INCREASE DUE TO CITIES GROWTH IN PAST YEAR; '36 VALUATIONS \$1,238,075 **AND '37 VALUATIONS GO TO \$1,322,860**

Tax Rate To Remain At \$1.50; New Valuation Will Bring Revenue Due From Taxes To \$19,842.90; An Increase Of \$1,271.77 Over '36 Taxes Due

The steady growth of Littlefield was reflected yesterday when the 1937 property valuations were announced as being \$84,785 above 1936 totals.

Although there may be some minor changes in the total of \$1,322,860, value of property in Littlefield for 1937, the increase of \$84,785 will not be materially

changed. Valuations in 1936 were \$1,238,075 and the increase in valuations this year is entirely due to the growth of the city in the past two elve months, Additional property has been steadily developed here by much building and even now a great amount of construction is underway. With a great volume of business expected here this fall the valuations of city property will no doubt show even a greater increa-

\$18,000 Interest

The interest on the \$315,000 is 6 per cent which brings the interest due each year to approximately \$18,900. The City Commission at the present time are trying to work out a refunding plan so the interest will only be 4 per cent. This would materially cut cost of government.

Right now \$1.25 of each \$1.50 paid in per hundred dollars of valuation on property is going into the interest account which at the present time has approximately \$9,000 balance. This money is being held up in the local bank due to a suit pending in the courts filed by some who wish priority with the bonds they hold. The other 25 cents of the tax rate goes to help run the city but it not ample to do the job.

Water Pays

The city water department has been a godsend to the city as it is a paying affair. The income from water each month averages about \$1. 500 and part of this has to be used to help run the city. The water department has a binded indebtedness of \$35,500 but these bonds are in paid up condition along with the interest due on them.
