## THE FLORIDA SHIP CANAL

More than 350 years ago Philip II, King of Spain, wrote to Menendez, the Spanish governor of Florida, ask to the Atlantic that would enable his galleons, bringing treasures from Mexico, to avoid the dangers of hurricanes and of Sir Francis Drake's buccaneers in passing through the Florida Straits. A hundred years ago Andrew Jackso urged the digging of a canal across the neck of the Florida peninsula as a military measure to permit the speedie Atlantic and the Gulf. Ever since 1850 the War Depart ment has been urging the construction of such a canal.

The World War developed a new menace to ship ping, the submarine. The narrow channel between Flor da and Cuba, 500 miles long and only 90 miles wide, offer the same opportunity for enemy submarines that the Brit Florida foreig diags the World War. Southward from Florida foreign flags fy over every island and shore ex cept Puetro Rila and the Virgin Islands. Enemy submar ines could easily find bases from which to menace the

Since the World War, the volume of shipping to and fro between the Gulf and the Atlantic has multiplied nearly ten-fold. More than 10,000 ships a year have to pass through the hurricane-threatened waterway, and axp.

Mor hat $\$ 0,000,000$ has been spent. It has been stimated that it will take about $\$ 140,000,000$ more to omplete the canal in four years. By direction of the PreSupply Bill appropriations were included in the Army Supply Bill.

Congress still has an opportunity to render a service to the nation, by providing in the annual deficiency bill for the continuation and completion of the canal. It will provide a safe and short new highway for commerce tes between East and West today. The Florida Canal will provide the shortest, easiest and most secure line of com munication between the Mississippi Valley and the Atla tic seaboard.
