

New Milk **Tests Now Being Used** 

Two methods of testing for milk solids are now being used in nation - wide studies of milk composition, reports A. M. Meekma, extension dairy specialist. The tests, which were developed with the aid of dairy farmers' research funds, are being used at 35 state and federal experiment stations on a total of 13,750 cows of 5 breeds.

Field testing of the Watson lactometer, which was developed by the USDA, was accomplished at the University of Maryland with the aid of American Dairy Association grants.

Financial support for the Golding Plastic Beads test has been provided to Washington State University since the fall of 1955, says Meekma. This test has proved simple and practical for field use.

The USDA has found both of these tests to be as accurate for measuring milk solids as the Babcock test is for measuring butterfat content. Changes in consumer atti-

tudes toward butterfat is what brought this increased attention to other nutrients in milk, says Meekma. He predicts the results of the present nation wide studies will be used in guiding the breeding and selection of dairy cattle in the future. Solids testing may also become a basis for evaluating and pricing milk.

Many Texas counties are still using the bounty system in an attempt to control predators. Ed Cooper, extension wildlife specialist, says there is good evidence that this system is ineffective.

Under the bounty system, the county or perhaps a livestock association, offers a reward for retrieved the same scalp from killing animals which occasionally prey on livestock or crops, or otherwise create a problem. The reward ranges from as little as 10 cents per head for crows to as much as \$75 for large animals such as wolves payment. or coyotes.
