CONTRACT TALKS NEAR IMPASSE

Telephone Strike Is Possible

The possibility of a telephone strike faced Littlefield and a wide area this week as negotiations for a new contract between General Telephone Co. and the Communication Workers of America almost reached an impasse.

However, Bob Saunders, district GenTel manager in Littlefield, reported that "negotiations have not broken down and there is still hope for an agreement."

Saunders pointed out that although the contract date of July 21 has passed, both parties are continuing to work under this contract until a new one supercedes it or it is terminated by one party if a settlement is not reached.

The union, Local 6180 which covers members in a five-state area, has made some demands which the company has not conceded to date. Apparently the major problem involved is a national issue on medical coverage for union workers.

The union is seeking medical coverage, not only for the worker, but also for his spouse and children. CWA is affiliated with the CIO.

All craft employees are eligible for participation in the union here. In reply to a question concerning the local workers involved, Saunders said six GenTel employees are classified under management here, the rest being eligible for union membership in CWA.

A recent report from the San Angelo office of GenTel indicated that federal mediators had been sitting in on contract talks.

Saunders emphasized that negotiations were still in progress this week, although he admitted the possibility of a strike was present. "We have heard some strike talk, but there has been no notice of a vote by union members as yet," he stated.

Should a strike occur, the half dozen local non-union employees would continue toll phone service on an emergency basis.

Going back to the highway improvement issue, he pointed out to the support meeting that the Texas highway department is committed to spend some \$700,000 building a business route of US Highway 84 through Littlefield, "to build a really nice thoroughfare that will improve the entrance appearance and serve Littlefield in many important ways."

The council finalized its fiscal thinking in an hour-long session Tuesday evening, when they formally called the November 19 election.

The two bond issues will be on one ballot, but as separate propositions. The first will be for \$988,000 in water system bonds that includes \$909,000 in new construction in the water system, and \$79,000 to pay off remaining debt on 7,360 acres of water rights the city owns in the

field, to our continued progress and growth. We simply cannot afford not to pass these issues," he declared.

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Weather

The U. S. Weather Bureau's 5-day forecast for the Lamb County area calls for temperatures to average about 5 degrees above normal, somewhat cooler Friday. Normal maximums in upper 60's, normal minimums in lower 40's, little or no precipitation indicated.

Lamb County farmers breathed a sigh of relief as Halloween came on the scene with no early frost to hurt promising cotton prospects.

A cool front moved in Monday, dropping temperature to a low of 39 degrees during the night according to Pioneer Natural Gas. The mercury climbed Tuesday and the low was up to 49 degrees Tuesday night.

Beginning with one of the most pessimistic outlooks in many years, the 1963 cotton crop in Lamb County has made an almost unbelievable recovery.

Late June-planted cotton that didn't appear to have a chance in July may yield from 3/4 to 1 bale per acre in many areas.

The frosts put on many farmers' faces by a late start, followed by heavy hail damage and a worse than usual insect attack, have now been erased. An "Indian summer" has come along to help mature the cotton.

With the balmy weather extending longer than many old-timers can remember, the cotton plants took on new life and began to produce their "white gold" with amazing vigor.

County Agent Bill Kimbrough terms it "one of the most remarkable recoveries I've ever seen." He thinks the cotton crop is going to be "real good on the acreage we have."

Kimbrough estimates that 70 percent of the cotton will be ready to defoliate this week. "It looks 150 percent better than it did in July," remarked the veteran agent.

The agent also agreed that it has been a real unusual year. "The good weather we've had late in the season just comes along about 1 in 20 years," he remarked.

Kimbrough estimated the county cotton production at 163,000 bales early in the season, and he admits his guess might be a little under the mark.

Kimbrough arbitrarily picked Saturday as the date when farmers could start defoliating and have it pay off. He recommends the use of a true defoliant or a desiccant starting this week.

"Due to the cool weather, the cotton won't gain much more maturity," the agent said. Normally, farmers figure cotton should be at least 60 percent open for a true defoliant or 80 percent for a desiccant. He thinks some farmers with late cotton might be gambling if they wait much longer.

With the normal first killing frost date about a week away, based on the past 16 years, the move to defoliate may get underway with a bang this week. The machine harvesting usually starts two or three weeks after the defoliation process.

Cotton farming has become a highly specialized, mechanized enterprise. The farmer, with a big investment in irrigation, fertilizer, insecticides and other factors, does his utmost to insure himself of a crop in spite of the antics of Mother Nature.

But the year 1963 is proving once again--if there was ever any doubt--that farming is a lot like coaching--you've got to have all the winning ingredients plus a whole lot of luck!

A slice in the cotton acreage allotment was the first blow for farmers. The allotment was cut from 205,846 acres in 1962 to 184,894 this year--a reduction of 20,000 acres, then the county picked up about 5,000 reappportioned acres.

A wet and cold spring caused many farmers to replant, then one of the worst rash of hailstorms on record battered the plants. The county ASC measurements later showed that some 11,112 acres allotted for cotton were replanted in some other crop.

That left the county with approximately 177,217 acres of cotton standing, compared to 204,198 in 1962. Not only did the farmers have no hope of matching the bumper '62 crop of 227,400 bales, many were glum about their prospective yields in July.

But the weather suddenly turned almost perfect, with only a few minor showers to mar the picture. A few farmers over irrigated, or irrigated just before the last showers, but on the whole things started looking up.

A public hearing on proposed salary increases for county officials will be held today by Lamb County Commissioners.

The public hearing, set for 10 a.m., will precede the regular court session. Commissioners meet the second Monday and the last day of each month.

The proposed salary schedule would raise the top seven county officials and the commissioners' pay by about 10 percent. The proposed amounts have been published several times. Present county salaries were set in 1954.

Only nine absentee ballots for the Nov. 9 election on constitutional amendments had been cast at the Lamb County clerk's office by Wednesday morning.

The election will be for the approval or rejection of four proposed Texas Constitution changes. The most widely publicized amendment concerns the abolishment of the poll tax as a voting requirement.

Voters who expect to be out of town Nov. 9 can request absentee ballots. The absentee balloting continues until Tuesday at 5 p.m.

Farmers May Quiz, Suggest to Freeman

Lamb County and other South Plains farmers will have a two-hour question and suggestion session open with Agriculture Secretary Orville L. Freeman at Lubbock next Monday.

The Secretary's visit is "to learn first-hand what farmers are thinking and to gather ideas and suggestions about the kind of farm program farmers want."

The Lubbock meeting will open in the municipal auditorium on the Texas Tech campus at 2 p.m. Monday.

The format of the meeting will be a brief opening statement by Freeman, followed by the question and answer session. Members of the audience will be invited to ask questions from the

floor, and floor microphones will be used for them, a USDA information statement said.

On entering the hall, each person will be given a card on which to write a question, if he likes. Cards will go to the Secretary without screening, the news release said, and will be made part of the question-suggestion period.

A number of Lamb County farmers and business people are expected to attend the session. The Lubbock meeting is one of a series of 13 Secretary Freeman is holding across the nation to get first-hand thinking of farmers on the farm program.

Benicio Bazan Elizondo, 63, was found shot to death Monday night at his home near the Fieldton Co-Op Gin, and Justice of Peace J. N. Bowen ruled the death was caused from a self-inflicted gunshot wound.

A deputy found a .410 shotgun near the body. He had been employed at the gin, but his daughter said he had been sick and unable to work for several weeks. He had lived in the Fieldton area about 10 years.

With the approval, Mayor Bill Armistead reported on an investigation of the effect on fire rates made by him and City Manager J. W. Harrison in Austin last week at the Texas Board of Insurance.

Installation of over-ground storage would have resulted in a 3-cents penalty in the city's key rate for fire insurance, or a penalty of about \$2,800 a year to Littlefield insurance holders, Armistead said.

UF Leader As Speaker

Littlefield's United Fund campaign was launched Monday morning by the advanced division, and early reports Tuesday indicated a total of \$5 had been checked into UF quarters at the Pioneer Natural Gas office.

Ernest Hoover, advance gifts chairman, urged the volunteers to make their contacts as soon as possible and try to up the division's drive Friday.

The advanced gifts are expected to account for a big part of the UF goal of \$27,000.

The general campaign, which includes all other divisions, will get underway next Monday. Campaign Chairman Chick Conners has called a breakfast kick-off meeting for 7 a.m. Monday at the Crescent House.

Mrs. J. W. Walker of Plainfield, prominent United Fund member, clubwoman, teacher, church worker and former Democratic county chairman, will be special guest speaker for the evening.

Ernest Mitchell, local UF president, said directors feel fortunate in securing Mrs. Walker as guest speaker.

Highway Bonds Would Raise City Tax Rate by 9 Cents

An increase in Littlefield city taxes of nine cents per \$100 valuation -- an exact 9% increase in the tax amount -- is all that will be required if a \$148,000 highway improvement bond passed on November 19, the council and their fiscal agent declared Tuesday night in a meeting.

In assurance of the tax amount, the council went on record to a "declaration of intent" to tax in the upcoming tax year at \$1.09, instead of the \$1.00 now in effect.

The new issue will require \$339 annually, for interest and taxes, an amount that will be covered handily by the nine cents added tax, said Joe Smith, fiscal agent for the upcoming bond issue, of the First Southwest Company, Lubbock, Texas. Present city tax rate is \$14,653,124.

The highway improvement bond will be a tax obligation, separate from a companion \$100,000 bond for water system improvements, that will be a revenue measure to be paid from income of the city water and sewer department.

At present, the City of Littlefield owes only \$116,000 in tax bonds, a 1938 series that will be paid off in 1971.

This is "one of the lowest city tax debts" in the area for a city the size of Littlefield, Smith pointed out recently.

From the 9-cents levy, the city can anticipate increased income of \$12,265 a year, at 93 percent collection of assessed taxes, Smith's fiscal outline showed. City tax collections have run at or above the 93 percent collection rate in recent years, and are currently at 95 percent.

A Littlefield resident using within the 3,000-gallons minimum monthly will find his water-sewer bill increased by 70 cents a month when the new rate is effected.

If the use is 5,000 gallons monthly, the bill will be an even \$1.00 higher. If it is 10,000 gallons, it will be \$2.00 higher each month, for both water and sewer.

Mayor Bill Armistead emphasized the importance of "having the public understand all of these figures. We feel that they are fair and reasonable, that they are vital to Littlefield, and we want everyone to understand them fully."

In this direction, all city taxpayers will get a letter--not mailed at city expense--explaining just how much their taxes will be raised by the highway improvement issue, before they go to the polls on November 19.

This is one of the information measures mapped in a bond-support meeting at the courthouse, that followed the Tuesday night council session. It was headed by Armistead and the city council.

In it, the mayor named councilmen to head four major committees in the bond-support movement. Councilman B. D. Garland, Jr. heads a "personal contact committee" with the responsibility of contacting "every eligible voter," to explain the bond issue, Armistead pointed out.

Councilman H. C. Randall heads an information and publicity committee; Councilman Paul McCormick, fund raising, and Councilman James Showell heads a committee to get out the vote on election day.

Armistead was emphatic in declaring the need for approval of both issues. "These are vital to Littlefield, and we want everyone to understand them fully."

Rev. D. L. Kreeger is chairman of the project. He announced that youngsters will be wearing blue badges with the letters "CROP" on them. They will hand out informational literature on CROP and seek donations for overseas relief and rehabilitation.

Rev. John W. G. Hill, Rev. C. J. Coffman and Rev. Melvin Herring are on the project committee with Rev. Kreeger.

CROP gifts are put to use under church supervision and in cooperation with local social welfare groups overseas. Distribution is made strictly on the basis of need, without question of religion, race or creed.

Lt. Shockley will embark for Liberia, Africa in December for one year.



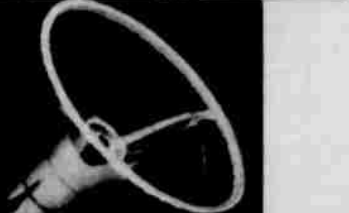

The Wildcats will be trying to bounce back from three narrow losses in a row and derail the state-title express manufactured by Coach Bill Spann and his Demon gridlers.

Wildcat Coach John Howle announced a few offensive changes would be made this week in an effort to put more firepower in the Littlefield attack. The Cats have lost their last three games by a mere total of nine points and, Howle hopes to add more punch to the offensive game.

End Larry Wood, a quarterback last season, has been working at the man-under post this week and may see some action as the signal caller. Howle is expected to take advantage of Wood's passing arm in the tough contest coming up. A few more surprises might be in the making.

In the other two 1-AAA tilts, undefeated Phillips goes against Levelland and Perryton meets Hereford.

 "sandhills" north of town. The \$909,000 will provide extensive improvements in water distribution systems including a new 500,000-gallon elevated storage tank, wide new, larger ground facilities and will bring from the sandhills fields into town with a potential flow of 6.1-million gallons. The water bonds will be subject to payment only from the revenue of the water-sewer department. Bondholders never hold the city responsible for revenue from the department. This agreement is made by the bond provisions, but the council last week new water and sewer rates to provide income off the new revenue measure. Projections are that rates will provide \$400,000 annually, on the same water billings the city made in fiscal year that ended Oct. 1, 1963, plus an additional 1 put into the sewer rate. This last feature will be a service charge for city residents, and from \$1.00 monthly to \$2.00 monthly for businesses. In the water rates, the monthly minimum for gallons of water will be \$3.50, a basic increase of 20 cents a month. A new schedule of rates in effect above the minimum figure. These, however, leave Littlefield with the lowest rates on the South far below neighboring Lubbock which has just adjusted its rates. The highway program is a part of city construction program to drain the high adjacent streets, long a problem. "They are going to spend most \$5 for every one spend," the mayor points out. 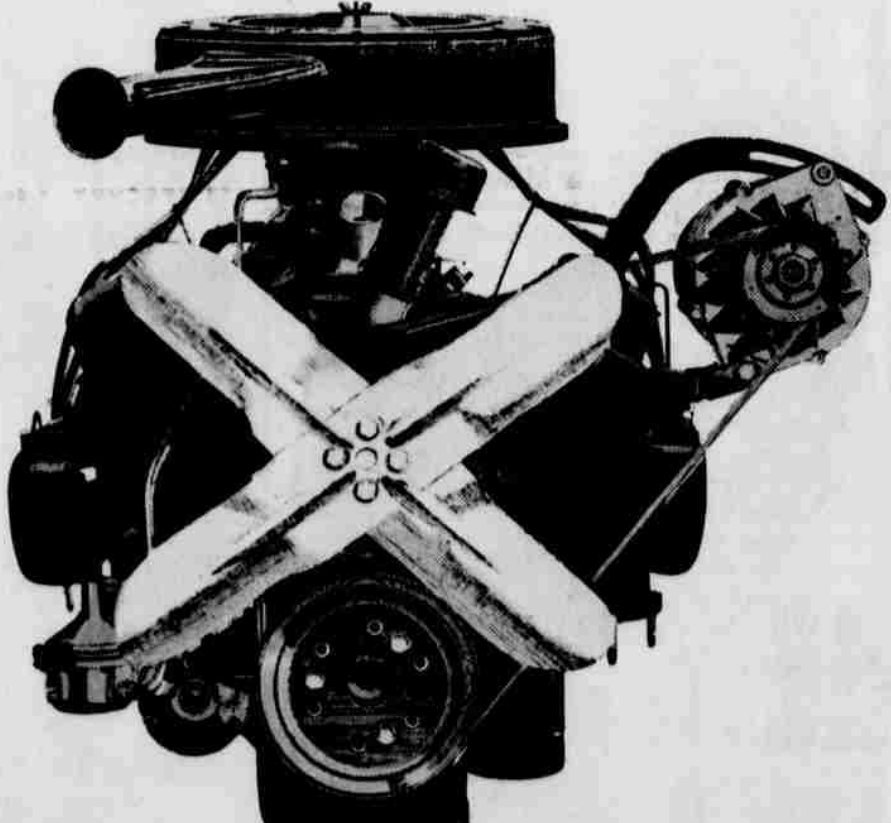
