


A total of 19 counties will compete for district championship in the Lubbock meet which will start at 9 o'clock Friday morning in the Tech gymnasium and continue through Saturday

Growers were cautioned by Mc-Clung to plant only tested seed which show a very low percentage of noxious weed seeds. He pointed out that the presence of weed seed in planting seed causes a double increase in the cost of cultivating a crop, for it increases the cost of cleaning the field and also decreases the ultimate yield.

McClug called attention of growers to the fact that the testing division of the department is different from the seed certification division. The seed laboratory division has to do only with the mechanical purity of seed, while the certification division deals with the varietal purity of seed, he explained.

The tests of seed are made by the Department of Agriculture free for all citizens of the state.


