We Do Our Part

WE CAN'T STOP NOW

There are unmistakable signs everywhere of improvement in economic conditions. More men at work, millions of them. Farmers are getting better prices. Retail business is good. Many of the big industries report more orders on hand than for some years past. Prices are rising. The bank reports for October showed that money, in the shape of checks, changed hands at a rate 25 per cent higher than in October of 1932. That is perhaps the most encouraging sign of all, for it is not the volume of money but the speed with which it moves from hand to hand that counts. If everybody had a mil-lion and nobody spent anything we would have hard times; but if everybody had only a hundred dollars and spent it quickly, knowing where the next hundred was coming from, we would have immense prosperity.

Much of the present recovery program is due to Governmental activi-ties including the Public Works program and its latest offspring, the Civil Works Administration; much to the loosening of credit and the pressure on debtors through Federal assistance to banks and mortgagors. Much of it is due, too, to the distribution of huge sums to growers of various commo-

dities as a premium for reduced production. Those are only temporary measures, of course. They are, however, lay-ing the foundation for business and industry to build upon, and probably will tide us over the emergency and set us well on the road to recovery.

It looks to us as if the thing for everybody to do now is not to gum the cards, but to give the New Deal a chance to prove itself. Everyone has a right to his private opinion as to whether the end result will be beneficial, but nobody with sense would want to stop it now in the middle of the

FARM INCOME AND PAYROLLS

"It is becoming more and more apparent that fairners cannot climb out of their trap unless laboring men at the same time climb out of theirs," declared Secretary of Agriculture Wallace in his Des Moines speech re cently. "The job of agriculture is to increase its gross income from 5 billion dollars, compared with 12,121 bales in dollars to 11 billion dollars within the next two years. And strange to say, the problem before the workers in the factories is exactly the same thing:

November last year. namely, to increase their total payrolls from 5 billion dollars to 11 billion dollars in the next two years.

"Since 1924, the incomes year by year of those two groups have been almost exactly the same in dollars. As I studied this extraordinary relationship between pay oils and agriculture, I have reached the conclusion that I that prices of grain and cotton tend to influence the payrolls, which in turn influence the consumption of livestock, dairy and poultry products. The really important thing to remember is that both of them have been hit a terrible wallop and that neither one can go very far in recovery without the other.

"Under the Agricultural Adjustment Act the Secretary of Agriculture is directed to restore farm product prices to fair exchange value at the earliest feasible moment. This is to be done by adjusting production to market requirements, and by paying benefits to farmers who cooperate in such adjustment. Farmers' income will be increased by the combination of benefit payments and the higher prices to result from a properly adjusted supply."



FARMERS ARE AFFECTED BY **PROCESSING TAX**

DETAILS OF TAX ARE GIVEN BY COUNTY AGENT ADAM

Farmers are affected by the processing tax on corn and hogs, according to a bullitin received from College Station by D. A. Adam, county agent. Herewith is a summary of the law

as affecting farmers: Everyone who staughters hogs and sells meat must pay the processing tax. The party who owns the hogs at the time they are slaughtered is the one required to pay the tax.

A man may kill a hog produced by himself and consume it with his own household and under this condition is not subject to the processing tax. But if he sells a portion of this hog, he must pay a processing tax on that portion that he sells. In this case he makes out the form for the entire hog and claims exemption for that portion that he consumes at home.

A restaurant or hotel that slaughters its own hogs and feeds the pork to the boarders must pay a processing tax, because the boarders cannot be construed as being a part of the household of that individual.

The tax is \$1 per cwt. December 1st to 31st, inclusive, \$1.50 per cwt. January 1st to 31st, inclusive, \$2 per cwt. after February 1st, 1934. This tax is based on live weight in all

Corn Processing Tax

Corn can be sold or traded as much as you please without being subject to the processing tax. It can be shucked, shelled and cleaned, and can be ground into course corn chops or cracked corn without being subject to the processing tax. When corn is ground into fine meal or flour, suitable for human consumption, it is subject to the tax, regardless of whether it is fed to human beings or animals, but that portion which is consumed by the household of the individual owning the corn is exempt. In the latter case, however, it is necessary for the individual to make out

Over Eight Million **Dollars Received on** Account War Debt

A total of \$8,898,123 in war debt payments was received by the United States Friday, which is approximately one-seventeenth of the \$152,952,637 due from eleven European nations.

Five countries tendered nothing; five offered token payments. Finland, the only one to meet an entire installment last June 15, again was alone in paying in full.

Inclusion of defaults of last December and June would bring the total due today to \$310,676,870. The Finnish payment of \$229,623 and the tokens leave \$301,778,747 overdue on the \$11,000,000,000 funded debts.

France, Poland, Belgium, Estonia, and Hungary submitted no tokens. The five nations paying tokens and the totals due from them were:

Great Britain, \$7,500,000 of \$117,670,765; Italy, \$1,000,000 of \$2,133,906; Czechoslovakia, \$150,000 of \$1,682,813; Lithuania, \$10,000 of \$105,474; and Latvia, \$8,500 of \$180,706.

Governments meeting part of their obligations, officials say, will not be considered in default. Reduction or cancellation of debts and changes in the schedule of payments rest with congress.

Secy. Wallace Recommends Long Time Program

Secretary Wallace has recommended to President Roosevelt that a "long time program" he adopted to control the surplus production of cotton. He says "the situation in the cotton belt remains critical."

"It is necessary to have a cotton program covering not simply one season but several seasons, the secretary

"The cotton surplus was not created in one season, nor will it be removed in one. Adjustment of cotton production to the demand is essentialy a long-time proposition. It connot be achieved by hasty improvisions based on weather conditions at the beginning of a single season."

The secretary reviewed the plowup campaign ol last summer and praised southern farmers who took 10,396, 000 acres of growing cotton out of production, but characterized this as only the first step in the control of cotton production.

"In preventing cotton planted on 10,396,000 acres from maturing," Wallace said, "the growers who cooperated with the administration besides strengthening the cotton market, manifested a spirit that argued well for the success of future control operations . . "The reduction of acreage this

year merely prevents the surplus from growing oppressively larger. It does not by any means sufficiently reduce the oversupply, and the situation in the cotton belt remains critical."

In all probability, however, the withdrawal of the 10,396,000 acres from production benefited the cotton price situation more than may appear It may reasonably be concluded

that the 1933 cotton-reduction campaign achieved as much as could be expected, in view of the unexpectedly large production on the acreage
