### More Money To Spend

This figure is not as high as that of 1929, when the total money which changed hands was estimated at over \$78,000,000,000; but it is higher than in any of the three sublications to be at least of said preceding years. The year 1933 was the low-water mark, prior to the 10th day of August, in which only \$44,940,000,000 was spent, and in that year a great deal of the money paid out came from previous savings.

There are probably around 50,000,000 persons, men and women, who receive and spend all of the money that is received and spent in the United States. These 50,000,000 carry the other 80,000,000 on their backs. On that basis of calculation, the average cash income of the American family for last year was a little over \$1,000 each. The highest it ever reached was a little over \$1,500 per family. We never had a total income of as much as \$100,000,000,000 in a single year.

Of course, these figures relate only to actual money which changed hands. They do not take into account any of the subsistence which the 6,000,000 farm families got from their own land. If that could be reduced to a cash basis the total and the average income would be considerably increased.

From one point of view this national income of a little over \$1,000 a year per person seems very low, but it is practically double the average income of the people of England and of France and nearly three times that of the people of Germany and Italy.

We feel hard up in America simply because we don't handle as much money as we did for a few years, but that feeling of poverty is a matter of standards. At the very depth of the depression the general run of Americans had more comfort and luxury than the average European can ever hope to acquire.

It is good news indeed that we are on our way back toward what we had learned in the 1920's to regard as the American standard of living.





HOME ECONOMICS DEPARTMENT

The Spade School Board, at recent meeting, approved plans for the installation of home economics in the high school and for further modernizing the entire school curriculum in courses and in methods.

The grammar school years will gomery, whe recently resigned that consist of only four courses each; namely, language arts, manual arts, graduation. This is only an emerapplied sciences, perceptive reading, geny measure. Each of these branches of study will cover a number of the old traditional courses, overlapping in and at least one extra curricula some cases where interest lends and credit. the fall without the necessity of repetition seems profitable. Each will be unfolded with the pupils' interest uppermost, and interest will determine the amount of time given each day to any particular recitation. Play and seat work will be stressed and all material will be presented in a more or less activity

> Competent teachers have been se cured for this work, and one teacher has been assigned to each grade as a centralized unit of the work as a whole. The schools will have in all eleven teachers next year. Two accredited units have been added to the list for the high school, making a total of 17 credits.

> The program of study, as out-lined by Supt. Jack D. Wester, and approved for the high school by the board of trustees is given in brief ummary below:

SUBJECTS OFFERED BY GRADES IN 1936-'37

Eighth grade or frashman yearseventh diploma required.

Required subjects: General mathematics, English one, junior busi and Bill Street went out to the one, general science.

Freshmen will not be permitted to take over four subjects, except that pupils who are taking the 8th grade for the second year and have one-half credit in a subject may finish the unit in which one half was secured and take four additional subjects.

Each pupil will be expected to take at least four subjects.

Ninth grade or sophomore yearthree units required.

Required subjects: Algebra III 1/2\* Commercial arithmetic (14), English II, World history.

Choose one: Home economics, Agriculture". Spanish two.

Sophomores who elected science as a freshman course should continue with agriculture; those who elect ed Spanish one should follow with Spanish two in the ninth,

Sophomores with an A rating may take five subjects if they so desire. Other second year pupils will take four except, as outlined for freshmen, in the case of retained pupils who may take four and onehalf. Girls may turn from science to home economics

Tenth grade or junior year-Sevon units required.

Required subjects: English three and American history.

Choose two: Spanish one, Spanish two, home economics one, commercial geography (14), Texas history

( le ), Plane geometry. Juniors who have not had a foreign language and will elect to do some language in high school should begin Spanish in the third year, Also, juniors who plan to go to col-

Je lege should, if possible, begin to select a course tending toward some major in college.


