A public library in Littlefield is a fact with which many of the citizens are not acquainted, and a service which many more have not used. But such a library is in operation, and has been giving pleasure and help to those who axail themselves of it. Look for it the next time you go to the City Hall.
The Library received Saturday, Mrs. J. H. Barnett, Iibrarian, stated, a new shipment of books from the State Library at Austin. This shipment is a part of the series of books known as the "travelling library" and is loaned te various civic organizations for a three-month period and may be renewed.

They ask that every one take advantage of the opportunities offered and to tell rhers to visit the library. Such a project deserves the support of every citizen, and will repay in the service it gives to Littlefield.
