The commissioners and Judge Otha Dent now have arrived at a point in their budget discussions where they are quite willing to concede that it's a good trick if you can do it.

While the commissioners are heartily in accord with the orallysupported sentiment that money isn't everything, they at the same time have few official problems that money wouldn't solve.

The chief problem that faces them in the matter of the 1951 budget is how to meet the needs for more money without increasing county government costs to the taxpayers.

Due to the rise in the costs of everything that enters into the operation of the county government-except salaries-the expenses for 1951 will necessarily be higher than those of 1950.

Judge Dent and the commissioners have voiced the hope new industrial developments and other new improvements in the county would provide sufficient additional revenue in 1951 so that no increase in the tax rate would be necessary.

Know Your Congress

TIME IS RUINING OUT for members of Congress who are sorely perplexed about how to increase our military manpower.

First, we are soon going to scrape the bottom of the barrel under the present draft. Second, the National Defense Establishment needs to know what it must plan for on July 1, the start of the new fiscal year when new appropriations for clothing, food and other supplies, as well as for "military hardware," become available.

As to the necessity for some increase in military manpower, there remains little doubt. The Korean replacement rate of 1,000 men a month is enough alone to eliminate most of the doubts, to say nothing of the need for filing out our strength in many places.

THE BIG PROBLEM is: "What new sources must be tapped"?

Senators and Representatives are divided into several major camps. Generally speaking, they believe that the present age brackets of 19 through 25 should be expanded, say, to 18 through 27: or they believe that deferments and exemptions in the

present age limits should be sharply restricted. From the constituents back home, the members are receiving suggestions ranging through these and almost every other possibility.

CURRENT HEARINGS on revisions in the Selective Service Act by both the Senate and House Armed Services Committees are being followed most closely. For it is there that the National Defense Establishment is making its case for the drafting of 18-year-olds. And it is there that the sharpest questions from the Congressional side are being asked



AUSTIN - Continuation of the #ull \$15,000,000-a-year farm-tomarket road program was put at the head of his list Saturday by Senator Kilmer B. Corbin of Lubbock and Lamesa.

The senator said that he was opposed to any plan to cut down on the farm-to-market road program, and that he was opposed to any effort for taking road money away from the countles and giving it to the State Highway Department.

Corbin referred particularly to the plan announced last week which would take money now alfocated to countles for lateral road construction, amounting to about \$8,000,000 next year, and giving it to the Highway Department to replace the present \$15,-000,000 annual rural road pro-




