RECORDS REVEAL SCHOOLS IN TUNE WITH PROGRESS

Have Expanded in Keeping With Development of This Section

The Littlefield school district had its inception in the minds and hearts of a forward looking pioneer people who settled this vast expanse of plains country beginning about the year 1912. Realizing the need of instruction for the children the people started a subscription school in the winter of 1913 and 1914 which served about 16 to 20 pupils. A Mrs. Armstrong taught this first school in a frame building now occupied by J. E. Branner and family as a residence. The building was located in the same place as the Branner home.

By the fall of 1914 the school district was organized into a common school district of about 280 sections of land. This was for some years the largest district in the State of Texas. The first year of regular school was taught with something like twenty pupils in the one room school which previously had housed the subscription school. It seems that a Mr. Hatchett taught this first school. The trustees who had charge of the first school were B. F. Smith, deceased, Arthur P. Duggan, now state senator and John Cling who since that time has moved to Arkansas.





Purpose of History As A H. S. Subject **Explained** in Detaail

By Miss Mary Perkins Teacher of History

Among the various branches of human knowledge usually included in our public school curriculum, none have ndergone such changes in the last decade or two as has the subject of history, which, together with civics, economics, and sociology form a group fittingly termed "social studies."

Not only is history now based on far more reliable sources than it was formerly and deals with more certainty with a much longer period, but our whole conception of the purpose of studying history has changed. Fifteen or twenty years ago the goal of the efficient history teacher was to bring about in the mind of the pupil an accumulation of a number of facts entirely unrelated to the life and interests of the pupil. Now, facts in history are looked upon as valuable only in so much as they furnish the pupil with material for the practice of the habit of correct thinking on the various problems of the world today. In the newer textbooks the authors put no event simply because it happend, but include only those matters that are essential to an understanding of how those problems which now face the world have ari-

fundamental and basic part? We believe, if not with definite proof, with strong practical confidence, that athletics can contribute great social and individual characteristics and attitudes needed for the production of citizens in our great Democratic melting pot.

We believe there is an education in any football. We believe that the group learns team work, team play, organization, cooperation, school spirit, unity, fellowship, self sacrifice, willingness to put the nation above the individual.

We see striking examples in Germany and Italy in particular the influence of great gymnastic demon-strations. The individual learns initiative, aggressiveness, self-confidence, "fighting," self-control, the never-say-die spirit, and leadership.

Out of our athletics came our leaders in military life, our captains of industry, our business exectives, our leaders. Life is a game. It is a great contest. It is the survival of the fittest.

To him with the greatest initiative resourcefulness, determination, confidence, "fight," and to the nation with the greatest cooperative team spirit and unity will go the victories.
