



## County Ranks Tenth In National Cotton Production

### Third In State With 209,473

Lamb County's bumper cotton crop placed the county third in the state and eighth in the nation in the number of bales of 1961 cotton produced. Final bale count, as released by the U. S. Department of Commerce prior to January 16, 1962, showed that the county produced 209,473 bales.

This compares to 172,693 bales produced in 1960 when the county ranked third in the state and tenth in the nation. The county ranked twelfth in 1959 cotton production.

Lubbock and Hockley Counties finished ahead of Lamb County for first and second honors in cotton production in the state. Lubbock County produced 280,175 bales and ranked first in the state while Hockley raised 224,677 bales for second place. Nationwide, Kern County, Calif., produced 442,575 bales of cotton to lead the nation for at least the second year. In 1960, Kern raised 508,399 bales. In second place was Fresno County, Calif., with 414,004 bales and third place went to Pinal County, Ariz., with 313,444 bales.

Lubbock County ranked sixth and Hockley seventh in the national picture. Hale County which placed second in the number of bales produced in 1960 in Texas fell to fifth place in the state and tenth in the nation with a report of 199,563 bales. Dawson County placed ninth nationwide with 206,816 bales.

In the order of the amount of cotton produced, the top ten counties across the nation are: 1. Kern (Calif.) . . . 442,575 2. Fresno (Calif.) . . . 414,004 3. Pinal (Ariz.) . . . 313,444 4. Mack Casler led the Hereford scorers with 25 points with Curtisinger close with 21 points. Grover Pilgrum and Larry Wood tied for the top scorer for the Wildcats with 19 points each.

Hereford went ahead 28 to 11 in the first quarter, led 52 to 26 at the half and 76 to 41 at the three quarter mark. The Herd forged ahead 6 - 0 early in the game and were never behind.

The Hereford "B" team defeated the Wildcat "B" 81 - 43 as Tony Estrada led the locals with 11 points. Eugene Green poured 34 points through the net for the Herd to lead his team.

Littlefield goes to Phillips Friday night for an 8 p.m. contest. Final game of the season will be at Levelland next Tuesday night.

## Republicans File For County Offices Monday

### Three Announce, First In County History

It is not a rumor any more. There will be Republican candidates for at least three county offices in the GOP Primary Election. The trio filed Monday with A. S. Nafzger, county Republican chairman.

The three are Ray Keeling, Littlefield businessman who filed for the office of County Judge; Mrs. Dave Eaton, Littlefield teacher who filed for County School Superintendent; and Bill Carter, area farmer who filed for Lamb County Republican Chairman.

The filings came as no big surprise to most political observers since local Republicans as early as last fall said they would have candidates for county offices in the primary and general elections. This is the first time in the history of Lamb County politics that Republicans have filed for county offices.

Robert Kirk, a Littlefield attorney, announced for State Senator of the 30th District on the Democratic ticket, but found that requirements of the office stated that candidates must have lived in the state five years just prior to the election. Kirk had been out of the state four years until he returned to Littlefield about four months ago. He therefore withdrew his name from the race.

L. M. Burnett announced Monday that he was a candidate for the post of justice of the Peace Precinct 4 in the Democratic Primary, May 5. Already seeking the office vacated by O. M. Edwards, are Lyle Brandon, and J. N. Bowen.

In the County Judge's race, Truett Sides, Olton businessman and farmer, and J. E. Davis, farmer in the Rocky Ford community, will meet headon for the Democratic nomination.

Only one Democratic candidate has filed for County School Superintendent, He is C. Roy Stevens of Littlefield. J. A. Lumsden, former superintendent, resigned the office in January, but had announced last summer that he would not seek re-election.

Three Democratic candidates have filed for the office of State Representative being vacated by Jess Osborn of Muldree. W. T. Millen, a Lazbude farmer, and W. B. Nelson, Dimmitt businessman, announced their intentions to seek the office and join Bill Clayton, Earth businessman and farmer, (See Political on Page 5)

## Meningitis Strikes Littlefield Youth

A Littlefield youth, Robert Richards, son of Mr. and Mrs. Buck Richards, is in Methodist Hospital where he is suffering from spinal meningitis. He has been unconscious since Sunday morning.

Young Richards was admitted to a local hospital about noon Saturday when he complained of pain in his joints, high fever and chills. He was taken to the Lubbock hospital Sunday afternoon.

He is suffering from what doctors call "pneumococcal meningitis" which is "not nearly as infectious or contagious as meningococcal meningitis, the more dangerous and infectious type." (See Richards on Page 5)

## Lutherans Will Break Sanctuary Ground

Ground breaking ceremonies for a \$60,000 sanctuary addition to the Emmanuel Lutheran Church will be held at 11:30 a.m. Sunday morning, immediately after the morning worship services. The announcement was made this week by Rev. E. L. Hohle, pastor of the local church.

Actual construction of the addition will begin in about two weeks with W. B. Abbott and Company of Lubbock receiving the contract to build the 4,051 square feet sanctuary.

Rev. Hohle said when the new sanctuary is completed the present area used for a sanctuary will be converted into needed classroom space. The existing buildings, located on West Third, were erected in 1954.

Planning of the new addition by the 215-member congregation has been going on for the past several years, but was finalized late last year. The sanctuary should be ready for use by late summer or early fall, Rev. Hohle stated.

He continued that the ground breaking ceremonies would be simple and brief with the building committee and the pastor turning over the ground at the site of the new addition.

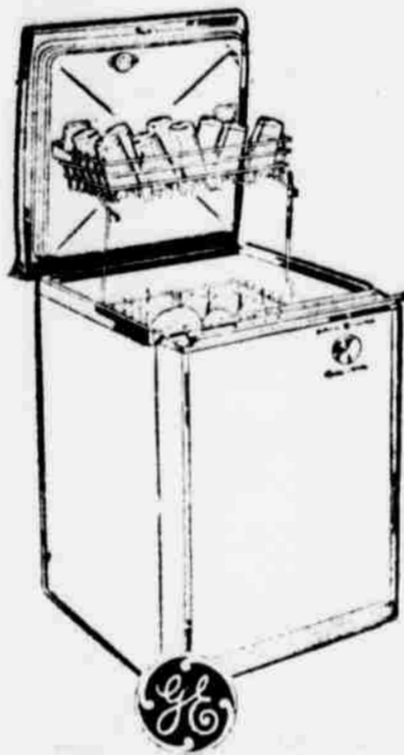

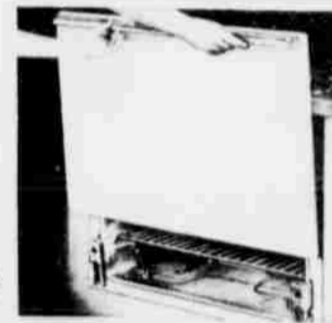

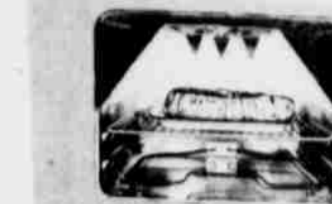

Total cotton production for 1961 for Texas totaled 4,744,459 bales as compared to 4,269,976 for 1960. These figures do not include linters and are the total running bales.

 morial Hospital. Bynum died at 5:15 p.m., about two and one-half hours after the wreck. Long was listed in fair condition at the Clovis Hospital. He suffered a compound fracture of the right leg, bruises and lacerations.

Also killed in the crash was a hunting dog which apparently had been riding in the cab of the pickup. A second dog, which had been riding in a cage in the back of the truck was apparently not injured.

Force of the collision turned the Goodman car completely around, leaving it facing west.

Bynum was buried in Amherst Cemetery under the direction of Payne Funeral Home.

Survivors include his mother; a brother, Almond Bynum, McAllen; two half-brothers, Aubrey O'Neal of Amarillo and Leon O'Neal of Salem, Ore., and a sister, Mrs. Gladys Frye of Amarillo.

### INSTRUCTIONS FOR USING RAIN GAUGE AND RECORDER

First, place the Rain Gauge in a location that is fully exposed to the elements. We suggest the top of a fence post near the home or a post placed in the ground for this purpose.

Second, set the aluminum dial at zero (0). After a rainfall the amount can be determined on the scale, beside the glass tube, which is divided into tenths of an inch. Should the amount of rainfall measure one-half inch in the tube you can then simply record this on the aluminum dial by moving it exactly half way between zero and one. This can be repeated after each rainfall. The reading on the aluminum dial will then show you at a glance the amount of rainfall during a specific period or season.

## Hereford Man Files For State Rep Race
