Q. What constitutes new and ma-

urance Policy have a loan value? A. The five year level premium

term policy initially issued does not have a loan value. A loan on any may not exceed 94 per cent of the cash value o fthe policy. Such loans bear interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum.

Q. If a veteran has several teeth extracted during service, may dentures be furnished by the Veterans' Administration?

the removal of defective teeth is a benefit rather than a detriment. If, however, dental work is necssary as an adjunct to treatment for a service connected disability, or as auxiliary to hospital treatment, dentures may be wathorized.

Q. Is a veteran's child adopted by another person eligible for benefits provided for children of veterans?

A. A child of a veteran adopted out of the family of the veteran is nevertheless a child within the meaning of that term as defined in veterans regulations.

Q. Are the proceeds of a National Service Life Insurance policy subject to claims of creditors?

A. No, payments to the beneficiary of such policy are exempt from taxation and from claims of creditors either of the insured or of the beneficiary except as to claims by the U. S. Government arising under any of the laws relating to veterans.

Q. Is a medical examination neces sary before a claim may be rated in the case of a World War II veteran who files a claim at the time of his discharge from service?

A. A medical examination is unnecessary in the initial adjudication of the claim unless a considerable time has elapsed since the veteran's discharge or the records furnished present a problem that makes an ac-




