





Man Held in Morton Bank Robbery Plans Break From Jail

Plans for an attempted jailbreak by Ollie Oliver Melton, 38, held at Dallas on charges of participation in the Morton bank robbery in Sept., 1945, were uncovered Wednesday of last week by sheriff's deputies, Sheriff Smoot Schmid reported.

Five saws and two razors fashioned into weapons were taken from Melton's cell at the Dallas county jail he said, adding that Melton admitted he planned to make the break before his case came to trial.

Three of the saws were fine jew eler's saws capable of cutting bars of the hardest steel he said. Also sheriff's deputies found file marks on two bars of the door leading from the corridor where the prisoners are allowed during the day, according to Schmid,

FBI records show that Melton escaped from the Oklahoma state penitentiary, McAlester, Okla., Nov. 7, 1936, while serving a 20-year sen-

Melton, who was arrested in late October at Shawnee, Okla., and Chick Rogers, who was later taken into custody at Oklahoma City, were brought to Dallas by the FBI pending an investigation by the federal grand jury of charges that they took part in the \$16,600 robbery of the Morton bank.

Increased Cotton Production

Agricultural leaders, writers and editors throughout the Cotton Belt are emphasizing the need for increased cotton production in 1946 to provide needed and critically scarce protein feed. Some typical editorial comments from recent issues of leading publications are:

Associated Press Article from Washington: "There can be no increase in the domestic supply of protein meals until the new cotton crop is harvested in the fall, said Frank George, Agriculture Department feed specialist. Cottonseed meal is regarded as the best protein feed and if this year's twenty million acre cotton crop goal produces a normal yield, George said the feed situation will improve vastly.'

San Antonio Evening News Editorial: "The country's need for cottonseed as a source of food-oil protein feed and other essential products - is critical - By far the most important protein meal produced in this country, in terms of food-value to the pound and also in terms of average produc-tion, is cottonseed meal."

Editorial in "The Farmer Stock-

man": "Oklahoma livestock men are again scrambling for cottonseed cake. or any kind of protein cake they can find. Bluntly, the feed that we need just doesn't exist. It won't exist this time next year, either, unless we grow it. The time has come when we must consider growing cotton primarily for seed, not letting the statistical heaps of lint cotton frighten us out of the cot-

business." International News Service Article: "Solution of the stock-feed problem in Texas, so far as essential protein feeds are concerned, depends directly upon finding additional marktts for cotton through research, Texas State Senator George Moffett declares. He characterized cottonseed products as the only dependable source of protein feed in the Southwest. Offett pointed to the fact that this year's short cotton crop and a feed shortage are going hand in hand."

Dr. Henry G. Bennett, President, Oklahoma A. & M. College, in "Mid-South Cotton News": "When we think of cotton, we are thinking of a miracle combination plant that yields both fiber and food - From its seed, which makes up about 65 per cent of the cotton by weight, comes edible oils and vital animal feeds."

Victor H. Schoffelmayer in "The Dallas News": "At the bottom of the feed shortage, chiefly protein, is the sad decline of cotton acreage-There are no more dependable sources of both protein and carbohydrate feeds than cottonseed and grain' sorghums. Both crops can be grown successfully over vast Texas areas in normal years. Indications are that farmers during 1946 will not skimp on the acreage they seed to these basic crops."





SIDELIGHTS FROM WASHINGTON

By CONG. GEO. MAHON

As this is being written we are making the final push to have the barracks and housing at Lubbock Army Airfield actually available to Veterans who wish to enter Texas Tech for the new semester just beginning. In early January I attended a meeting with President Whyburn, of Tech, and city officials at which plans were made to try to get occupancy of LAAF housing by February 1 for the use of Veterans. Plans were made for accommodating as many as 1500 Veterans.

Upon my return to Washington > presented the matter to high officials of the Army urging the elimination of red tape and the quickest possible action.

Officials of the college and city have been on the job making proper contacts with the U. S. Army Engineers, in Dallas, and with the Public Housing Administration, in Worth, the agency under which the city will operate the housing facility. The exact extent of the housing to be available for Veterans at LAAF is not yet known but it is certain that several Veterans will be accom-

A suggestion has come to me from a Haskell County citizen that flame throwers which were used in the war be made available to counties to combat Johnson grass, cockleburs, and sunflowers along country roads and public highways. For those who hate Johnson grass, as nearly everybody does, this is an intriguing suggestion. But the War Department says no that the flame throwers are too dangerous for such work and would not be practicable anyway.

A State agency in Mississippi tried out the flame throwers against the underbrush along the lower Mississippi River. The idea was abandoned.

The ordinary portable flame thrower has a capacity of four gallons of fuel. It has a maximum range of 60 feet and exhausts itself in nine seconds. The tank type flame thrower has a range of 100 yards and a capacity of 2:0 gallons of fuel which is exhausted in one minute of opera-

So the answer to the Johnson grass menace is yet to be found. It is too bad that the deadly ferocity of the flame thrower cannot be released against it.




