Lfd's First Mayor **Expires In Lubbock**

Funeral services for B.L. (Uncle Josh) Cogdill, 72, who had the honor of serving as Littlefield's first mayor, were held Tuesday morning in Lubbock, Mr. Cogdill, a resident of Lubbock at the time of his death, died early Sunday in a Lubbock

hospital.

A native of Thorp Springs, a town southwest of Fort Worth.

Mr. Cogdill was a carpenter in his early days and came to Littlefield in 1923 from Post. He managed a lumber company here and in 1924, when the town was incorporated, he was elected mayor in a two-man race, with 71 votes. Commissioners elected in the initial election were

A.P. Duggan and W.G. Street.

Mr. Cogdill later moved to Lubbock and was that city's building inspector from 1946 un-til he retired in 1957.

The occasion was the Farm Bureau's annual county convention, held in the Springlake School Cafeteria.

Guest speaker, Hub King of Brownfield, state director for Area II of the Texas Farm Bureau, discussed the problems of agriculture. He pointed out that "the future of West Texas depends upon water." He asked the question, 'Is water amineral and, if so, can we prorate the minerals underground?"

In reference to Public Law 75, which permits the workers from Mexico to come into this country and work. King pointed out that the law will expire on Dec. 31. "If these people are denied the right to come to this country, agriculture will be a scarcity as we are unable to find adequate labor."

The speaker also pointed out that federal farm programs concerning wheat, cotton and feed grain will terminate in 1965, "It is everyone's job to see that the laws written in 1965 are best for all," King declared.

Resolutions approved at the annual meeting on county issues included one that Farm Bureau continue to take the lead in getting a program installed in the public schools to teach more about Citizenship, American-ism and the Free Enterprise system and that they continue the practice of sending as many stu-dents as possible to the annual Texas Farm Bureau Seminar,
