





Last Rites Held For Drowning Victim-

Funeral services for L. A. Corbell Jr., 24, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Corbell, Sr., of Baileyboro, Texas, who was drowned June 8, while fishing in a boat in Devil's Lake, near Del Rio, was held at the Church of Christ, Menard, Texas, with Interment in the Menard Cemetery. Menard is the home of the young man's grandfather, C. W. Corbell.

Corbell was with two other men when the tragedy occurred. Their boat was believed to have struck an underwater object of some kind, throwing its occupants into the water. One of the group, although injured, was rescued.

SIDELIGHTS FROM WASHINGTON

By CONG. GEO. MAHON

This column is being written on Saturday afternoon, June +15th. There is much uncertainity as to just when Congress will recess or adjourn. The best guess seems to be that Congress will recess about July 15th for a period of three months. Such a recess would be very much in order, as Congress has been in session all or a part of practically every month since the war began more than four years ago.

On Thursday of this week I was able to secure passage in the House of my bill involving appropriations and programs for all Government owned corporations-40 in number. Under the bill the Commodity Credit Corporation will have sufficient funds to carry on the support price and loan programs on cotton and wheat and other basic crops, Parity prices fixed by the Department of Agriculture, unfortunately, do not take into consideration all labor costs, but the approval of the Commodity Credit program will prevent the possibility of a collapse in the price of cotton, grain and other important crops for at least a twoyear period. This is the most hopeful thing on the horizon for West Texas farmers But on account of the continued drouth, price guarantees for the present do not mean too much.

On Friday, June 21st, we are scheduled to present to the House the bill making appropriations for the Army for the fiscal year beginning July 1st. This will be the biggest bill presented to Congress this year. We are providing funds for pay and equipment for a modern Army and occupation force which will average about 1,250,000 men during the year. The sum recommended will be 7 billion dollars-a huge sum-but

Sales through June 15th were reported at \$6,429,123.75 with a total of \$9,206,266 in all U. S. Savings Bonds at that date.

In encouraging the citizens of Texas to increase their purchases of Savings Bonds during the present promotion. 





For the convenience of veterans and their dependents, contact offices are located at Lubbock, Big Spring, Odessa, San Angelo, and Abilene The proposed plan calls for itinerant contact service to be available at each county seat, according to Gerald W. Collinsworth, chief of the contact division.

A. No. Commissions, brokerage, or similar charges may not legally be assessed against a veteran for securing a guaranty of loan. Of course, those fees usually borne by a borrower, such as appraisal, title reveteran.

Mr. Phelps purchased 2 gallons of 25% DDT solution and mixed 12/3 gallon of this solution in 160 gallons of water. He dipped his 60 head of sheep to control the sheep ticks. After the sheep were dipped, there was enough of this mixture to dip 80 head of hogs to rid them of

The dogs and cats were dipped also to rid them of flees. After all this dipping Mr. Phelps

still had 100 gallons of the mixture that he used to spray 3 chicken houses, which he did as follows:

1-16 x 20 ft; 1-12x16; 1-8 x

One sheep barn 20 x 64; one cow barn 12 x 20- one hog barn 12 x 30; one negro shack, his back porch and eight cows.

Cotton Prices Remain Near 22 Year High Level

Cattle, eggs, poultry held steady; cotton prices remained near the 22-KEYS MADE at Perry Brothers. sheep and lambs as well as some vegetables were slightly lower last week 7-4t-c at most southwest markets according to USDA's production and Marketing Administration. Cotton prices advanced to new

high ground early last week but lat-45-1t-c er declined. Demand for spot cotton continued strong. Reported sales in the 10 spot markets totaled 64,-500 bales this week as compared with 91,800 bales in the previous week and 73,300 a year earlier. Southwest egg prices were strong-

er Friday compared to last week's close. Good demand continued to absorb liberal supplies. Current receipts brought 30-1-2 to 31 cents a dozen, Fort Worth 31 to 32 cents, Dallas and 32 to 32-1-2 cents, Den-Fairly heavy culling brought

hens to market. Good demand kept prices about steady. Heavy hens were quoted 24 cents a pound, Dallas; 24 to 25 cents, Fort Worth; 25 to 26 cents, Denver; and 28 to 29 cents, New Orleans. Fryers were short of demand with prices firm at ceiling.

Widespread harvesting of southwest grains failed to par prices away from ceiling levels last week. Commercial grain and feed supplies remained tight and demand good.

Fewer hogs arrived at southwest markets last week compared to the previous week. Top butchers remained at ceiling of \$14.50 per hundred pounds, Wichita \$14.55, Oklahoma City \$14.65, Fort Worth and San Antonio, \$14.80, Denver.

Sheep and lambs were 25 to 50 cents a hundred lower at most southwest markets last week, except at Fort Worth where all classes were



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sold at \$12.25 to \$12.50, San Antonio, \$12.50 to \$13.50, Fort Worth; and \$13 to \$14.50, Oklahoma City. Denver quoted common to good spring lambs at \$14.50 to \$16.25. Receipts were too small to test the Wichita market.

Cattle brought steady prices at most southwest markets last week compared to the previous week's close. However, some lower grades were slightly down.
