

The new road will give Littlefield and Lamb county a direct highway into Colorado, and other northern states, and a good road connection with the Bankhead Highway, "The Broadway of America," which serves the country east and west from coast to coast.

Will Be No. 143 The new highway, known as No. 143, will connect at Channing, with the highway to Colorado, and will serve Vega, Hereford, Dimmitt, Littlefield, Levelland and Brownfield.

The highway was designated from Channing to Dimmitt some time ago, and the order issued hat week covers the remainder of the route south to Brownfield.

The State Highway commission or-der reads as follows:

"It is ordered by the commission that State Highway No. 143 be extended from Dimmitt, in Castro county, via Levelland in Hockley county. to Meadows, in Terry county, on condition that counties affected furnish not less than 100 foot right-of-way on location to be approved by the state highway engineer, and on the further condition that the road will not be taken over for maintainence until constructed."

"I am very hopeful that Lamb county may immediately begin its work of obtaining a right-of-way for that road," says Senator Duggan in his letter to Judge Hay.

Mr. Duggan said that the actual obtaining of the right-of-way could not be carried out until ofter the survey is made by the engineers of the highway department, but suggested that "all preliminary work be done far the obtaining of this right-af-way very quickly."

The route through Lamb county is now 80 feet from property line to property line virtually all the way across the county, according to County Commissioner Ellis Foust.

May Defer Paving Contracts Awarding of the contracts for the paving of Highways No. 7 and 28 through Lamb county and adjacent counties are likely to be delayed for at least six weeks.

A dispatch from Austin said :: Awards of additional highway construction contracts probably will be withheld until April, W. R. Ely, chairman of the highway commission has announced.


