



FARMERS MAPPING LAND USE PROGRAM FOR 194

Farm Plan Sheets To Be Prepared Under AAA Plan Farmers Will Be Aided

In Program By County, **Community Committees**

COLLEGE STATION, February 27-Planned farming goes on a wide front in 1940 when thousands of Texas farmers will map out their own farming plans for the coming year on the AAA's Farm Plan Sheet.

Closely linked with the Farm Plan is the 1940 Agricultural Conservation Handbook for Texas, this year being the first time the state has had a special publication listing only the provisions of the program applicable to Texas.

By studying the Handbook and applying to his farm the practices most needed, the individual farmer can plan his year's operations so as to use to the best advantage the AAA program, according to George Slaughter, chairman of the state Agricultural Conservation Associa- work already started on state, countion committee.




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

Many Ducks Reported On U. S. Game Refuge Near Muleshoe

There were, a few weeks ago, probably 100,000 ducks spending the winter on the U.S. game refuge south of Muleshoe, in Bailey county according to Max Lindsey, with the U. S. biological survey in Lubbock,

who visited the refuge. In the refuge are about 7,500 acres of land, including a lake three quarters of a mile long. The lake was made by building a dam

across a creek. The survey has a warden stationed there. He feeds the ducks grain, averaging 500 pounds a day. The grain was raised on the refuge.

Lindsey said he was at the refuge late in December and that it was estimated at that time there were between 175,000 and 250,000 ducks around the lake. "They were so thick on the water you could not ee it," he said.


