When producers seed acreage equal to their entire wheat allotment and actual production falls below the normal yield, the corresponding amount of excess wheat would be converted to free wheat at the time the wheat crop is har-

If farmstored wheat is delivered to the Commodity Credit Corporation in settlement of the loan, the borrower may collect 12 cents a bushel storage allowance. Delivery of the wheat in payment of the loan, however, is considered marketing and calls for payment of the penalty unless a release is secured, the AAA official pointed out.

> Farmers who wish to sell or feed their excess may pay the marketing penalty of 49 cents a bushel on the amount of the excess. They will then be free to maket or feed their entire wheat crops.

Every wheat farm has a wheat marketing quota, and the only wheat that is subject to penalty when marketed or othewise disposed of is the smaller of the actual or normal yield on the acres in excess of the farm's acreage allotment,


