

# Study Shows The Farm's Importance

Editors Note: This is the first I na series of eight condensed articles on the Burt C. Blanton industrial survey of Littlefield and Lamb County. These articles are prepared in the belief that every citizen of Lamb County should be informed of the area's present status and its possibilities for

By BILL TURNER The story of Littlefield and Lamb County, told in Dallas Engneer Burt C. Blanton's recently completed technical survey, is a revelation in itself.

But, there is also much be-tween the lines of this concise,

124-page book. Much of Blanton's research tells us what we already know, but much more of this intensive study deals in things the average

Bianton's report is as it should be. It deals in facts and it is straight to the point. It is the sort of thing that will impress industrialists.

his introduction, Blanton tells us that the corporate area of Littlefield is 3.0 square miles, that this city's elevation is about 3,556 feet and that Lamb county's

total area is 1,022 square miles. Littlefield's local trade area, according to Blanton, is made up

of eight counties, including all of Lamb, Bailey and Cochran and parts of Castro, Hale, Hockley, Lubbock and Parmer counties. Technically speaking, soils in

Lamb County are designated as fertile sandy loams and chocolate loam coils." He goes on to say that soils in this region have "good moisture retaining capa-city and are underlaid with an abundant supply of water."

into this county's major in dustry—agriculture. At the outset, he says that Lamb County ranks as one of the most important agricultural, livestock and livestock products producing counties in the Panhandle. As principal crops, he lists

alfalfa, barley, cabbage, carrots, corn, cotton, cucumbers, grain sorghums, Pettuce, oats, onlons, peppers, potatoes, tomatoes and wheat.

One interesting observation is that Lamb county has 100.8 percent of its land in farms and ranches. How? The excess in farm acreage over land area is due to the fact that the entire acreage of a farm is tabulated as in the county. even though a part of the farm may be situated in an adjoining



COURT UPHOLDS UNION SHOP Texas' controversial right-towork law has lost another round in the courts. But champions of the law say the issue is far from being settled.

By a 6 to 3 decision the State Supreme Court upheld a closed shop contract between unions and Santa Fe Railway Co.

Texas law prohibits compulsory union membership, but a 1951 act of Congress authorized closed shops in the railway industry.

Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd. who had intervened on behalf of Texas law, predictes a motion for rehearing after the court reconvenes Oct. 3. "The full question of compulsory union membership is yet to be determined," Shepperd said. "Nor do I think the majority decision abrogates our right-towork law.

Their decision, majority judges noted, paralleled a U. S. Supreme Court ruling in a similar case from Nebraska. Union shop contracts, said the Texas ruling, do not "compel full union membership, but only payment of union dues and assessments."

Dissenting judges spoke out against "Compulsory financial support of a private organization by those who do not subscribe to its program" as "the chief evil to be forever prohibited."

#### 1957 ROAD PROGRAM ANNOUNCED

Plans to spend \$229,000,000 on building new roads in 1957 have been outlined by the Texas High-

In addition, \$35 million will be spent on maintenance. Through the federal aid bill, Uncle Sam will absorb \$117,000,000 of the \$264,000,-000 total tab.

Motorists can look forward to smooth sailing on the roads planned under the new lederal-state building program. Some 3,000 miles of modern expressways without cross traffic or railroad crossings are due in the near future, said State Highway Engineer DeWitt Greer. Many will be divided highways. Two-lane roads will be built so two more lanes can be added.

In auticipation of this flood of highway spending, road contractors are trying to get enough engineers and skilled laborers to do the work. Texas Highway Branch, Associated General Contractors, is considering two plans.

One is to grant scholarships of engineering colleges. Another is to set up a training school on operation of machinery and heavy equipment at some university, MORE INTEGRATION
