A cowboy in his younger days, Will never lost his art and skill with a rope; in fact, he was con-sidered "a good roper." Though fame had showered him in abundance, the beloved "Ambassador of Good Will" was just plain Will Rogers and he took his place at branding time and got a big kick out of the whole show. A brief private ceremony was

announced for the burial in the crypt at Claremore. Members of the family requested that the time of the burial be kept secret to avoid curious crowds. Less than 100 persons were invited, including newspapermen and photographers.

Arrangements to move the body to the hill overlooking Claremore were made by the Will Rogers Memorial Commission, headed by N. G. Henthorne, Tulsa World editor, with the co-operation of Governor Kerr and former Governor Phillips.

Rogers Enjoyed Life We visited the Will Rogers Memorial in the fall of 1941, and count that occasion as outstanding in our life; we learned intimately the background of the late humorist-philosopher and received a fresh and enlarged understanding

of the love of America for him. It occurred to us that Rogers had gotten unbounded joy out of life, had climbed the ladder of success with confidence and joy, and who, when fame had smiled on him smiled back and interrogated,





Jack D. Grant, 18, of Anton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Leroy Grant, became the second fatality at Buffalo Lakes this season when he was accidentally drowned about 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon.

Witnesses said that Grant and two other Anton youths, Franklin Jack-son and Ray Tidwell, were riding in a boat during a pleasure excursion at the lake. Grant, who was standing upright in the boat, lost his balance and toppled backwards into the wa-

ter. Unable to swim, he rose to the surface once and then disappeared beneath the water. Lubbock firemen were called at

3:18 o'clock. Chief W. E. Twitty, assistant chief John Nugent and Tom Crow rushed to the lake with an inhalator. Firemen Pete Stark and J. C. Bond made a second trip with grappling hooks to recover the body. After 50 minutes of grappling ac-After 50 minutes of grapping ac-tivity, the body was recovered about 50 feet from the bank, about half-way between the rock house and the bath house. Firemen said that the body had been submerged for one hour and 20 minutes.
