

## **County Records** Two November Traffic Deaths

There were ten rural traffic accidents in Lamb County dur-ing the month of November, according to Sergeant D.S. Law-son, Highway Patrol Supervisor

of this area. From these crashes resulted · two deaths, four persons injured and a loss of \$5,820,00

in property damage.
Summarizing rural traffic accidents from January through
November of 1966, the picture shows 113 wrecks, ten persons killed, 47 persons injured and \$98,690.00 in property damage.

The most deadly month of the year is here again. The Patrol Supervisor stated that during each month of the past five years there was only one month higher than the month of December. Of the 12,171 persons killed during the last five years over 10 percent of them were killed during the month of December.

Of the 1,246 persons killed in traffic accidents during the month of December over the past five years over 30 percent were killed during the Christmas holidays. This means that the Christmas holidays are about three times as deadly as the remaining days during the month of December.

# Weekly Bale Count Could Reach 40,000

Lamb County's weekly bale count could go as high as 40,000 bales this week, if the weather that has blessed the county the

early part of the week continues.

A check with the Littlefield office of the Texas Employment Commission Wednesday, revealed the total ginnings since Friday of last week could be one of the highest of the year. The office has not made acount since last week, but judging from conversations with ginners and the observations ar-ound the area this week's pro-

duction could push the total figure, to date, to 150,000 bales. As of last Fridsy morning Lamb County gins had weighed across 111,609 bales of the 1964 harvest, estimates for the final figure are ranging bet-usen 180,000 and 198,000 bales.

Should this week's total bring the county close to the 150,000 bale mark, indications are that the harvest will be complete by mid-January. Early in the harvest year some experts were predicting afinished by Christ-mas harvest, however inclimate conditions have cut into the tempo of the picking and strip-

ping activity.
Should the expected cold front blow into the area today, it would bring to a standstill the harvest, and set back the expected finish date. In looking over the county it appears that the bulk of the harvest is now being done by machine, with only a few pullers left in the county. The TEC reported that there are still about 600 hands in the area, and extreme cold or wet weather could finish what little pulling remains.

The activity seems to be the heaviest in the Northeast section of the county, where gin yards are full to overflowing.

# Duggan, Mitchell, Elms, Russell Elected C of C Directors

Littlefield Chamber of Com-merce President, Jerry Sand-ers, Wednesday, amounced the election of Arthur Duggan, H.A. (Mitch) Mitchell, Rip Elms, and Charles Russell, to the board sibilities of purchasing an ac-tivities bus to be used by var-ious school groups on trips and other school activities.
