



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

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Keep an accurate record INSTRUCTIONS FOR USING RAIN GAUGE AND RECORDER

First, place the Rain Gauge in a location that is fully exposed to the elements. We suggest the top of a fence post near the home or a post placed in the ground for this purpose.

Second, set the aluminum dial at zero (0). After a rainfall the amount can be determined on the scale, beside the glass tube, which is divided into tenths of an inch. Should the amount of rainfall measure one-half inch in the tube you can then simply record this on the aluminum dial by moving it exactly half way between zero and one. This can be repeated after each rainfall. The reading on the aluminum dial will then show you at a glance the amount of rainfall during a specific period or season.

## Hereford Man Files For State Rep Race

J. Frank Ford, Jr., has authorized the Leader to announce his candidacy for the Texas House of Representatives from the 91st District.

Running as a Republican Party candidate, Ford will seek election within the district which includes Deaf Smith, Lamb, Bailey, Castro and Parmer

A 29-year-old Deaf Smith County farmer, Ford is associated with Arcowhead Mills in Hereford. He is a 1955 graduate of Texas A & M College with a degree in agronomy. He served 30 months with the U.S. Army, rising to the rank of Captain in artillery.

He worked with the South Legislature in Austin in 1959 and then was in the legal division of the State Board of Water Engineers.

Ford and his wife, Mirjorie Ann, have two children; Davis, 4, and Cindy, 2. They expect a third child in March, The Fords are members of the First Methodist Church of Hereford,
