# **County Farmers Approve Cotton Marketing Quotas**

#### **Ford Foundation Funds** Offered To Two Hospitals

Colleges and hospitals will receive a sum equal to \$3 dollars for every man, woman and child in the United States in Ford

Foundation grants. Two million dollars of the grants was tagged for about 3,500 privately supported hospitals to help them improve and extend

services to the public. The hospital grant of \$250,000 was the top grant and goes to 57 institutions. The minimum in this field was \$10,000.

Grants, totaling \$206,000 are tentatively earmarked for ten South Plains Hospitals-including two in Lamb county-to help them extend their services to the public, news stories from Wash ington has disclosed-

The Lamb county hospitals sharing in the awards are the Medi-cal Arts Hospital and Clinic in Littlefield and the South Plains Co-Operative Hospital in Amherst

According to the news stories the two will receive \$10,000 each. Final determination of eligible hospitals and the exact amount of ing each grant will be made later by the Foundation.

#### Markham Family Honor Mother's 80th Birthday

The Sudan home of Mrs. H. H. was unable to be present. Markham was the scene for a surprise birthday dinner Sunday when Mrs. Markham's children. grandchildren and great-grandchildren gathered for the occasion of her eightieth birthday.

A native of Missouri, Mrs. Markham was born Ida Bell Blakemore. She was one of ten children of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Blakemore who moved with their family to Texas for Mrs. Markham's health when she was five years of age.

It was in 1880 that she with her mother and other children traveled by train to Texas while her father made the trip by trail driving some 2,000 head of sheep. The family settled in Hunt County, Texas.

The daughter of a farmer, Ida Bell, was raised near the small town of Floyd and it was here she met and married a farmer and a native of Texas, Harvey (Dick) Markham. The couple were married by a Methodist minister in the home of her parents. The couple had four chiloren, all of whom are now living, Mr. Markham is deceased having died in August of last year.

Following their marriage the Markhams resided for several years near Floyd, later moving to Farmersville where the children completed schooling. All four of the children were high school graduates and one later did college work

Mrs. Markham moved with her husband to Sudan in the early 1940's. A member of the Sudan Methodist church, Mrs. Markham became affiliated with the church at the age of 11. Mr. Markham was a Baptist and as the Baptist church was always the nearest all four of their children are of Bank. the Baptist faith.








#### Mahon Sends Letters To Littlefield Implement Dealer

(Eldtor's Note: The following copies of goverument letters were mailed to Earl Luce by Congressman George Mahon hist week after they had had some correspondence and discussions of the current farm problems.)

Dear Congressman Mahon:

This is in reply to your letter of November 16, 1955, with which you enclosed a portion of a letter pertaining to the quality of cotton produced in the Lubbock area and in which you asked whether cotton produced in that area is more of a burden on Commodity Credit Corporation than the cotton which is produced in other areas of the Cotton

The short staple cotton problem and the drop in demand for such cotton has been getting much more acute in recent years. Several years ago, the percentage of unredeemed loan cotton which had a staple length of 15-16 inches or shorter did not materially differ from the percentage of the entire crop which was of such staple lengths. However, recently there has been a very sharp increase in the percentage of the production of short staple cotton (15-16 inches or shorter) which has ended up in CCC's inventory. For example, in 1953, when 19.3 percent of the cotton produced was 15-66 inches or shorter, about 22.8 per cent of the unredeemed loan cotton from that crop consisted of those staple lengths. In 1954, when 22.5 percent of the cotton produced was 15-16 inches or shorter about 49.5 percent of the unredeemed loan cotton from that crop consisted of those staple lengths. In 1955, based on present indications, it appears that a much higher percentage (perhaps as much as 75 percent) of the short staple cotton in the Lubbock area may go into the loan and a large part of such cotton will, no doubt, end up in CCC's

As you know, the average length of the entire crop has been increasing for a number of years and mills have indicated a considerable preference for the longer staples (especially 1 to 1 3-32 inches) at the current differentials. Indications are that the cotton industry, both domestic and foreign, will primarily buy the longer staples unless there is a substantial differential for the shorter staples. In the past, loan differentials have been based primarily on prior years' pre-miums and discounts. This has had a deterring effect on the widening of differentials between the shorter and longer staples, thereby causing a larger proportions of the short staple cotton to end up in CCC's inventory. If the current trend continues, the quantity of short staple cotton in CCC's inventory will soon be completely out of

On August 13, 1955, CCC announced a special cotton export program to be effective after January 1, 1956. Under this program, not more than one million bales of cotton having a staple length of 15-16 inches or shorter will be made available for sale. This cotton will be offered for sale on a competitive bed basis, possibly at prices somewhat below the minimum price limitations which control most CCC sales, and this may help to dispose of some of the shorter staple cotton now owned by CCC.

No determinations have been made with respect to the differentials for the 1956 program and the level of support has not been announced. How-ever, the spot market differentials between the shorter and the longer staples have been widening to some extent in recent months and it appears that the 1957 cotton loan program differentials between the shorter and longer staples should be larger than in 1955. As a mater of fact, we are of the opinion the differentials should be increased between these two groups of staple lengths in order to slow down production and increase the use of these shorter lengths.

Dear Congressman Mahon:

This is in reply to your letter of November 8 requesting information with regard to the legal restrictions placed on sales of cotton by the Commodity Credit Corporation and the composition of cotton exports during the 1954-55 marketing year. You also inquired regarding the export outlook

for the current season. Section 407 of the Agricultural Act of 1949 provides that the CCC shall not sell for unrestricted use any basic agricultural commodity acquired in price support operations at less than 105 percent of the current support price, plus reasonable carrying charges. This restriction does not apply to sales for export. However, it has been the policy of the Corporation for a number of years to apply this minimum to sales for export as well as domestic sales for unrestricted use. You are aware of course that the Department has announced a program under which up to 1.0 million bales of CCC cotton having a staple length of 15-16" and less will be offered for sale for export after January 1, 1956, upon the basis of competitive bids. It is naturally assumed that prices received for this cotton will be below the legal minimum pre-

scribed for sales for unrestricted use.

During the 1954-55 marketing year, 3.4 million bales of cotton were exported from the United States. Of this quantity, approximately 1.2 million bales were financed under special programs, including grants and sales for foreign currencles. Procurement authorizations have been issued covering the sale of approximately 1.3 million bales for foreign currencles during the 1955-56 season. However, because of the wide disparity between prices at which United States cotton can be bought and prices at which foreign growths are being sold, very little cotton is now moving under these programs. Dispatches from our attaches indicate that foreign cottons are underselling our cotton by 2 to 5 cents a pound. Practically all United States cotton exports are handled by private trade. Only a very small quantity moves on a govern-ment to government basis, and this is mostly for

Foreign consumption during the 1954-55 season exceeded foreign production by approximately 3.3 million bales. In the absence of any appreciable changes in stocks, this residual is the quantity of cotton normally required by foreign countries from the United States when foreign cotton is underselling ours. During the 1955-56 marketing year, it is estimated that foreign consumption will exceed foreign production by only a little more than 2.0 million bales. Under these circumstances, it is unlikely that our exports during the current

season will rise above 25 million bales. We are enclosing copies of a release of August 12, 1955, which contains some additional background information on the cotton problem.

#### Blackmailer "Friends"

Our attempts during the first few years after World War II to buy good will abroad have shown how futile that policy is. Our policy appears to have changed under Eisenhower to one of fairness and friendliness but less paternalism. Present policy seems to be to encourage self-development and self-reliance instead of having them look to us to cover their budget deficits every year.

But this is a disappointment to some of our "friends" who had gotten used to the idea of our playing Santa Claus the year around. For instance, Egypt now is threatening us with the possibility that they will let the Russians help them with the huge dam they want to build on the Nile, unless

we come through with what they want by January 1.

To a country boy this would seem to be the point at which we should call a halt to dollar diplomacy. If that's the kind of friendship our previous dollars have bought, we made a bad deal. We might well take a second thought about letting them have the \$40 million ear marked for emergency relief

Cotton Letter

By SMITH B. COLEMAN of V. R. Jones & Co.

United States agricultural ex ports in the July-October four month period of 1955 are estimated at \$990 million, compared with \$910 million for the corresponding period of 1954, a gain of nine per cent according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Values of exports of nearly all major commodity groups were up for the first four months of the 1955-56 fiscal year, Grains and feeds showed an increase of 39 per cent: tobacco, 27 percent; vegetable oils and oilseeds, 18 per cent; fruits and vegetables 7 per cent and livestock products, 8 were down 67 per cent.

Cotton Economic Research, University of Texas, reports average fineness for Mid-season cotton from 22 locations here on the High Plains (Lubbock area and south) to be 3.9 micronaire units for the Mid-season as compared to 4.5 for the same locations in early season. Tensile strength was found to average 73,000 pounds per square inch for Midseason against 75,000 for early

crop.
Unofficial laboratory reports on current receipts show a drastic drop in micronaire to as low as 2.0, with a corresponding drop in tensile strength. Finding an outlet for this cotton is difficult as most mills require 3.6 micronaire and above.

With continued favorable weather conditions the harvest of this year's crop will be 95 per cent complete by the end of the week. Many gins are now only running during the day.

The Dept. of Agriculture issued their final crop estimate on December 8th, for the South Plains as 1,340,000. The U. S. production 14,663,000. The present outlook is for 80 per cent of this year's South Plains crop to enter the loan.

#### Man of Prayer

Lesson for December 18, 1955

SOME people will try to tell you that we can learn nothing from the fact that Jesus was a man of prayer. He was so different from us, they say, that we must no more try to imitate him than to imitate Einstein. This is not the way the New Testament looks at it, not the way Christian theology looks at it. Jesus "had to be made like his brethren in ev-

we are. With- Dr. Foreman out sin, to be sure. The only prayer for forgiveness which he ever uttered was on behalf of others, not himself. If even the sinless Son of God was a man of prayer, surely we who are so imperfect and sinful need prayer even more; and we can learn about prayer from him.

The Motive of Prayer

One thing stands out: Jesus' motive or motives for praying must have been far stronger than the motive of most of us. Jesus would go without sleep or rest in order to pray. He, a man who had many friends and loved to have people around him, would withdraw from all human companions, would go far into the hills, would climb a high mountain, just in order to find a place where he could pray without interruption. In short, he took a great deal of trouble to pray. We take less trouble, becau- we don't the strong desire that he felt. But why? What was his motive? It is not so mysterious that we cannot give it a name, though it is too profound for us to fathom it to the depths. It was his heart's desire for close and closer sharing of heart and life with the

heart and life of the heavenly Father. Jesus shows no sign of needing to "get right" with God. He was in full harmony to his life's end. But his prayers were expression of that harmony. of the instrument ring true; but Tech. the musician then brings out the in tube

The Manner of Prayer
Dr. W. D. Chamberlain has written & book for plain Christians called The Manner of Prayer,' based on the Lord's Prayer. This is no place to borrow many pages from that fine book. Yet a word should be said about the manner of Jesus' prayer in general. We know that he used to attend the synagogue meetings, and we know that in those meetings formal (what we would call "printed") prayers were used, in which no doubt Jesus would join. But we hear a great deal more about his private prayers, and we can be pretty sure that for these occasions he never took a prayerbook with him. His prayers were personal, individual, they were free, and many of them were fully private, strictly between himself and His Father. This much is clear for our own prayer-practice: whatever formal prayers we may use in church, or whoever may be praying there for us (and with us, if "leading" in prayer means anything), this can be no substitute for personal, private prayer. We must never be tied down to any formula, as if God were something like a bureaucrat who would not consider a communication not in proper form! God wants to know most of all not how we say it but how much we mean it.

The Matter of Prayer

What things is it right to pray for? We can be sure of this much at least: It is always right to pray for the kind of thing which is in harmony with the "Lord's Prayer." (Incidentally, the fact that this prayer appears in more than one form in the gospels shows that it can hardly be right to insist on one set form of words.) Things not mentioned in that prayer, perhaps yes; but things out of line with it, no. Let the reader consider which of these objects of prayer are in line with the Lord's prayer: A promotion in one's job? Greater spiritual strength? The cure of an afflicted loved one? Foreign missions? An unborn child? The President of the United States? 




