### **Amherst Student Participating** In Ag Judging

LUBBOCK - Four Texas Tech agronomy students ~ loaded with information about plants and crop diseases - are competing in national and international collegiate crop judging contests this week.

Representing Tech at the National Intercollegiate Crop Judging Contest in Kansas City .Mo., Tuesday was Mike D. McDonald, agronomy senior from Lubbock: Eugene Coleman, agronomy senior from Amherst; Dean Edwards, agronomy senior from Lubbock: and Glenn Robison, agronomy senior from Hereford, Cecil Ayres, Tech associate professor of agronomy, is the team coach.

Saturday, the team will participate in the International Intercollesiate Crop Judging Contest in Chicago.

Winners of these contests must be able to compile the greatest number of points in identifying more than 300 crops or plant diseases, said Dr. A. W. Young, professor and head of the Tech agronomy department. He is also a judge in the Kansas City meet.

"In addition to knowing the crops, they must be able to give the scientific name of seed or plant material that may be shown to them," he pointed out.

The second stage of the contest also includes commercial grading of grain, hay and cotton that moves on the Federal market. They must be able to give the correct grade of grain, just as Federal inspectors do. When juding cotton, they must know the staple, length, and grade on sight, Young

Grains to be judged include wheat, corn. soybeans, oats, bar-

The third phase of the competition includes classification of seed on a commercial basis, with participants giving reasons why they graded certain samples above
