Information For Veterans On Life Insurance

> By Mrs. L. M. Brandon **Executive Secretary**

We have had several inquiries from veterans concerning payment of National Service Life Insurance dividends and we have received some information on this the past week.

Payment of \$2,800,000,000 has been authorized by the Veterans Administration on twenty million policies. It will include most policies issued on or before January 1, 1948, which have been kept in force for three months or more.

The Veterans Administration hopes to start distributing these checks in January 1950 and complete the distribution within six months. A special application form is being prepared which the Veterans Administration expects to have available for distribution in August or soon thereafter, through post offices, V. A. offices and Veterans service organizations. This office expects to have a supply and be prepared to assist veterans in applying for these

Payment will be made to the person insured, or, if deceased, to the beneficiary of the policy. If the insurance has lapsed, dividend payment will, in general, vary with the amount of the policy and the number of premiums paid. Payment will be made in cash only. Veterans Administration that letter inquiries not be made, as such inquiries only delay preparation for distribution of the fund.

This local office will have the information as soon as it is available and will keep the public informed.

Brother of Mrs. Lulu Hoover Dies

John Haney Anderson, 74, of Snyder, Okiahoma, well known veteran Oklahoma publisher, and brother of Mrs. Lulu Hoover of this city, passed aways Friday morning, July 7, in a hospital after a lingering illness of several years.

Editor Snyder Paper 40 Years As editor for more than forty years: of the Kiowa County Democrat at Snyder, Okla., Mr. Anderson was widely known among newspaper people, and for many years was a leader in the Oklahoma Press Association. He held various offices in that association, including the presidency, to which he was elected at a state meeting at Medicine Park in 1918. Mr. Anderson was alsoactive in state political circles, and wasrecognized as a leading Democratic party member.

Born in Iowa

Mr. Anderson was born in Bonapart, Iowa, and went to El Reno, Okla., at the opening and located at Hobart at the Kiowa-Commanche opening. He went to Snyder in 1905, and that year, with Crooks & Stallard, established the Kiowa County Democrat, of which he was editor until his illness compelled! him to retire in 1939.

In the cyclone of 1905 the superintendent of schools was killed and Mr. Anderson served as superintendent of: Snyder schools for several years. He was postmaster of Snyder for eight. years, and served one year as president of the Oklahoma Press Association. His father, Silas Anderson, served as Unit-

ed States marshal in the early days: Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Elizabeth Anderson; two daughters, Mrs. Walter Hinton, Altus, and Mrs. Rubin. Kreeger of Houston, Texas; one son, Bryan, of Hollywood, Calif.; and twosisters, Mrs. Hoover and Mrs. Daisy Williams of San Angelo, Texas.

Services were conducted at 4 p. m. Saturday, July 9, in the First Christian Church of Snyder. Burial took place in Fairlawn cemetery under the direction of Preston-Leckie Funeral Home.

10 min.; stir into slightly beaten egg yolks. Cook and stir over boiling water 2 min. longer. Cool; add vanilla. Pour into crust. Beat egg whites until stiff,

but not dry. Beat in remaining 6 tablesp, sugar. Put on pie, spreading to very edge of crust. Sprinkle with shredded coconut. Bake 15 min, or until light brown. Chill.

The proposed bond issue has been set up to extend over a period of 30 years with 15 years option.

If the bond issue carries, there will be approximately 1-3 increase in school taxes for all purposes.

But this appears to be a nominal increase for schools in which students can receive a well rounded education and equip themselves to enter life and institutions on an equality with students from the best High schools of the country.

While a one-third increase in school taxes may look like a considerable amount, it is, in reality, a nominal amount.

For example, if you pay \$30 in school taxes now, all you would pay if the bond issue is approved, would be \$40.

Another thought to take into consideration is the fact that school taxes in the Littlefield Independent School district are considerably lower than elsewhere. In other words, it is said that the Littlefield schools have been operated on an exceedingly economical basis,

New School Need Great

Here are a few facts that are not generally prominent, but which must be taken into consideration:

Marketing Quotas Will Not Apply To Wheat Acreage

Application For Allotment Must Be Made By September 1

As announced by John W. Mc-Quien, Administrative officer of Lamb County A.C.A., all farmers interested in seeding wheat for a 1950 crop are advised of the following limitations concerning the 1950 crop of wheat.

Acreage allotments on wheat will be in effect for the 1950 crop. Marketing Quotas will not be in effect on the 1950 Wheat Crop.

Under this type of program any producer seeding within his alloted wheat acreage can place his grain in the Commodity Credit Loan.

Any prducer seeding in excess of his allotment or any producer Seeding Wheat who does not have an allotment will not be eligible to place his wheat in the Commodity Credit P.M. Friday, in the First Baptist day, Thursday and Friday, July 27, Loan, but he will not be penalized

Producers who do not have a wheat allotment and want to apply for a New-Grower Allotment should make application for the allotment







To Hold Clinic For Celebral Palsied Children August 15

The Cerebral Palsy Treatment Center will hold a clinic for the examination of cerebral palsied children on Monday, August 15, Dr. Charles B. Sadler, Amarillo and Dr. E. T. Driscoll

of Plainview, will examine patients. The Treatment Center, which was opened August 23, 1948, is sponsored by the Lubbock Crippled Children's Society and the Lubbock Rotary Club. To date 188 cases have registered at the Center for care. Children and parents report to the Center once or twice each week for care where the child and parents are taught an exercise program to carry out at home.

At present the Center is housed in a building at 1317 Tenth Street and plans are underway for the construction of a new Center. Over \$45,000 in money and \$5,000 in equipment have been donated. An additional \$5,000 is needed to assure the full cost of the building. The new building, construction of which will be started within a few weeks, will provide facilities for a speech therapist, an occupational
