




## Colds Lessen Resistance

Studies show that most people have two or more colds a year, each lasting about two weeks and causing a considerable amount of stuffy discomfort, said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

The danger of the common cold lies mainly in the other infections that may follow after it. A cold lessens resistance, and is likely to pave the way for other more serious respiratory ailments.

Sinusitis, ear infections, bronchitis, and the various forms of pneumonia are frequently ushered in by a cold. Pneumonia, particularly, is likely to attack a

person who is overtired, or run-down because of a

Fortunately, many of the respiratory diseases are not as dangerous as they used tobe. Modern infection-fighting drugs, such as penicillin and the sulfa drugs, offer highly effective treatment for many cases. But, of course, it is always better to prevent a serious illness whenever possible.

If you have a cold, it's just good sense to stay away from people, to avoid spreading the infection; and to get plenty of rest-in bed if possible.

Leading from the middle ear to the throat is the Eustachian tube (pronounced u-sta-ke-an, accenting the second syllable), named for the Italian physician who first decribed it in the sixteenth century. Its purpose is to make equal the amount of air pressure on each side of the ear drum so that the drum will not tear from loud noises, diving, and other circumstances in which pressure on the outside suddenly rises.

consists of several tubes set in a number of winding cavities in the bone in much the same way that a soft inner tube fits into the harder tire of anautomobile. Both the cavities and tubes are filled with a fluid called lymph.

The wound-up tube in the inner ear which receives sound impressions looks very much like a snail shell; in fact, it is called the "cochlea," a word from the Latin language meaning snall or snall shell. Within the cochlea are tiny hair-like cells; they are the end organs of the sense of hearing. Sound impluses that they pick up when the lymph is set in motion by the vibrations of the membrane in the oval window are taken to the brain by one branch of the auditory nerve. In the brain these impluses take it to the brain as only one sound, not two. The reason for having two ears is to be able to locate more accurately the place from which a sound is coming.

The second function of the ear, balance, is made possible through three of the tubes in the inner ear that form half circles (semicircular canals) and the two sacs (containers) into which they empty. Besides the liquid, lymph, the sacs hold a jelly-like substance in which

Changing the position of the head makes the lymph from the semicircluar canal rush into one of the sacs. The extra weight from this increased flow mashes the stones, which press on tiny hairs. The hairs, in turn, send a message to the brain through the second branch of the auditory nerve, and the brain interprets the message to know that the body is out of balance and usually does what it can

Loaded guns should never be left unattended and hunters should always unload guns before climbing over a fence or into a tree. Bullets fired at flat, hard surfaces, or at objects on the surface of water may ricochet and hit objects not thought to be in the line of fire. Last but not least, gunpowder and alcohol should never be mixed for

**Engineers Uurge Underground Water Act** 

The Texas section of the American Society of Civil Engineers recommended Monday new laws regulating the use of underground water, but urged that enforcement be concentrated at the local level.

The group submitted a 13-point water policy program to Governor Shivers and his newly created statewide water conservation com-

The report pointed out that Texas has never had any statewide regulation of the use of underground water except for statutes governing the waste of artesian wa-

"This policy has resulted in excessive rates of withdrawal of ground water with an alarming depletion of storage and a lowering of underground water levels," it continued.

"Local option conservation districts should be given a fair trial toward the solution of the underground water problem, and state action should be confined to that necessary in limiting the powers of such districts.

"Local districts should comprise all of an underground reservoir or province and the local option laws should limit any proration of water use from wells so as not to be confiscatory."

The report also recommended the enactment of a complete new surface water code, but added: "If this can not be accomplished, then separate acts of legislation to remedy the main deficiencies in the present laws should be enacted."

Among the needed laws, the engineers said, are the elimination of all unused and abandoned water appropriations, an inventory of all the state's water resources, policing of water use by water masters, a legislative definition of riparian rights and of natural flow, and a curbing of "blanket" permits for water use.




