## IS SENTENCED TO THREE YEARS ON BURGLARY COUNT

### Blackey Day Is Convicted; Alleged Partner Also To Be Tried

Howard Nichols, alleged partner of Blackey Day in the robbery of Grimes Dry Goods store, Amherst, which took place the latter part of September last, and who was indicted at Eastland on a similar charge, and sent to a State Farm in Brazoria county, was returned to Lamb County by Sheriff Len Irvin Wednesday afternoon, and lodged in the Littlefield jail.

According to Sheriff Irvin, Nichols' last known address was McAllister, Okla., where he is reported to have served two years on a burglary charge.

The trial of Blackey Day, also formerly of McAllister, Okla., and who with Nichols, was indicted at the present term of District Court at Olton on the same charge, took place at Olton Tuesday, when he was given a sentence of three years in the State Penitentiary.

The Nichols trial is expected to come up for disposition this week at Olton.

Sheriff Irvin, who was accompanied by Mrs. Irvin, first made the trip to Huntsville, but found his prisoner was at the State Farm in Brazoria county.

## WE CAN'T STOP NOW

There are unmistakable signs everywhere of improvement in economic conditions. More men at work, millions of them. Farmers are getting better prices. Retail business is good. Many of the big industries report more orders on hand than for some years past. Prices are rising. The bank reports for October showed that money, in the shape of checks, changed hands at a rate 25 per cent higher than in October of 1932. That is perhaps the most encouraging sign of all, for it is not the volume of money but the speed with which it moves from hand to hand that counts. If everybody had a million and nobody spent anything we would have hard times; but if everybody had only a hundred dollars and spent it quickly, knowing where the next hundred was coming from, we would have immense prosperity.

Much of the present recovery program is due to Governmental activities including the Public Works program and its latest offspring, the Civil Works Administration; much to the loosening of credit and the pressure on debtors through Federal assistance to banks and mortgagees. Much of it is due, too, to the distribution of huge sums to growers of various commodities as a premium for reduced production.

Those are only temporary measures, of course. They are, however, laying the foundation for business and industry to build upon, and probably will tide us over the emergency and set us well on the road to recovery.

It looks to us as if the thing for everybody to do now is not to gum the cards, but to give the New Deal a chance to prove itself. Everyone has a right to his private opinion as to whether the end result will be beneficial, but nobody with sense would want to stop it now in the middle of the stream.

## FARM INCOME AND PAYROLLS

"It is becoming more and more apparent that farmers cannot climb out of their trap unless laboring men at the same time climb out of theirs," declared Secretary of Agriculture Wallace in his Des Moines speech recently. "The job of agriculture is to increase its gross income from 5 billion dollars to 11 billion dollars within the next two years. And strange to say, the problem before the workers in the factories is exactly the same thing; namely, to increase their total payrolls from 5 billion dollars to 11 billion dollars in the next two years."

"Since 1924, the incomes year by year of these two groups have been almost exactly the same in dollars. As I studied this extraordinary relationship between payrolls and agriculture, I have reached the conclusion that the prices of grain and cotton tend to influence the payrolls, which in turn influence the consumption of livestock, dairy and poultry products. In other words, agriculture is to some extent a cause and to some extent a result of the total payroll situation. They both act, interact, and react on each other, and I think it is foolish for either laboring men or farmers to claim that they are the all-important class. The really important thing to remember is that both of them have been hit a terrible wallop and that neither one can go very far in recovery without the other."

"Under the Agricultural Adjustment Act the Secretary of Agriculture is directed to restore farm product prices to fair exchange value at the earliest feasible moment. This is to be done by adjusting production to market requirements, and by paying benefits to farmers who cooperate in such adjustment. Farmers' income will be increased by the combination of benefit payments and the higher prices to result from a properly adjusted supply."

## REPORTS COTTON CONSUMED

Census bureaus have reported the cotton consumed during November totalled 475,368 bales of lint and 58,111 bales of linters, as compared with 503,873 and 66,838 in October this year, and 502,434 and 56,903 in November last year. Cotton land November 30 was reported as follows:

Held in consuming establishments 1,573,744 bales of lint and 265,620 of linters, compared with 1,361,190 and 257,880 on October 31 this year, and 1,454,305 and 295,677 on November 30 last year.

In public storage and at compresses 10,411,491 bales of lint and 37,706 of linters, compared with 9,474,342 and 36,018 on October 31 this year, and 10,693,717 and 66,595 on November 30 last year.

November imports totaled 13,136 bales, compared with 12,121 bales in October this year, and 8,973 bales in November last year.

November exports totaled 13,136 bales, compared with 12,121 bales in October this year, and 8,973 bales in November last year.

November exports totaled 915,304 bales of lint and 17,908 bales of linters, compared with 1,046,524 and 6,723 for October this year, and 1,012,411 and 7,057 for November last year.

Cotton spindles active during November 25,423,348 compared with 25,875,142 in October this year and 24,368,478 in November last year.

## INFLATION NOT A "CURE-ALL"

Secretary Wallace Friday last reiterated a warning that currency inflation is "not a cure-all" for farmers' troubles in his annual report to President Roosevelt.

Inflation would raise general price levels, he said, but would not eliminate the disparity between prices of agricultural and non agricultural products, which he termed essential to permanent farm relief.

Of the administration's gold purchase plan he said:

**Higher Prices Seen**  
"It may not have any great effect for some time on livestock and dairy prices. Eventually, however, most of our raw material prices should rise

to the extent to which the gold in the dollar reduced."

Wallace recommended regulation of grain exchanges and separation of savings from commercial banks in order to strengthen country banks.

He blamed the rise in farm prices from last March to July on inordinate speculation in the commodity markets and told the president "it is imperative for the government to supervise, and if necessary to regulate, and if necessary to regulate."

# Federal Figures Show Big Increase In Number of Workers and Payroll

According to a labor department estimate, 85,000 persons returned to work in October. At the same time the administration has set its plan to work to increase the number to 4,000,000.

Harry L. Hopkins, the relief administrator, made public figures for 131 cities and urban counties showing 1,485,634 families on relief rolls in October, compared with 1,479,232 the previous month.

Hopkins said the task of transferring men from work relief rolls by giving them jobs under the \$400,000,000 civil works program had begun. He added that the largest shift reported to headquarters in Washington involved 100,000 men in Texas.

Hopkins, who also heads the civil works administration which is attempting to give employment to the 4,000,000 by December 16, announced he had given \$500,000 to the federal surplus relief corporation to buy low grade Texas cattle at a minimum price of \$1.75 per hundred pounds. He said the meat would be processed and distributed to the needy.

Purchase of a large quantity of coal for the destitute also is planned he added. Clothing, various foods and bedding already are being supplied.

The October employment gain was reported by Secretary Frances Perkins. She added at her press conference that the statistics also indicated a gain of \$6,000,000 in weekly wages

being paid over the previous month.

**Payrolls Increase**  
Since March, she said, more than 2,800,000 workers in the industries surveyed have been given employment and payrolls increased nearly \$70,000,000 in October over March.

These statistics, she added, were for industries normally employing 20,000,000 of the nation's 49,000,000 gainful workers and did not represent the change for the entire country.

Every agency of the government concerned with relief problems of any sort is helping out in caring for the needy, Hopkins said. He is getting pork, butter and other farm products through the farm administration and has the aid of the public health service in combatting disease.

**Go To Congress**  
The veterans bureau is to act as disbursing agent, through its local offices, for the civil works administration. The public works administration allotted \$40,000,000 for the plan to carry it over until February. After February 15, when officials estimate the funds will run out, the administration plans to go to congress for more money, Hopkins said.

## FARMERS ARE AFFECTED BY PROCESSING TAX

### DETAILS OF TAX ARE GIVEN BY COUNTY AGENT ADAM

Farmers are affected by the processing tax on corn and hogs, according to a bulletin received from College Station by D. A. Adam, county agent.

Herewith is a summary of the law as affecting farmers:

Everyone who slaughters hogs and sells meat must pay the processing tax. The party who owns the hogs at the time they are slaughtered is the one required to pay the tax.

A man may kill a hog produced by himself and consume it with his own household and under this condition is not subject to the processing tax. But if he sells a portion of this hog, he must pay a processing tax on that portion that he sells. In this case he makes out the form for the entire hog and claims exemption for that portion that he consumes at home.

A restaurant or hotel that slaughters its own hogs and feeds the pork to the boarders must pay a processing tax, because the boarders cannot be construed as being a part of the household of that individual.

The tax is \$1 per cwt. December 1st to 31st, inclusive, \$1.50 per cwt. January 1st to 31st, inclusive, \$2 per cwt. after February 1st, 1934. This tax is based on live weight in all cases.

**Corn Processing Tax**  
Corn can be sold or traded as such as you please without being subject to the processing tax. It can be shucked, shelled and cleaned, and can be ground into course corn chops or cracked corn without being subject to the processing tax. When corn is ground into fine meal or flour, suitable for human consumption, it is subject to the tax, regardless of whether it is fed to human beings or animals, but that portion which is consumed by the household of the individual owning the corn is exempt. In the latter case, however, it is necessary for the individual to make out

the form, but he claims exemption from the tax in the place provided for same on the form. The tax is payable in all cases by the party owning the corn at the time it is processed or ground.

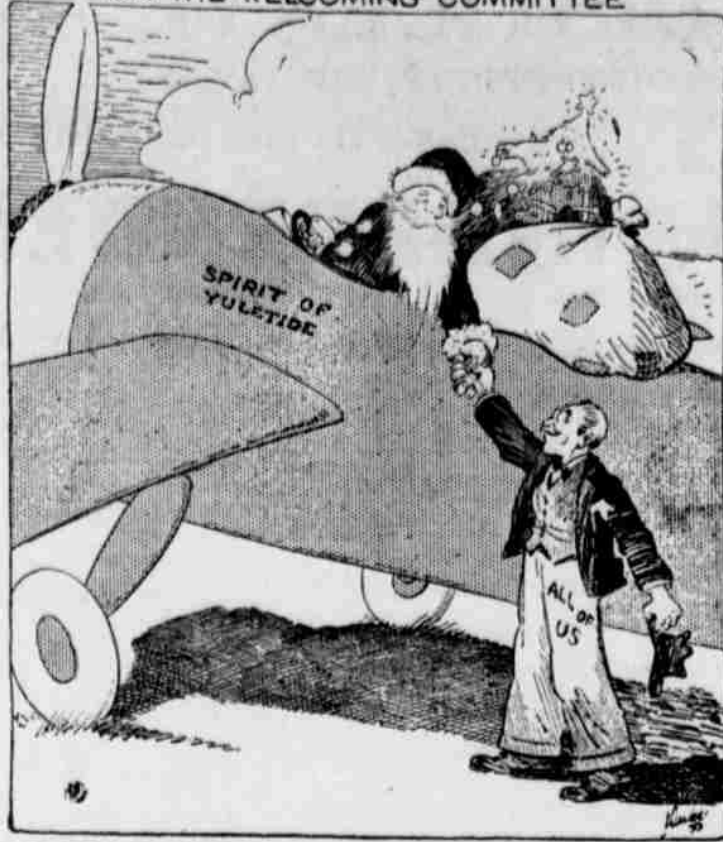
### Will Sell Beef To Government

As announced by Lawrence Westbrook, chairman of the Texas rehabilitation and relief commission of Austin, Lubbock has been tentatively selected as one of the 16 or more Texas cities to have beef buying, processing and canning plants as a part of the federal program of surplus commodity distribution.

W. E. Inmon, local administrator of relief, has made arrangements with McDonald Packing Company at Lubbock for killing and dressing of the beef. Canning will be done in the building in which Mr. Inmon's office is situated at 1312 Avenue G, if it is satisfactory, or if recommended, a building will be provided elsewhere.

Whether Lubbock will provide building space, fuel, lights and water without cost, as Mr. Westbrook said several Texas cities through chambers of commerce had signified willingness to do, will depend upon estimated cost and other circumstances.

Mrs. O. H. Stillman and daughter, Louise, will occupy one of the Stillman farms.

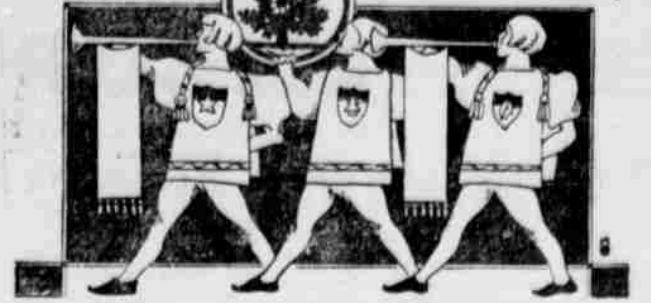

San Antonio, Dallas, Waco, Houston, Beaumont, Austin, Tyler, El Paso, Wichita Falls, Brownsville, Texarkana, San Angelo, Amarillo, Paris and Abilene were the other cities tentatively selected as beef buying centers.

The beef, all of which will be canned, will be handled exclusively by plants operating under government inspection, and the bureau of animal industry will supervise the program.

#### Only State Selected

"We want you to know that Texas is the only state accorded the privilege of buying beef locally," Mr. Westbrook wrote.

"It is our belief that we shall be able to buy, process, and can a much larger quantity of beef than could be purchased with the same amount of money in out-of-the-state markets and shipped to us for local distribution. In other words we believe we shall be able to help Texas stock raisers in our general program of relief and rehabilitation."

### Relief Plans Are Proposed For Taxpayers

Reduction of income tax for small taxpayers with earned incomes, readjustment of surtaxes on larger earnings, and elimination of opportunities for tax dodging by the wealthy were proposed to congress Friday by the treasury.

Leaving specific rate proposals for submission after budget needs are computed, Morgenthau agreed with some of the recommendations of the ways and means subcommittee for simplification of the laws and to prevent tax evasion but found many others objectionable. He suggested modifications and promised a more complete statement on other revisions when treasury studies are completed.

Among the major recommendations he advanced were lower rates for persons with an earned income of \$25,000 and less, as contrasted with investment income; a single normal income tax instead of the existing two classes of rates; a new surtax schedule to offset decreased revenues from the single normal rate; single returns by husbands and wives, and a higher tax on the undisturbed income of personal holding companies.

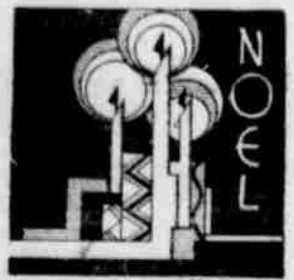

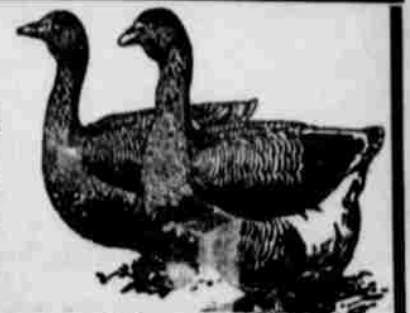
