What makes this prospect particularly attractive is the fact that the work will be done by the major companies and not by shoe-string speculators.

In our opinion-it would be very smart for the farmers and land-owners of this area, to meet the oil represent atives even more than halfway. They are really not compelled to spend their money in Lamb County any more than they are compelled to invest it in any other unproven territory. We should other unproven territory. We should
make it just as attractive to them as make it just as
we possibly can.

Incidentally-we must be prepared to meet the housing requirements of large crews that will probably be assembled here. It will be remembered hat one oil crew was pulled from Littlefield last year, because we did not have adequate housing facilities for them.
