



## Strawberries-Good Source **Of Vitamin C**

If Vitamin C is lacking in your diet, now's the time to get a fresh supply, for with strawberry season almost upon us USDA plant scientists say that a generous serving of fresh strawberries will, on the average, supply the daily quota. Of course, the amount of Vitamin C in berries depends upon the variety and the weather conditions under which they are grown. The same bright sunlight, moderately warm days and cool nights which produce the best flavor in any variety of strawberries also produce the highest scorbic acid or Vitar. min C content.

Miss Gwendolyne Jones, Extension foor preservation specialist, points out that some varieties have more Vitamin C content than others. But the average for all varieties have more than 60 milligrams for each ordinary serving, and the recommended daily intake of ascorbic acid is 75 milligrams.

There is no marked difference in ascorbic acid content of berries picked early in the season and those picked near the season's end, says Miss Jones. However, she states that it pays in Vita-min C to let picked half-red berries ripen before serving. Better still, allow the berries to ripen on the plant before picking.


