180,000 ACRES PLANTED IN GRAIN

Lamb County Has 341,000 Acres Under Irrigation

Twenty-four hundred Lamb County farmers are now irrigating 341,000 acres of land, 180,000 acres are planted in grain sorghums, 133,000 in cotton, 10,000 in alfalfa, 4,000 in vegetables, 8,000 in corn and 6,000 in grasses, legumes, sesame, and others. There are 4,000 irrigation wells in the county.

Almost a quarter of a million acres was added to the total acreage under irrigation in the High Plains area of Texas during the past year. 5,635 additional wells will furnish water to take care of the additional acreage and to do a better job of irrigating existing lands.

D. W. Sherrill, irrigation agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, revealed these facts in the annual survey of irrigation covering 42 counties.

Information for the survey was obtained from data supplied by agricultural agents in the counties concerned and points out the great importance of irrigation to the Plains' agricultural industry.

The report shows that 18,344 farms in the 42 counties are irrigated. The total acreage under irrigation now totals 4,548,880 acres and the number of wells at 42,225.

Hale County farmers are now irrigating 500,000 acres and led the area in that respect. Lubbock and Hockley counties have the largest number of irrigated farms and number of wells.

Seven counties in the area, Deaf Smith, Farmer, Castro, Swisher, Hale, Lamb and DeWitt, are listed as having in excess of 300,000 acres.

Natural gas is being used for 19,544 wells, butane for 16,268 wells, and electricity on 5,847 wells. The lift on 12,367 wells was under 125 feet and over 125 feet on 29,198 wells.

Major crops irrigated are cotton, wheat, and grain sorghum. These have a combined acreage total of just over 4 million. Sorghum, corn, legumes, pasture, and vegetables are other irrigated crops.

Littlefield's First Mayor Retires

B. L. (Uncle Josh) Cogdill, Littlefield's first mayor, turned in his badge to officials of the City of Lubbock as city building inspector.

Cogdill, who has inspected the construction of homes in which nearly half of the population of Lubbock lives, says that he doesn't figure that his career is over by any means.

Cogdill, 72, has been a building inspector for the City of Lubbock since 1946 soon after he left Littlefield. He has been responsible for supervising the construction of more than \$200 million worth of homes and buildings.

During Lubbock's post war building boom, Cogdill inspected 14,000 new residences for structural weaknesses. He also inspected additions to older homes.

Besides all of the homes he has inspected, Cogdill also has checked the construction of a \$25 million worth of schools, \$3 million worth of churches and \$9 million worth of hospitals, clinics and city, county buildings, plus other millions of dollars worth of business structures there.

Is a Native Texan
Born at Thorp Springs, a little town southwest of Fort Worth near Granbury, Cogdill lived in that area until 1913. He worked in the building trade in Fort Worth for several years and for three years, drove a street car there.

In 1913, Cogdill moved to Post as a carpenter. He helped build many of the early homes and buildings there. He was married to a Post school teacher, Faye Morris in 1923 and the same year they moved to Littlefield, where he was just then being organized.

He managed Higginbotham Bartlett Lumber Co. in Littlefield for many years and when the town was incorporated, Cogdill became the first mayor.

Mrs. Cogdill taught in the Littlefield schools for many years. The couple were active workers in the First Methodist Church. He served on the Official Board all of the time he lived in Littlefield. Mrs. Cogdill was an active member of the Woman's Club and other civic clubs.

In 1928 Cogdill went into the house building business for himself. The depression wiped him out.

During the 1930's Cogdill held several positions, including the management of a grain elevator. In 1941 he moved to Lubbock as a representative of the Youth Administration. At the close of the war he went to work in the city building department.

He and his wife reside at 212 1/2th St. Their son, Jack, is now head of the speech department at Panhandle A&M College at Goodwell, Okla.

Through the years, Cogdill's nickname of "Josh" has become "Uncle Josh" to most people who know him. He recalls that this name has been with him ever since he was six years old and played the part of a farmer in a Sunday School play.

Cogdill isn't certain what he will do—but he plans to work. He has had two or three offers at it. He is no hurry to make up his mind. In interviewing old timers of Littlefield, all of them expressed the desire to see "Josh and Faye" move back to Littlefield.

High Plains Station Plants 50 Varieties of Soybeans

Research projects on soybeans at the High Plains Station include 50 varieties in 100 foot plots four rows to the plot. Each plot is repeated four times with a total of 200 rows in irrigated plots. One variety is being tested in the dry-

land area at the station in four plots.
 Fifty varieties of soybeans have been planted in observation test plots, 22 feet long. These observation plots are also repeated four times.

Lumber Treatment Advisable

College Station, August — The "big three" wood destroyers — termites, rot and fire — are making a "double-barrel" attack on homes across the nation.
 The annual losses caused by these wood destroyers are estimated at several hundred million dollars. Losses caused by termites alone are estimated at 150 to 200 million dollars annually, according to C. W. Simmons, extension farm forester.
 Termites and rot gain easy entrance into unprotected and carelessly built homes. Warm, moist, unventilated foundations are built too close to the ground. The soil sometimes is leveled above the grade beam and concrete steps and porches are layered against untreated wood.
 Lumber is still the most widely used construction material, says the forester. Sapwood and only sapwood can be treated with chemicals to provide permanent, lasting construction at a lower cost than steel or stone. Lumber of this kind, when pressure treated to retain as much as two to four pounds per cubic foot or one-tenth pound per board foot of a chemical such as copperized chromated zinc chloride, will be resistant to termites, decay and burning for many decades.
 Soft wood, continues Simmons, can be treated satisfactorily by simple and cheap methods. Long poles and house logs of most species can be treated green by the line tube method. Pinus can be treated by any of the processes. They can be seasoned with bark on and peel three times later after seasoning. Too, they will soak up three to five times more of low cost chemicals, such as borax water sealed over by soaking again in lime water or chromated zinc chloride. If more poles from young sapwood trees were treated and used in simple types of construction, there would be no end to the supply of low cost materials.

 Theme of the Congress meet in Lubbock is "What is Quality Cotton?" Barris C. Jackson, Hillsboro, is General Chairman and will make the keynote address.
 Speakers include Charles C. Wilson, West Point, Ga., Director of Research, West Point Manufacturing Company; Levon Ray, Agronomist at the Lubbock Experiment Station; V. L. Stedronsky, Director of Southwestern Ginning Research Laboratory at Mesilla Park, N.M.; D. C. Prince, Secretary of the Lubbock Cotton Exchange; and George W. Pfeiffer, Executive Vice President of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock.

A panel discussion by three High Plains farmers — Earl Laney of Hale Center, Virgil Hill of Kress, and Frank Gray, Lubbock — will be a feature of the morning session.

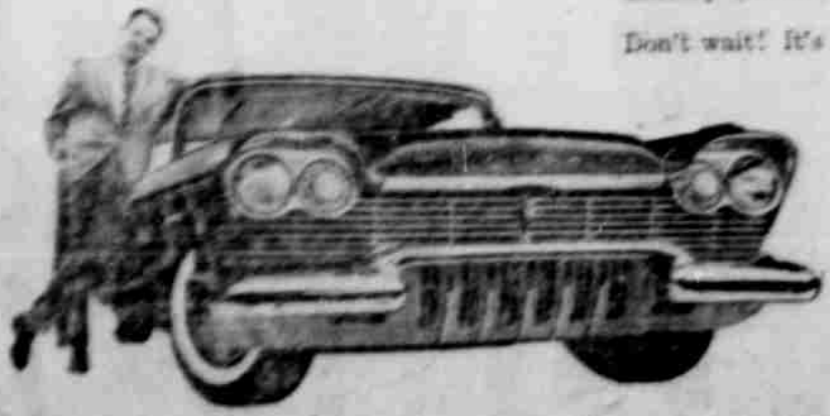
