Porter of Pensylvania has announced that he will propose that President Coolidge call an international conference for the simplification of the calendar early in the short session. The resolution would have Mr. Coolidge authorize the conference to discuss the adoption of the simplified calendar of thirteen months of four weeks each.

#### **COTTON DROPPED \$3** BALE ON GOVERNM'T REPORT SATURDAY

Cotton prices broke nearly \$3.00 per bale and recovered only slightly on the New York Cotton Excannge last Saturday when the government's final cotton estimate placed the yield at 14,373,000 bales, or about 300,-000 bales more than the trade had expected.

Prices had advanced in early trading on short covering and commission house buying, but when trading was resumed after the 15-minute suspension to receive the report, a rush to unload sent them down precipitately.

Prices Have Changes January which had advanced to 20.39 cents a pound, fell to 19.73. December had sold at 20.47 but was pushed down to 19.85, while May slumped from the morning's high price of 20.35 to 19.74.

Closing prices were around the low levels of the day and about a cent a pound under the prices reached during last month's advance. January at 19.75, December at 19.85 and May at 19.75.

Average of trade estimates had placed the yield at 14,100,000 bales, while in some quarters a report of 14,200,000 was expected, with indications of heavy liquidation if the actual figures approximated that total.

The government report, last to be received this year, compares with the November 8 estimate of 14,133,-000 bales and last year's actual crop of 12,955,000.

#### Weather Has Influence

The department, in announcing the estimate, said "The final total ginnings for the season will depend on whether the various influences affecting the harvesting of the portion of the crop still in the field will be more or less favorable than usual."

The acreage for harvest was reported as 45,326,000 acres and the percent of abandonment since July 1 was given as 3.4 percent and the indicated yield per acre of lint cotton was placed at 151.8 pounds. The department said that on July 1 the acreage in cultivation was 46,943,000






Nothing contributes so much to the outside appearance of a house as appropriate plantings about it.

The best locations for plant groups are the most prominent points, usually the front corners of the house and porch, or a large bare wall unbroken by windows, where the larger or more conspicuous plants should be used. The legume hays, alfalfa and clover, produce more hay per acre than does thmothy, and are higher in digestible protein, one of the most expensive nutrients in the dairy cow's

An average acre of alfalfa in 1927 produced almost seven times as much improved highways. digestible protein as an acre of timothy, and 15 times as much lime.





#### CANNED APRICOTS. PEACHES AND PEARS

#### Useful for Many Tempting Desserts and Salads.

Prepared by the United States Department of Apriculture.)

There are so many uses for home canned peaches, pears, and, if you hap pen to have them, for apricots, that it is well worth while to can a generous supply of these good fruits, especially if you have a home-grown sur-In some markets it may even pay to buy peaches and pears for canning. In addition to their use as breakfast fruits, there are many tempting desserts and salads that can be evolved with canned peaches or pears as a basis fruit mixtures, gela tin desserts, combinations with ice cream or whipped cream, pastry, and plain canned fruit with cake or cookles.

These fruits may all be canned in water-bath. There are slight differences in the preparation of each fruit for canning, and in the time of processing, but the general method is about the same.

Before preparing the fruit make a thin or medium prup to pour over it in the jars. For a thin sirup put one part of sugar into three parts of water and bring to the boiling point; for a medium sirup use one part of sugar to two parts of water. The choice of sirup depends on personal taste and the sweetness of the feult you are using. In making the sirup for peaches, an unusually fine flavor is obtained by boiling a few cracked peach pits in the sirup for five min-

Use only clean sound fruit, and can ft as soon after picking as possible. To remove the skin from peaches and apricots, scald them and then dip them into cold water. If you are canning a very large quantity of peaches, the lye method of removing the skins may be used. Directions for doing this are given in Farmers' Bulletin 1471-F. "Canning Fruits and Vegetables at Home," Send to the United States Department of Agriculture for it. After it has been peeled, cut the full into halves or sunlier pieces and remove rod, while in a hen not laying the the pits. Pack at once, placing the halves in overlapping layers, the concave surface of each haif downward Fill up the containers with boiling sir Process quart and pint glass fars for 25 minutes in bolling water If the fruit is fairly hard and firm, or for 20 minutes if it is ripe and tender. Process No. 2 and No. 3 tin cans for 15 minutes.

Select firm sound pears that are not overripe. Pare, quarter or halve them and cook in boiling sirup for four to eight minutes, according to the size and ripeness of the fruit. This precooking makes the hard varieties of peace containers and fill them up with boiling sirup. Process containers of all sizes for 20 minutes in builing water
