

Montgomery Major; Made Over 150 Missions

Major Montgomery recently wrote his parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. P. Montgomery of Hart Camp, that he had "chalked up" three more German planes, raising his total German planes destroyed to 18; and that he had been promoted to Major.

Major Montgomery is operations officer of the 334th Fighter Squadron, the first American Squadron to shoot down a total of 300 German planes.

Major Montgomery has been in combat duty for more than two years, except for two furloughs, the last summer, spent in U. S., which 30 days was a furlough. His furlough was spent with his parents here, where he celebrated his 22nd birthday. His wife, Mrs. Elizabeth Montgomery, of Fort Worth, accompanying him on furlough.

His combat duty began in the summer of 1942 with the RAF. He entered the American Army in February, 1943, in England, as a flight officer, and has since been promoted through ranks of second lieutenant, first lieutenant, and captain to present rank of Major.

Major Montgomery, up to last summer, has made 150 missions, and he wrote his father sometime ago that he had made many missions since the German break-through. He pilots a P-51 Mustang, the fastest of the propeller type of fighter planes.

April 25 Deadline Federal Crop Applications

Contracts Now Being Written By Lamb Co. ACA Representative

Lamb county farmers have until April 25 to place their 1945 crops under the all-risk Federal crop insurance program, according to E. Clayton, chairman of the Lamb County ACA Committee.

The new insurance program will give farmers a choice of coverage up to 75 per cent of average yield, and the other 50 per cent. The insurance covers coverage against crop loss from drought, flood, hail, wind, winter-kill, wildfire, hurricanes, insects, plant diseases and hazards determined by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation.

Contracts are now being written by Lamb County ACA office.

The stage of the cotton crop's development will determine the maximum indemnity to be recovered in event of loss, E. C. Clayton said. A loss occurs after it's too late to replant, but prior to first cultivation, the indemnity would be 40 per cent of the maximum insured production. The indemnity would be released after the first cultivation and the harvest would be indemnified to the extent of 75 per cent of the maximum coverage. Indemnity for crop occurring after harvest but before delivery to the gin would be 50 per cent of the maximum coverage.

Indemnities payable under the program may be used as collateral security for government-sponsored commodity loans.

Take Part In First B-29 Raid On Tokyo

Bomber Command Headquarters, Guam. (Delayed) — Two B-29s from Littlefield, Texas, are among the hundreds of enlisted men and sergeants Superfortress base in the Philippines whose diligent efforts made it possible for the giant bombers of Major General Curtis E. LeMay's XXI Bomber Command to strike regularly at the heart of Japan's war industry.

They are members of a combat group commanded by Brigadier General Emmett O'Donnell, Jr., who led the first B-29 striking force to Saipan to bomb Tokyo's aviation industry on November 24, 1944.

The work of these men and their crews is directly responsible for the success of the B-29s in bombing Japan's war industries.

O'Donnell said in congratulatory letters to them: "These men realize their responsibilities in the pre-mission of insuring the maximum probability for safe return of the air

Tommy Winters Killed In Action

Mr. and Mrs. Piron Winters of eight miles southwest of Littlefield received a telegram Saturday morning from the War Department reporting that their son, Tommy Winters, S 1-C, was killed in action in the Southwest Pacific.

The telegram also stated to please not divulge the name of the ship he was on, or the location in which he might be, as it would give information to the enemy.

The message also advised the parents that his remains were interned in Allied territory.

Searman Winters was in the Southwest Pacific serving with the Amphibious Forces.

Searman Winters joined the Navy at the age of 20 in November, 1942, and had not had a leave home since. He received his "boot" training in San Diego, and was then sent to Treasure Island for six months additional schooling. From there he went to New York for a short time, and was then transferred to the Pacific, where he has taken part in several major battles, including Guadalcanal, Gilbert Islands, Tarawa, Iwo Jima, Saipan, and Philippines.

Searman Winters was born March 3, 1922, at Abilene, Texas, moving here with his parents at the age of three. He spent his entire school years in the Littlefield schools.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Winters, two sisters, Maxene at home, and Mrs. J. B. Davis of north of Littlefield; also his maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Green of Abilene, Texas.

Local Rotary Club To Sponsor Project For Overseas Needy

All Civic And Social Clubs To Be Asked To Take Part In Work

Sponsored by the Littlefield Rotary Club, with G. M. Shaw as county chairman, and civic and social clubs cooperating, during the month of April Littlefield will participate in the United National Clothing collection drive for war relief.

Mr. Shaw stated Saturday he had not appointed his co-workers, but that he expected all civic and social clubs in the county would assist, and that a meeting of the representatives from the various groups would be called this week to set up the organization, and get the project underway.

Mrs. L. T. Green was named chairman from the Woman's Study Club.

A system of collecting, sorting and shipping will be carried out. Only good sturdy clothing is wanted—clothing either for winter or summer wear that still has a lot of good left in it. No "frumpies" such as evening dresses, open heel and toe shoes, high heeled shoes, or women's hats are wanted. The clothing is for people who in some cases have only enough clothing in an entire family for one member to venture out in public at a time.

What is needed is good men's, women's, boys' and girls' clothing of all kinds—from underwear to warm caps and gloves. Baby clothes, especially knit goods are particularly needed. All kinds of bedding is in urgent need, if it is in serviceable condition.

Ralph B. McClure Gets Silver Wings

Completing many months of training Ralph B. McClure, Jr., has received the silver wings of an Army Air Forces Pilot at the recent graduation held at Stockton Field, Stockton, Calif.

In gaining the coveted silver wings of any Army Air Forces Pilot he has entered the charmed circle of alumni who have distinguished themselves heroically in the sky over many global war fronts since their departure from this famous Army Air Forces Training Command Pilot School. He will be placed on active duty with the Army Air Forces immediately.

The awarding of the wings and assignment to active duty with the Army Air Forces comes after months of study and training in pre-flight, primary, basic and advanced flying schools.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph B. McClure, Whitharral, Tex. Lieut. Ralph B. McClure, Jr., has been home on an 11-day leave, and left Sunday for Kingman, Arizona. He will train on B-17 before going overseas.

Sgt. John Porcher Killed In Action

Mr. and Mrs. John Porcher received a telegram Wednesday from the War Department notifying them that their son, Sgt. John W. Porcher, III, 19, was killed in action January 14 in Germany.

They had previously, on February 6, received a message from the War Department stating that he was missing in action in Germany since January 14.

Sgt. Porcher was an aerial gunner on a B-17 Flying Fortress, with the Eighth Air Force, stationed in England.

He was serving with the veteran and colorful 390th Bomb Group, and has seen action with the Eighth Air Force in bombing attacks against vital Nazi targets in support of growing Allied ground operations. A release from the Eighth Air Force base recently also reported his taking part in bombing underground fuel reservoirs near Bingen, also over Frankfurt, and road and rail junctions near Marshal Karl von Rundstedt's breakthrough.

He is a graduate of Littlefield High school, and was a student at Tech college, Lubbock.

He had been in the service a year and a half; and overseas since September.

Sgt. Porcher's group holds a Presidential Citation for its highly successful attack on ball-bearing factories at Schweinfurt, Germany, last year, and is a unit of the Third Bombardment Division, cited by the President for its historic England-to-Africa shuttle bombing of Messerschmitt plants at Regensburg, Germany, in August of 1943.

Buford Humphries Returns To States

Capt. Buford M. Humphries, son of Mr. and Mrs. N. H. Humphries of Las Cruces, N. M., formerly of Littlefield, is back in the States for re-assignment after having spent 17 months in the Pacific war area.

Capt. Humphries has 42 combat missions to his credit. He has seen action in the Gilberts, Marshalls, and Mariannas. His squadron was one of the first to take part in the bombing of Guam. He was based on Saipan before returning to the States.

He wears the Distinguished Flying Cross, with the Oak Leaf Cluster, the American Theatre area ribbon, and the Pacific area ribbon with three major battle stars. He is visiting friends in Big Springs, Texas, also Abilene, and will return home for a short visit again with his parents before reporting for re-assignment at the distribution center on the West Coast.

Ray Kasey, about 18, and son of Mr. and Mrs. M. V. Kasey of 10 miles southeast of Littlefield, suffered injury Tuesday about noon in a feed mill at his farm home. His left arm is reported to have been broken in two places, and he was taken to the Littlefield Hospital.

Pvt. Robert L. Gee, 22, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. S. Gee of Littlefield, was killed in action on Luzon March 7, according to a telegram from the War Department received Tuesday morning, in which was added that a "confirming letter follows."

Pvt. Gee was in a Replacement unit, and recently transferred to the 158th Infantry.

He had been in service about a year, and overseas since last December.

He attended Sudan schools, and previous to entering the service he worked at the Club Cafe.

He is married and leaves a wife and two small children, Elizabeth Ann and Robert Leon, Jr.

The last letter his wife received from him was dated February 28, and received last Thursday.

A brother, Pfc. Ernest Elmo Gee, was wounded last June on Biak Island, in New Guinea. He is now stationed at Courtland Field, Ala.

Another brother, Pfc. Hollis Gee, is with the Anti-Aircraft and stationed on the French coast.

All FFA Chapters In District Are Taking Part In Exhibits

The Sixth Annual FFA and 4-H Stock Show will be held here Saturday, March 31, as announced by Edwin Matthews, Vocational Agricultural instructor of the Littlefield schools.

The show will be held in the Cameron Lumber Company yard.

All FFA Chapters from over the district will participate in the show this year, including Morton, Muleshoe, Sundown and Levelland, which did not take part in previous years.

Therefore, a larger than ever attendance is expected.

The classes to be shown will be about the same, with two additional classes, one an open class of boars and a class of three lambs.

Ray C. Mowery of Texas Tech will be the judge as in former years.

The entry blanks are coming in good for all classes, except hogs and sheep, and it is hoped that before Thursday's deadline, more entries for these classes will be received.

All animals must be in their proper places and grounds cleared of all rubbish by not later than 10 a. m. Saturday, and must stay on grounds until 4:30 p. m. of the same day. Animals showing in individual classes may be a member of a litter, group or pen.

An exhibitor may show as many individuals in each class as he has indicated on the entry card. The judges' decision shall be final, and in no case will an appeal be recognized.

The judge may refuse to award a premium to an animal not judged worthy.

- G. Chester White Gilts.
- H. Any other gilts.
- I. Sows. Winners of Classes E, F, G, H, and I show for Grand Champion.
- J. Open Class Boars.
- K. Litter of Five Pigs, must weigh over 150 pounds.
- L. Sow and Litter. (Sow must be suckling pigs).
- M. Fat Lambs, less than one year of age.
- N. Pen of 3 Lambs (one of which may be shown as an individual).
- O. Beef Heifers, less than 3 years of age and must not have dropped a calf at date of showing.
- P. Dual Purpose Heifers.
- Q. Dairy Heifers (that have not dropped a calf).
- R. Dairy Cows.

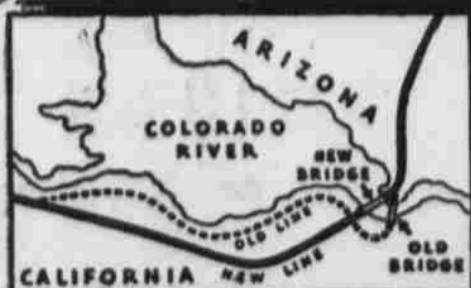

Survivors Should Contact Social Security Board

Survivors of deceased servicemen who worked in employment covered by the Social Security Act prior to their entrance into the armed forces were urged to contact the nearest Social Security Board field office by Sam Leifeste, manager of the Lubbock field office.

"In addition to any benefits payable from War Risk Insurance, there may also be some payment from the Old-Age and Survivors Insurance system," Leifeste stated. "These payments," he continued, "can be made if the worker (the serviceman or woman) was insured under the Social Security plan, particularly if the deceased is survived by minor children, since monthly payments continue until the youngest child reaches age 18."

"Delay in filing the claim after notice of death is received may result in some loss of benefit by the survivor," Leifeste added.
