# EDITORIALS The Texas Land Boom ...

Texas farm land prices hae been booming for 10 years, and the six percent dollar-value increase shown from 1957 to 1958 indicates that the peak has not yet been reached.

What are the factors forcing a continued inflation of Texas land prices? A 25-county study to determine some of these factors was made last year, and the result was an interesting picture of what generally is happening in the Texas agricultural land market today.

The first and most obvious strenthening factor in the market both in Texas and elsewhere is the increasing population as opposed to the fixed amount of land available This is a simple supply-demand situation which is intensified in our state because of its above-normal population increase.

Another major price-determining factor for land has to do with land characteristics, such as its fertility, soil texture, water supply, cover, wildlife and sub-surface minerals-such as oil. Most of these are agricultural characteristics, however, and the present market price of farm land generally is higher than can be justifield by its value for crop or livestock production. For the answer as to why farm land prices are out of reason for farming purposes, most people concerned have named mineral activity. Mineral value in land for sale, however, is mostly speculative, because once minerals are found on a parcel of land, production begins and the land involved is practically frozen in ownership and is removed from the land market.

Next to being mineral-rich, perhaps the most fetch-. ing quality of land on today's market has to do with its location. During the past two decades, improved urban working conditions and reduced working hours have made it possible for city and townsfolk to enter the AUSTIN. 

This idea is represented today by such giants as the Diners' Club, the American Express and the Hilton-Statler Carte Blanche, Daily these extrepreneurs are expanding their field so that it not only is possible to get hotel and travel credit, but to visit B-oadway shows. baseball games and other sports events or to buy a new tie in a strange city on credit.

But every action has its reaction, as the physicists say, and so perhaps it was inevitable that the opposite of the broad-based credit card should come into existence-the broad-based cash card.

An organization calling itself the Discount Club of America is being launched, seeking, like the credit card giants, hundreds and thousands of co-operating firms of many types. Its aim is to enroll family memherships at S5 a year for which it is undertaking to obtain 5 to 10 per cent discount on goods and services where cash is paid.

This sounds like a financial David faring forth into the field of credit Goliaths. It will be interesting to see how the battle for memberships progresses.

# **Newest State Inspires Home Sewing Designs**

THE HAWAHAN INFLUENCE. now moves into the home se field, producing wonderful, colorful casual clothes to wear at home or on the beach.

A bright new idea borrowed from the 50th state is a gay flowered tunic of quilted cotton satin. to wear at home with skinny pants or even on the beach for a swimsuit cover-up.

It's easy to make. Local sewing center experts suggest that you can use a basic pattern for a sheath dress, and adapt it to the tunic look by slitting the seams to hip length, and making the sleeves short. Waistline darts can be adjusted for an easy fit.

It's important to select the correct binding for your tunic. Pima cotton bias tape is best for fine fabrics, since its luster goes with such things as cotton satin,

A rose printed cotton satin tunic can use three shades of binding-pale pink, crimson and black. These three rows of tape can be ingeniously stitched so that no stitches show on the outside. Here's how to do it:

Open one fold of the inner (pale pink) bias binding. With raw edge toward hem of garment and fold line approximately one inch fromhem, stitch along fold line and allow tape to fold over naturally. Follow the same process for the

crimson row of tape, catching the bottom of the pink tape in this on wrong side of garment. second row of stitching. Repeat The pattern used for this tunic


