$19,625 goal but portray giant services in the field of youth, health and welfare assistance.

The three are the Texas United Fund, Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation and Cerebral Palsy.

The advance gifts phase of the UF campaign became the first to swing into activity when that division, headed by Jim Mangum, held a kickoff breakfast for volunteer workers Wednesday morning. First report meeting on advance gifts will be held Tuesday morning.

The Texas United Fund, a consolidation of 11 different worthy groups, has been allotted \$525 from the local UF budget. Included in the Texas United Fund ranks are the USO, United Seaman's Service, Texas Citizens Committee of the National Council on Crime and Delinquency, World Adoption Fund, American Social Hearing Society, Medical Research Foundation of Texas, National Recreation Association, Texas Social Welfare Association, Council on Social Work Education and National Social Welfare Assembly.

## Man Nabbed In Robbery By Assault

A 24-year-old Littlefield man, Marvin Daniels, remained in county jail Wednesday under \$1,000 bond on charges of robbery by assault against another Littlefield man, Homer Wright.

The sheriff's office said Daniels is charged with hitting Wright in the head during an incident north of the city Saturday and taking more than \$400 from the stricken man. Daniels was arrested and charged with the crime after being identified by Wright.

They included Arturo Barrera, 24, of Muleshoe, fined \$225.50 for simple assault; Willie Peroyman, 51, of Bovina, fined \$121.50 for drunkenness and making a false report; Olivia Gonzales, 21, of Spade, fined \$71.50 for vagrancy; and Ewell Roberts, 45, of Abernathy, fined \$89.75 for violation of the check law.

## Lfd's First Mayor Expires In Lubbock

Funeral services for B.L. (Uncle Josh) Cogdill, 72, who had the honor of serving as Littlefield's first mayor, were held Tuesday morning in Lubbock.

Mr. Cogdill, a resident of Lubbock at the time of his death, died early Sunday in a Lubbock hospital.

A native of Thorp Springs, a town southwest of Fort Worth, Mr. Cogdill was a carpenter in his early days and came to Littlefield in 1923 from Post. He managed a lumber company here and in 1924, when the town was incorporated, he was elected mayor in a two-man race, with 71 votes. Commissioners elected in the initial election were J.M. Stokes, M.L. Crockett, A.P. Duggan and W.G. Street.

Mr. Cogdill later moved to Lubbock and was that city's building inspector from 1946 until he retired in 1957.

He was a charter member of the Mackenzie Lodge in Lubbock and a member of the Methodist Church, Knights Templar, Royal Arch and the Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barbershop Quartet Singing in America, Inc.

Survivors include a son, Dr. Jack Cogdill, a professor at Texas Christian University, and four grandchildren.

Interment was made in Resthaven Memorial Park at Lubbock. Members of his family said a memorial fund had been established in his name with the Lubbock United Fund.

## Wildcats Open District Action In San Angelo

Littlefield's Wildcats, with four disastrous pre-district testflights behind them, will be out to start anew Friday when they open their initial campaign in District 3-AAA against San Angelo Lakeview's hot-and-cold Chiefs. Kickoff time in San Angelo, Littlefield's longest road trip in years, is billed for 7:30 p.m.

The game is a must for both clubs. The Wildcats need it to snap their four-game losing skid and to get off with a winning stride in their search for a first complete district championship since 1956. Lakeview needs it if the Chiefs are to stay in the title running. The Chiefs opened their district effort last week and were drubbed by Brownfield, 19-8.

To increase the Wildcats' chore, it will be Lakeview's homecoming. "We're shooting the works in this game, and feel this could

be the breaking point on our season," Coach John Howle said. Despite the four-game losing streak, Howle said morale on the Wildcat squad has been high.

"If we can fire the team with determination, we could have a real good district season," Howle added.

It's the first season for Littlefield in 3-AAA, with Cats having

operated in 1-AAA for the past few seasons. Lakeview is a comparatively new school, being on the scene only since 1956.

Neither team has achieved success in any major degree this season, although the Wildcats displayed signs of arousing their potential muscle in the first half against Denver City in their last outing. The Chiefs have won one, tied one and dropped three in

their five starts while having the poorest defensive record of any team in the seven-school district. They have given up 149 points, an average of 29.8 per game. Littlefield, however, has been able to score only 18 points in four games, while being touched for 86 in return.

As to weight, Lakeview will have the big advantage, if that is to be a factor. Lakeview's line will average 181, anchored by 250-pound center Bobby Smith, to Littlefield's 168. The difference will be even more so in the backfield, where Lakeview's foursome will average 175 to Littlefield's 156.

Offensively, Lakeview has a team geared primarily around the talents of fullback C.L. Avants, an 183-pound senior. Wingback Wayne Cook is another shifty galloper in the Chief's backfield.

With one exception, Lakeview (See WILDCATS, Page 6)

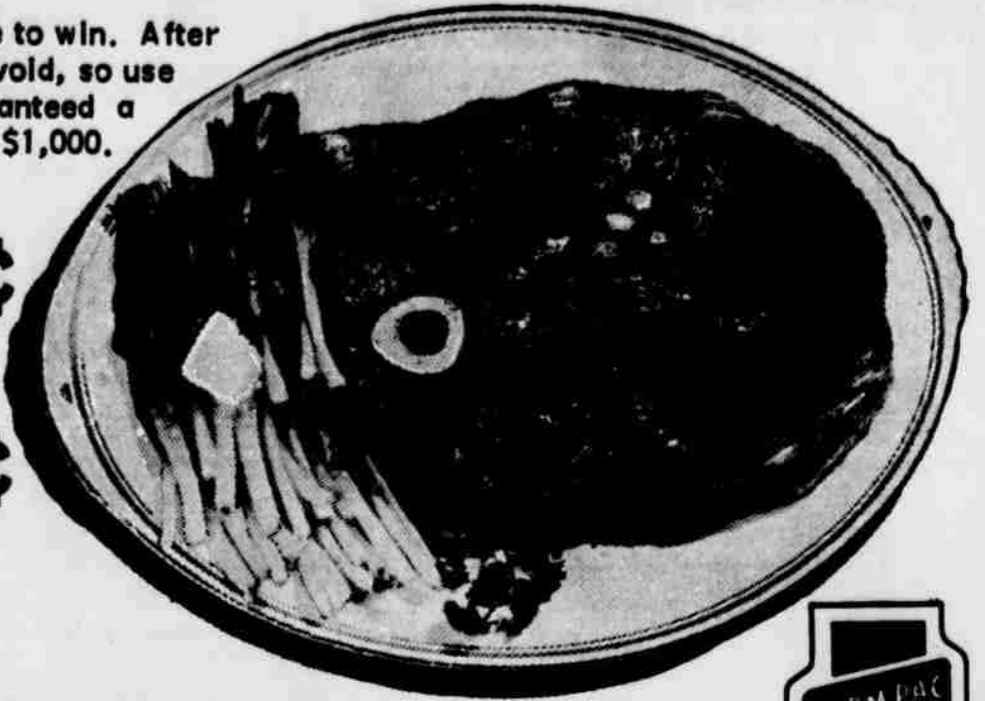

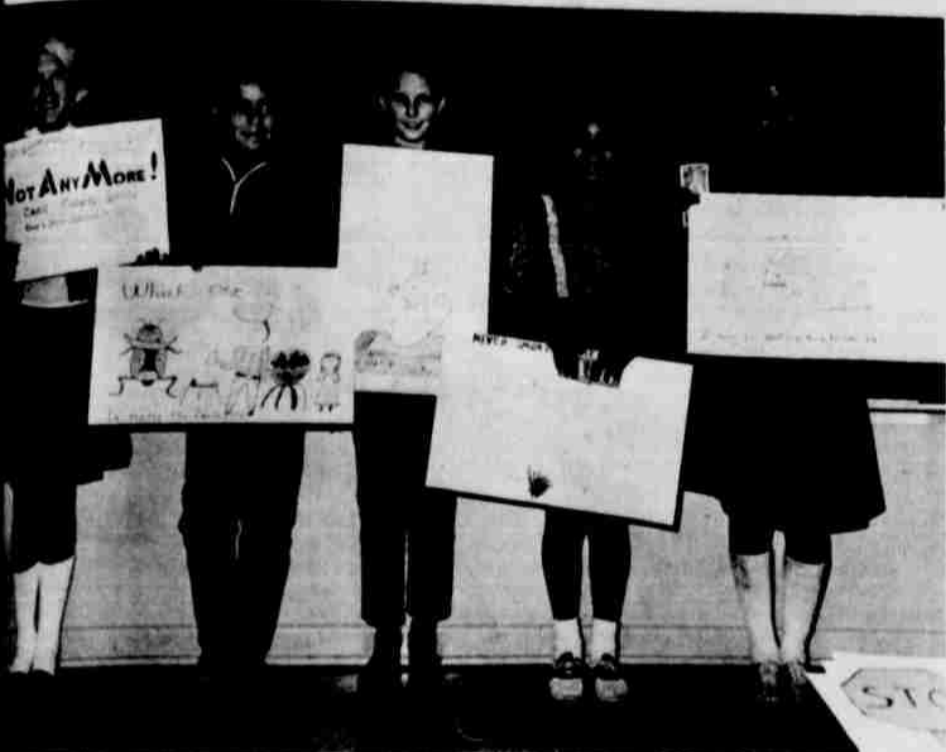

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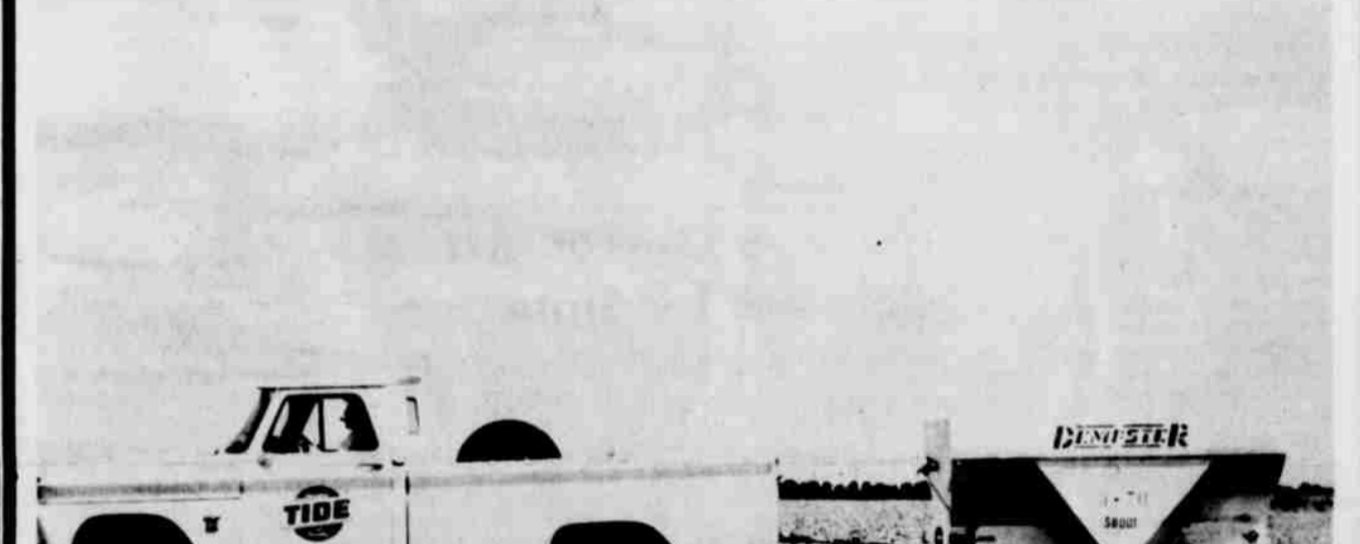

## Workshop On Tourists, History Set by State

The State's first workshop on History and Tourists will be conducted in Austin, October 23-24, under the sponsorship of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee, according to John Ben Sheppard of Odessa, president.

The two-day meeting, bringing together more than 800 tourism executives, county judges, chamber of commerce managers and officers, local businessmen and members of County Historical Survey Committees and co-operating organizations will be held in the Terrace Motor Hotel.

The Workshop is designed for the exchange of ideas and information on the development of historical and tourist resources in every Texas county and to give an understanding of state history through forum-type discussions.

"This is a united effort to acquaint the proponents of tourism with the historical preservation workers to accomplish the work of educating tourists and Texans about the Lone Star State on the state, regional and local levels," said Sheppard.

State and local tourists-related and history groups will display what they have accomplished toward this goal, with the exhibit rooms open to the public throughout the meeting.

Featured discussions will include how to finance and plan historical and scenic tours, how to recognize and develop historical attractions, how to plan and publish local and regional maps and tour guides, and an explanation of the program of Reconciliation, Appreciation, Marking, Preservation and Surveys of Texas history by the TSHSC.

In conjunction with this workshop, annual meetings of the TSHSC and 254 County Historical Survey Committees and of the Texas Historical Foundation will be conducted.

"We urge everyone interested in history and in tourism to attend this workshop," said Sheppard. "For the State's program of saving and seeing Texas history is an integral part of tourism in Texas."

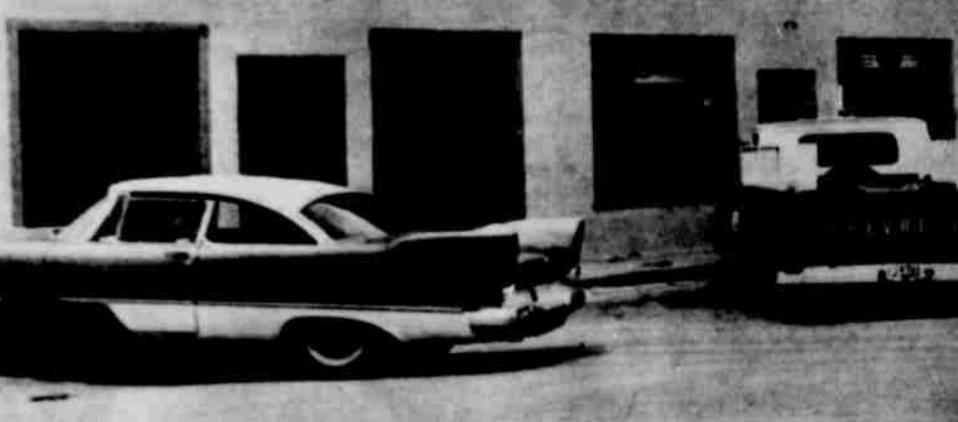

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

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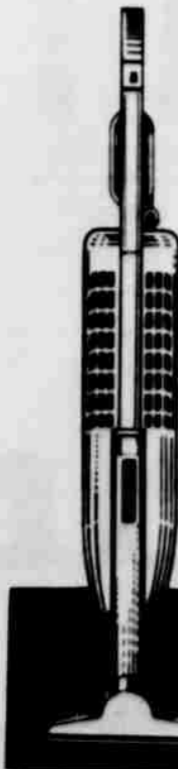
