

Local Officer Declares City Ordinances Must Be Considered

City Marshall Len Irvin has declared his intention of enforcing the local traffic ordinances. Speaking of the matter this week to a Leader representative, he said, "It is not the desire of the City Commissioners to cause anyone unnecessary trouble or expense, but the frequent and flagrant violations of the city and state traffic law will in the future be enforced.

The Leader this week printed a quantity of green and red tags. The green ones will be tied to the steering wheels of cars in warning of first offense. When the offence is repeated a red card will be attached, with in structions for the car owner to take in to the Mayor for his consideration. Parties who fail to comply with the red tag will be subject to a furthur fine.

Superintendent R. L. Speight states that the conditions are already so crowded, many of the pupils being forced to sit two in a seat, that it is difficult of accomodations.
