# City Park Beautification Program Underway; Civic Groups Assist

## Work Expected To Be Finished Next Summer

### Need More Funds to Continue Cleanup

The Jaycees continue their cleanup campaign, and plan to dust the City at least once a month until Fall, but must have additional funds with which to finance this work. This statement was made the Leader office by members of the Junior Chamber of Commerce Tuesday, who stated that they would need another \$200.00 before they could again fog the city. The Jaycees ask everyone who can, and especially those who have not assisted in this program, to mail their donations to the Junior Chamber of Commerce or Skipper Smith, President and thereby enable them to continue with the program. They stated that any amount would be appreciated.

The Littlefield Park beautification program, which has been underway since last fall, is now showing results for the efforts put forth by the several clubs and organizations cooperating in this worthy project, which has been sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce.

Assisting in the project are the Rotary Club, Boy Scouts, Lions Club, Fire Department, Junior Study Club and the City of Littlefield.

**Rotary Plot Beautiful**  
Driving by the park one may easily see the beautiful green plot on the east side of the park, which is the tract sponsored and cared for by the Rotary Club. This was plowed and planted last fall, and has been kept watered this spring and summer, and is indeed a beautiful plot.

As announced by J. E. Chisholm, chairman of City Beautification Committee of the Littlefield Chamber of Commerce, the plot sponsored by the Boy Scouts just north of the Rotary tract, the Lions Club plot south of the Rotary section, and the fireboys tract just south of the Lions Club plot, completing the east side of the park, and the plot sponsored by the Junior Study Club, which runs west of the Fireboys section, representing about one-third of the park, were all plowed, seeded and watered last week.

**To Be Ready By 1950**  
Mr. Chisholm states that it is expected to have this part of the park ready for picnics and other outdoor recreation by next summer.

He reports that the Rotary Club, Lions Club and Junior Study Club have furnished the expense for improving this portion of the park. Ray Hulse of the Lamb County Farmers Cooperative Gin Association donated the use of a tractor for three days; T. E. Williams of Littlefield Farmers Cooperative Gin donated the services of a man to drive the tractor for three days and Swede Kling and D. C. Robison furnished the implements, plows and harrows for the same amount of time. Caretaker Furnished

The Community Chest is furnishing a caretaker from the middle of April through September to care for the park; and the city furnished a power lawn mower and the necessary sprinkling.

Under the present plans, according to Mr. Chisholm, the entire park including the lake, will be completely planted by August, 1950.

**Composed of 9 Blocks**  
This park is composed of nine square city blocks, and has presented an extensive problem to be overcome.

Littlefield also has a second park, though a much smaller plot, in the east section of town, about midway between the Lubbock highway and highway 51 near the Cassel Courts. This is composed of a one-half block, and it is the plan of the beautification committee to improve this plot after the larger city park is completed.

However, in the event the church does not find it financially possible to carry out the \$150,000 expenditure, there is an alternate clause in the contracts providing for an expenditure of \$115,000. The alternate clause may be exercised any time up to November 15.

### Youth Injured By Rifle Shot

Lloyd Wayne Butler, 11, son of Mr. and Mrs. Hub Butler of six miles south of Anton, sustained serious gunshot wounds when a 22 rifle was accidentally discharged Sunday afternoon. Lloyd Wayne, and an older brother, Granville, aged 14, and a friend, Thurman Davis, 21, had been rabbit hunting, and were riding about in an automobile when the accident happened.

According to the injured boy's mother, Lloyd Wayne was sitting in the back seat. The gun discharged accidentally as they were driving along, the bullet going through the seat of the car, and a portion of it entering the boy's body. At the Littlefield Hospital, where the child was taken about 4:30 p.m. Sunday, it developed that a portion of the bullet, which apparently had broken in going through the seat of the automobile, had entered the right side of the chest and through his liver. This was removed immediately on entering the hospital.

The boy is being kept under an oxygen tent at the hospital. Although seriously injured, it is believed he is getting along satisfactorily, and unless complications set in, will recover.

## South Plains Cotton Crop Estimated at 1,322,000 Bales

Good progress in South Plains cotton fields last week was reported Saturday by K. N. Clapp, area observer for Anderson-Clayton & Co. Houston cotton firm.

After poor progress due to unfavorable weather during most of July, he said, most plants are fruiting and growing well. Most chipping has been finished, easing localized labor shortages reported last week.

Fleahoppers are on the wane and leaf worms appear under control, but Clapp expressed uneasiness because of increasing bollworms.

Bollworms have been generally present for some time but the infestation has been very light, and mostly eggs, he reported. "The worms now are showing up, with farmers in portions of Lynn county beginning to dust. Dusting probably will become necessary in Lamb County by the end of the coming week.

He termed the available supply of dusting chemicals as "only fair." Shortages of these materials have been reported in many cotton growing regions, he noted.

Clapp did not alter his forecast of the week previous of a "probable" South Plains cotton crop of 1,322,000 bales. But he said conditions of the past week have brightened the prospects for ginnings well in excess of that figure.

## BULL LAKE PHILOSOPHER DECLARES DROP IN PRICES MAY HELP NATIONAL ECONOMY, BUT HAS SURE RUINED HIS

Editor's note: The Bull Lake Philosopher, on his John sen grass farm on Bull Lake is off on economics again this week, and, as it is customary, pretty far off at that, his letter below will reveal.

Dear editor:

I was out here the other afternoon under a shade tree fannin' myself with a copy of the Amarillo Times which makes a better fan than your paper because it's thicker and while I was workin' my arm back and forth slow enough to keep the air stirrin' but not fast enough to work up a sweat, as there is a part in learnin' how to fan just often enough to keep cool without exertin' yourself enough to get hot, an accomplishment it takes years to perfect, and just out of idle curiosity my eyes got to followin' the paper back and forth as I fanned and I noticed an article which said the drop in prices over the nation was considered beneficial to the economy, and while I didn't do anything about readin' further at the time, along late in the afternoon when things cooled off a little and a natural breeze

came up, I stopped fannin' with the side of the paper with that article in it turned face up and read the rest of it.

Accordin' to the Federal Reserve Bank of Philadelphia, the article said, the drop in prices has been "orderly and beneficial."

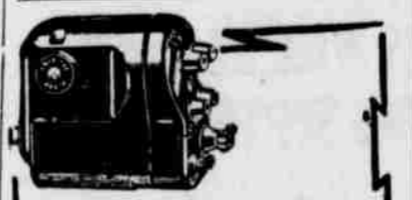
I ain't in no position to argue with the Federal Reserve Bank of Philadelphia, or even a bank in Littlefield, but the fellow who claims the drop in prices has been orderly and beneficial just ain't familiar with my situation out here, and probably not with some of you fellows in town.

Last March, with Johnson grass just beginnin' to come through with a promise of a bumper crop, I bought three Jersey steers for 19 cents a pound. All spring and summer they been doin' fine, gainin' weight and fillin' out, but I checked up yesterday and found out the price of Jersey steers is down to 14c, and the way I figure it is if my steers can gain fifteen more pounds apiece before my grass plays out I can just about get back what I paid for 'em, whereas I had counted on doublin' my money.

As I say, I don't like to dispute

a banker, but there just ain't nothin' beneficial or orderly in a price drop like that, as far as I'm concerned, I already had the money and the profit too spent, even promised my wife a new churn, but the way it looks now I spent the whole spring and summer worryin' with them steers for nothin'. This may help the national economy, but it has sure played thunder with mine.

### Ever Crops Are Important Reducing Soil Erosion

In the fall of '48 we, in Lamb County, experienced some of the worst dust storms that we have ever had. There are many conditions that cause these. One of the most important is the farmer not plowing deep enough to prevent soil erosion. In conditions that existed in the fall of '48, the practices used were not adequate to prevent soil erosion. The growing of manure crops, these crops manure in at least two plowings. They serve as a cover crop for the period that field crops are harvested. This will prevent the land from wind erosion to a great extent. Green manure crops will also add organic matter to the soil which is needed in this section. Green manure crops have been harvested little or no plant residue for a number of years. Legumes as a green manure crop another soil benefit derived—that of adding nitrogen to the soil.

Experiments of the Lubbock experiment station show that Madrid clover is a green manure crop that covers 15 tons of crop to the acre in the first week after being planted in the middle of the previous September. These records also show a yield per acre was substantially increased on the crop in May following the April sowing of the clover, and two years following.

Because of reduced cotton production in the near future it is estimated that the farmer of this county will have to produce his crop in other ways possible. Each farmer is planning now to have a cover crop in the future. Now time to secure seeds that are adapted to use tillage that will increase the value of manure crops to be used in cotton or feed middles. Clover can be used without tillage to cover the land and Austrian winterpeas will be sown in cotton or

feed middles at the time of last cultivation.

Rye or wheat may be mixed with any of the legume crops to increase tonnage of green manure.

Recommended seeding rates for clover—10 pounds per acre—less may be used when mixed with wheat or rye.

Vetch and Austrian winter peas—20 pounds per acre or 10 pounds sown with wheat or rye.

Accordin' to the Federal Reserve Bank of Philadelphia, the article said, the drop in prices has been "orderly and beneficial."

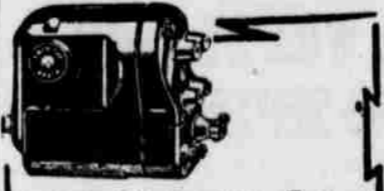

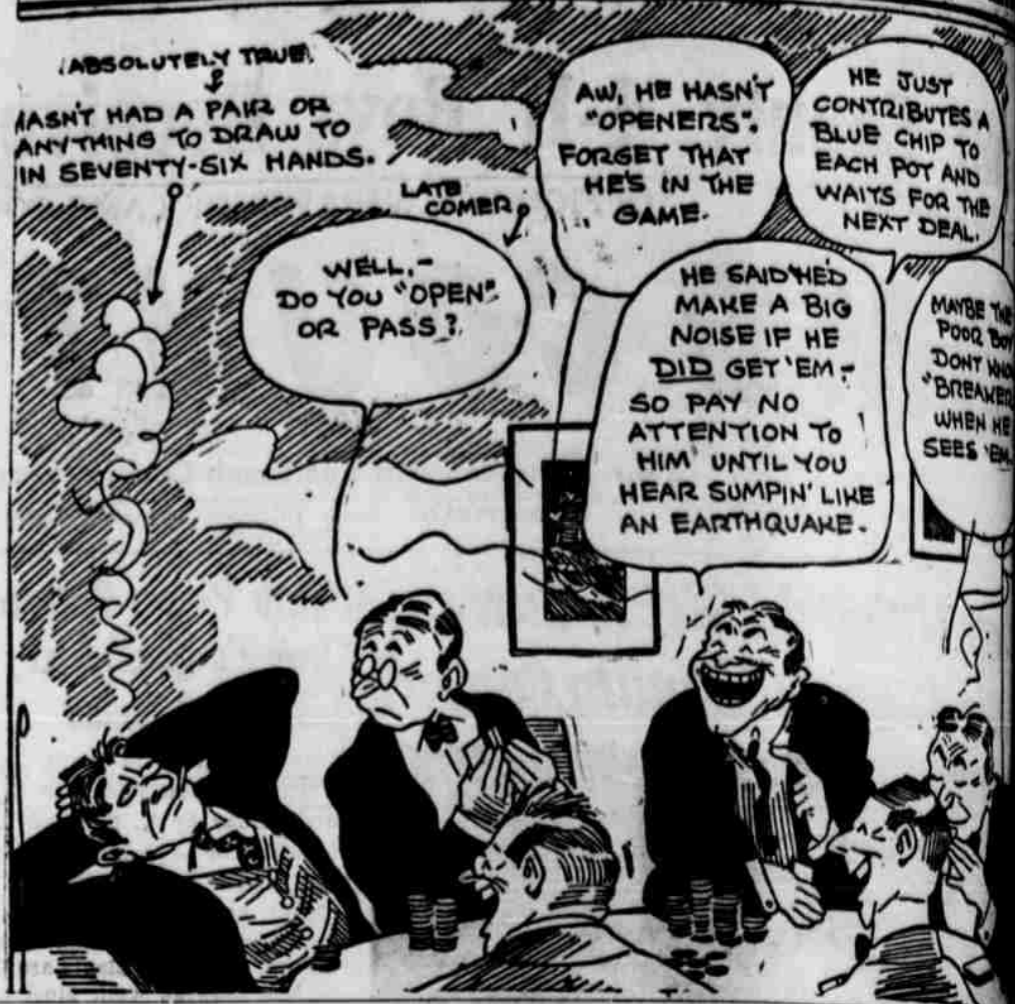

### HAPPINESS RETURNED TO YOUTH WITH PROMISE OF ANOTHER CALF

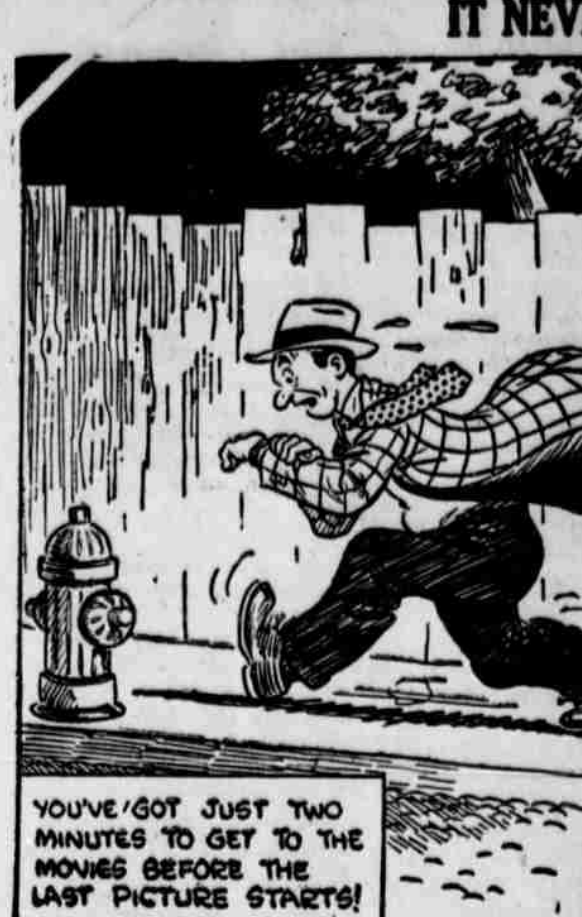
An eight-year-old boy who attended to the 4-H encampment at Panhandle-South Plains fair grounds with a heavy heart went home happy.

# LEGAL NOTICES

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19**

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in certain counties upon a vote of the people therein.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section, to be known and designated as Section 62-c, reading as follows:

"Section 62-c. The Legislature is authorized to provide for the creation of Civil Service Systems for county employees in the respective counties of this State, but any system so authorized and established shall be approved by a vote of the people in said county. Any Civil Service System established by virtue of this Section shall apply to appointive officers only, and the limitations on term of office heretofore provided by Section 30 of this Article shall not apply, but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of such Civil Service System. This Section shall not apply to counties having a population less than seventy-five thousand (75,000) people."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorates of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed or written thereon (or in counties us-

ing voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein"; and

"AGAINST The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 15**

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 48-b, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment of health units, and authorizing a tax in support there-

of.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended, by adding a new section to Article III of said Constitution to be designated Section 48-b, reading as follows:

"Section 48-b. The Legislature

shall have the authority to provide for the organization of county-city health units and the operation there-

of and to authorize counties and cities to provide a tax of not to exceed twenty cents (20c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property in counties and cities for the purpose of financing the said county-city health units; provided that no such tax shall be authorized except by a vote of the people residing in the city or county in which said tax shall apply. The foregoing tax shall be levied only on county valuations."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have written or printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of city-county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof" and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of city-county health

units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

Simmons, assistant county agent, in an interview Monday, he and David Eaton, County Agent, had been cotton insect inspecting farms during the past week, and found quite a number of Flea Hoppers, but that they are on the decrease. He stated that by dusting the farmers had kept the insects down, and that he looked for less damage from now on.

Mr. Simmons stated they found a few boll worms, and he urges farmers to keep on the lookout, and dust with 10 per cent DDT and 40 per cent sulphur, or 3-5-10 mixture.

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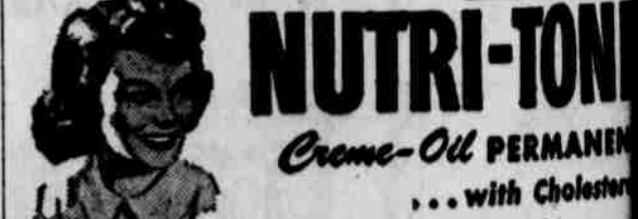
